## January

mathNEiVS celebrated its second anlversary. MathSoc president Jim Langer-promised to take action if sufficient response was made by the students about the new changes the Math Council had slipped thru in December. - The changes restricted a.student with an average of less than $75 \%$ to. a maximum of 6 courses. The response of 60 against and -1 for was deemed insufficient for action.

The MathSoc commilttee on smoking, chalred by ilike Rolle, presented its report. The only major item-of the report which MathSoc Council adorove-(12-1-0) was that smoking not be allowed In the C\&D nart of the Math Lounre.
mathNEIVS published an-estimate of how blg the semiformal deficit would be and llathSoc president, Jim Langer, threatened to close down mathNE'VS.

## February

mathNEIVS started off. the month with a change in format to reduce costs. Each column of print was made wider so we could squeese more on.to fewer pages.

Senate rep, Joe Carpenter, asked for comments on a dian to change class lengths from 50 minutes to 80 -minutes.

In response to demands for greater truth in the sports department, mathNEHS separated thinos into 2 columns -- FICTLETICS and MATHLETICS. Kathy-x (the - star of Fictletics) threatened to take violent action with her chalnsaw- against members of the mathNEWS staff.

The semi-formal starring LIGHTHOUSE and FULLHOUSE was held. . The majority opinion was that a Full House was better than a-Light House. The last-guess by mathNENS on the size of the deficit. was MMDLXXXVIII. When the figures finally came out, mathNElUS was only out by $\$ 34.55$.

## Committee \& Council Posltions Open

The report on the William Lowell Putnam 35 th Mathematical Competition was as follows: 2159 individuals competed from 374 institutions of which 306 entered teams. From Haterloo, 22 students entered, and the Faculty of Mathematics Team consisted of Steve Locke, Ed Severn and Richard Anstee. As most people will know by now, our team was placed first, with the University of Chicago coming second, and the California Institute of Technology being placed third. In addition, one of our students, frant Roberts, was placed in the top five individual contestants, although he was not in our official team.

It is, incidentally, the first time that the University of Waterloo has won this contest. These results, together with the winning of the North American Computer Chess Champlonshlp make this an outstandingly good year for our Faculty. tve probably have had the "raw material" for many years, since many good students are continuousiy being "discovered and nurtured" through the Juniour Mathematics Contest, the Descartes Mathematics Competition and, more recently, the Euclid Competition, but this year through everyone's superb efforts, we have been able to win the top prize. In this connection, the work of Professors Rod Cooper and Murray Klamkin should be acknowledged and, again, our candidates are to be congratulated on this sínal success.

done despite my objections over the amount of money to be spent, the worthiness. of the projects (such as an engsoc sponsored student garage, a housing project and a grant to a legal aid group in Kitchener), and the timing of the requests.

Meanwhile a dispute has blown up concarning the full-time Chevron -staff personnel who are not ratified by council. A committee has been set up to report on the matter. In regards to employees Federation council voted to hire four full-time employees to work. In such areas as housing, education affairs, a student handbook, and orientation.
over the weskend a number of high-ranking federaticn perscnnel attended a conference of the National Federation of Students in Torcnto. Waterlco's Federation does not belong to thls group which is a seperate organization from UFS which we do belong to.

It is reported that the Waterloo Observers at the conference (not official delegates inind you), led by President John Shortall and without the consent of Federation Council or Executive, pledged $\$ 4,005$ tc the National Union of Students. Also Mr. Shortall wants to have a referendum to have YOU PAY $50 \%$ a tera (compulsary fee that is) to join what is referred to as N.U.S. Apparently N.U.S. is sunpcsed to be in danyer of financlal collaps: but Join Shortall was uriable to tell ine wily and what went wroner.

Thcurg it is a little early for ine to cast my decision cutrizht acainst N.U.S., neverthe less I remain sceptical. Remember you have just started tc pay 75 c a terna to join O.F.S. , willin I feel was a gocd invéstment, but is it worth it to pay more. Try tc find cut for yourself and ralse any worthwhile objections before anotiner compulsory fee is thrown in ycur lap.

## In Action

MathSoc is now giving out lockers to any and all mathies presenting a stamped I.D. card (there is usually a surplus of lockers in the summer). They are al so stamplnf I.D. cards.....

In case you didn't notlce it was gone, the Karl Fredrick Gauss Foundation gave back the Pink Tle (we threatened not to have it cleaned if they didn't). If you wlsh thay'd kept it, there is an ever growing ilist of sugaestions as to what should be done with it and/or a replacement on the wall of the MathSoc office. Go in and add your own idea. We would tell you what some of them are, but it's doubtful if even Enginews would print them.

There have been two MathSoc meetings so far this term. The first was called by the Director of Internal Affairs (JJLong) to elect a president and was held April 30 th. There were four nembers present (though only two were summer term co-op reps of a possible seven). Phil Lanouette was appolnted summer president, which brought the total number of voting members present to five.... the meeting was then adjourned.

The second meeting of the term was held last Tuesday, May 6. It was chalred by Andrew Haycock (yes, he's still around) and attended by seven voting members....

The meeting, convened at 4:33p.m. (the card game went three minutes into overtime) and a question was raised as to the parentage and voting rights of certain members. This was put tas the last item on the agenda so that any questionnable members would be allowed to vote in the meantime Last term the Birth Control Centre had asked MathSoc for money, and due to the shakey condition of the budget they were referred to the summer councll. An enquiry was made as to what had happened to Birth Control. There was a suggestion from the chair that JJ's parents be asked, and the meeting continued.

Under reports it was disclosed that there Is stlll \$1600 in 11athSoc's account, but $\$ 715$ or nossibly more will go towards paying last term's bills. There will be about $\$ 1690$ in fees collected (about $\$ 600$ of which will not be avallable for a few weeks) giving a final total of about $\$ 2600$ which will require a very tight budret, but then summer councils traditionally ovar spend thelr budgets, and who are we to stand in the way of tradition?
on to old business.... since the only councll members currently on campus were the Director of Internal Affairs and the (newly apoointed) president, some summer council nembers were proposed.... Don Sheshy was put forward as treasurer (he . had olven the treasurer's redort) and seconded by Internal Affalirs Director J.J.Long who pointed out that MathSoc's absentee president Gary Dryden had recommended Don.... but they voted him in anyway. Andy Eiliot was proposed as social Director (he's throwing a party for his campalign workers) and was seconded by the new treasurer. After his ratification the sccial director seconded the nomination of Rosemary Van den Akker as Education Director... passed (she was the only oirl present)... A motion was made by

Calvin Barrett and seconded by JJLong that Rag White NOT be made MathSoc administrator... This position is still open for anyone who cares to apply.

The next item of old business, again left over from last term (when we say old we mean OLD), was a $\$ 100$ donatlon to the MIke Moser Fund. It was decided to table this untila budzet is present so that we'll know what to take it out of (we might have a budget this term).

It was noted that one $1 B$ rep has missed several previous council meetings and could be removed by a two thirds majorlty vote. The president suggested that she be gotten hold of. When asked how well he knew her, he replied that he didn't. There was a suggestion from the floor that this might be the reason he wanted to get hold of her....

In the meantime there will be by-elections in $2 B$ and 4A. Nominations open this Friday the 9th and close on the 16th. The election (or thinking of last term, the acclamation) will be hald on the 26 th. The election commlttee voted in was Rag Ihite, Mike Rusheleau and Robert Pascoe.

It should be noted that to this point all votes were unanimous (although JJ had abstalned on the vote for social director).

Coffee \& Donuts also came up, under new business. Calvin Barrett, this terms manager, rescrted that donut prices have gone up from the suoplier, and, though he is still making a orofit on them, he may have to ralse thelr price. He then asked that a third signing authorlty be named for C\&D chaques (the second is Kelth Farlinger (who?)) and Andy Haycock volunteered as such. Calvin also mentioned that two workers were manning the stand more often than the summer maximum set up by C\&D rezulatlons, but that it seemed necessary. J.J. commented that this was not serious and there was no reason to follow the regulations to the letter... it was then commented that Hathsoc nesdn't follow the constitution to the letter, whereupon John noted, "Well maybe they (C\&D) should" (incidently the duty of Director of Internal Affairs is interpreting the constitution). The chalr then called for other intelifcent comments and council went on to the next business.

That being whether or not off-term voting members should be able to vote if they are present (the essence of the issue being that Cal does not want $J J$ to have a vote). JJ, as internal affairs director, put forth an official version of the constitution which would allow himself to vote and Cal put forth a motion tc reiect JJ's interoretation. Since no one else was willing to end discussion, the next hcur was soent listening to the two of them argue, with the infrequent irrelevant interjection by some members of the audience. The final vote was by roll call. One person voted for JJ's interpratation, JJ and five people voted against it. (JJ's comment: Well, after I looked at the facts...) Concensus was to lonore the proviem and let questionnable members vote, at least until next meeting. The meeting was then adjourned.

## CC COURSES: ATS and CMS

Once again the Computing Centre is offering a number of non credit courses that is -open to the university at large. During the past -weeks and running till the end of June the Centre will offer.sixteen courses.

ATS (Administrative Terminal System) enables a typist to have the assistance of the computer in the preparation of theses, manuals, letters, reports, and other documents. The tvoist is able to type text into the computor via a typewriter terminal and use ATS commands that format the text automatically, and print the materlal in the desired format. Corrections and revisions to text are easilymade using the ATS commands, and only the text which contalns errors need be retyoed. . Documents can be printed on the terminal or by hirh speed printer, and, if desired, can be stored for future use.

There are no prerequisites for the -ATS course. It is designed to present the fundamentals of ATS in a manner suited to those with little or no computer knowledpe.

CMS (Conversational Monitor System) is an interactive terminal system operating on the 370/158. Its conversational mode of operation, and the fact.that it is a time-sharing system, make it ideal for debugginf, proaramme development, and the execution of any interactive programme. Cms has an easy-to-learn command language, and a simple file structure. Of particular interest to scme people is the fact that CMS does not have many of the restrictions imposed on batch prorrammes, such as the limited avallabillty of maln storare. If your ororrame reaulres 900 k to execute, this can easily be obtalned. llost language processors and annlications packapes are available under Clis. In addition, FORTRAN H Extended, DL/1 gptimizer, and Basic are available only throueh Chis.

This course consists of one sミssion in which the language structure, and file creation and maninulation in ems, are explained and demonstrated.
