Dear mathNEUS:


This letter is directed to the people at mathSoc who like to complain about apathy amongst the students. They are as suilty as anyone else of causing and maintaining apathy.



In 1956 Rod studied at this institution and became a distinguished honour student. After starting out in Physics he wound up graduating with a B.Math-Physics in 1969.

After graduation he became manager of Operations in the computing centre. In December 1970 he returned to do some Masters work and received his first lecturing appointment. In 1971 he received his current position and went to school part time and received his M.Math in May 1972.

Rod Cooper is single (hint) and is presently in Village 1 (s4 208 ) where he spent many a rowdy day as an undergrad. He is considering working on a doctorate and is now lecturing in M-132A.

In his computing experience Cooper has dealt with WATBOL, WATIAC, WATMAP, and PDP software. He is co-author of two books with his accomplices Wes Graham and Paul Dirksen. Rod has carried on research into compiler writing and teaching methods. He believes in using computers for practical things like data processing. He does not believe that the computer is God.

Rod feels that universities have passed the day when their sole purpose was to lure people into students attend He believes resources. university to obtain better training in order to secure employment in the business world. University should teach a person how to be disciplined, organized and how to think. Rod is a firm believer in this and tries to teach his students how to learn a language instead of a computer language itself. It is felt by Cooper that exams are useful and teach one to work well under pressure, but said that they should only count about 25%. This is because we are rarely constrained by 3 hour limits in real life. As a student Rod believed students are adults and have responsibility and the lecturer should realize this and help students get the experience they need. He feels faculty should say what goes into courses but feels student input is needed. Teaching methods are important as Cooper believes teaching is the most important aspect of learning. A good professor is one who teaches a person how to approach a problem and is willing to listen to people about new methods. An example is when Wes Graham ate the output when a program would not work. Rod fears that the University of Naterloo is in danger of growing "dangerously large". However he feels that so far despite its size Waterloo remains personal. He does not want to deny anyone capable admittance if in the university's competition for dollars goals may be forgotten.

This place has a number of good points. Rod feels our computers are mighty fine, now that last year's situation was corrected. We are lucky to have two fine systems and Rod feels that the Honeywell vs IBM battle is just petty and compares it to the english-french problem in Canada. Rod likes university and feels that the program in Math exemplifies this. He feels Math has the advantage of being able to change. Cooper defends his much-derided assembler program Watlac as a good teacher. Outside the classroom Rod is quite a sports fan. Unfortunately he is an Argo fan and has not gotten much joy out of Canadian football. Rod also follows the warriors in Canadian college basketball. At least he is half right. Besides sports Cooper follows Math contests (he calls them fun). As a student he wrote many of them. He helped sponsor the Euler and Special K contests with Murray Klamtin and works with the Junior and Senior Math contest. As a rookie coach Rod led the underdog Waterloo Special k's to victory in the highly regarded Putnam International competition. One of his excellent students Ed Severn called him a "great pal". Rod also founded the Euler Society but denies any knowledge of the Gauss Foundation. Rod misses the early days at Waterloo when he was a chevron reporter and the classes were small and people lined up at 6 am for FASS tickets. Rod felt in those days one knew more people. Over the years Rod made many friends. He is highly regarded by his students and such people as illustrious former mathNEWS editor Randall S. McDougall. In conclusion I agree wholeheartedly that Rod is a great professor and a great friend to many.
