The free chevron staff were to be out of their office in CC140 by January 25th. However, knowing how the present Federation administration operates and the disrespect the free chevron has for the will of the students, I suspect that those offices will still be occupied when you read this.

Tickets are now on sale for FASS. Despite reports in other publications, it looks promising. With such characters as the Winkle of Fed, Robert Brassiere, K. K. Kong, James T. Jerk, Mr Jock and the the crew of the Satirize we should see what no man's ever seen before. On stage such illuminaries as Gary Prudence, R.A.G. White, Bruce Burton and thee other JJ will perform. For Wednesday's presidential election the four major candidates appear to be Salah Bachir, Mark Wills, Joe MacDonald and Doug Thompson.

Both Bachir and Wills support the reinstatement of the free chevron as the chevron. Bachir, an AIA member, is running on a Marxist-oriented platform. Wills, a former Fed councillor and recall petition organizer, is a former AIA member. Though he still has friendly relations with that group, he asserts that his platform will be significantly different from Bachir's. Personally I can not support either Wills or Bachir. Their views on the chevron reinstatement tend to go against the results of the referrendum and I feel that the referrendum must be adhered to.

I don't know much about Joe MacDonald,
though he is ArtSoc president and former Arts C\&D manager. Since he was acclaimed as ArtSoc president last November, becoming an exofficio member of Federation Council, I have not seen him at any Council meetings. In the last week, however, he has taken more of an interest in Federation affairs.

Doug Thompson, a representative on Federation Council, is running with the support of the Campus Reform Group. Thompson believes that the results of the recent referrendum on the Chevron issue should be implemented. He also feels such areas as student services, housing, entertainment, and educational cutbacks should get more emphasis from the Federation, as these are areas that more directly affect the students.

As I look at the candidates in the race, I get the impression that Doug Thompson would be the person best able to revitalize the Federation and get it moving. I have decided that I should support him and help him get elected. You may notice that Thompson and the Campus Reform Group are receiving criticism from people supporting the free chevron and those supporting the present administration. This is to be expected since Thompson is one of the more active council members and is willing to take a stand on issues affecting the students. Most new political groups run into opposition during their formative stages. One must realize where the attacks are coming from and ask what the critics themselves have done to solve the Federation's problems.

I do not wish the chevron issue to become the "Vietnam" of U.W. It is my belief that Thompson and the C.R.G. can prevent this from happening. They should be able to provide the leadership that is needed on council in order to put the Federation back on the track an once again fulfilling its purpose of serving the students.


## Don't Quote me trobles

The algorithm clearly adds the two numbers A and B and leaves the sum in the cell B2. During each cycle of the loop, the bit sums (xor's) are left in B2 and the carries in A1. The carries need to be shifted over to be added to the bits of next higher power. When the loop quits, the sum sits in B1, and A1 is empty. This is the way the IBM/1130 adds; it can be observed in the ACC and BUF lighs when the machine is run in single step.

Does this qualify me for the prize ?

A useful quote from Professor Malzan's 231 class: "The Theorem of Duality states that when lines go to lines and points go to planes, well, everything just stays the same..."

Finally, some speculations about FS. Speculating about FS is relatively safe; nobody seems to know anything about it. FS (Future System) is IBM's "next" machine system, the follow-on to the 370 series. For a while rumours persisted that it had been cancelled, but there are indications that the recently introduced $/ 138$ and / 148 may be the end of the 370 series and an article in "ComputerData" magazine puts FS "two years away from the market".

Certain trends expressed in the /138 and / 148 may lead to interesting theorizing about FS. The main innovation in these recent 370 s is the increase "Writable Control Store"-microcode to everyone else. The amounts of microcode provided represent quintupling and quadrupling of the amounts in the $/ 135$ and / 145 respectively. The increased capacity is put to good use; heavy-usage portions of the operating system have been microcoded.

The implication is that future operating system releases will require these functions to be available at the hardware/firmware level. And since the major difference between members of the 370 series is the proportion of micro-coded to hard-wired instructions, we can anticipate a machine on which these functions are indeed part of the hardware.

This sort of movement has two effects.
It will make things difficult for the manufacturers of plug-compatable CPUs; Amdahl has made the most impact here, but others are getting involved. It also virtually eliminates recent announcements of "unbundling" of IBM operating systems; as the user gets more power to pick and choose operating system components, the operating system disappears into the hardware.

## SOUNDOFF: THOMPSON PAPERS

At the next Federation Council meeting, Thursday January 27 (tonight), Doug Thompson, the presidential candidate for the Campus Reform Group (CRG)-founded by many a deserter of Robert's sinking ship-is going to try to ram his motion through council once again. Since this is his last chance before the election, he will try to call in all of his troops-including three out the five Math Reps, as well as one from most of the other faculties, with the exception of Engineering and Environmental Studies. Contrary to the students' interests and without really letting them know about it, Thompson and gang are going to set up a new bureaucracy called, of all things, a Journal of Politics, Arts, Sciences, and Education. They are going to spend quite a bit of money, and if they had had their way, you wouldn't have heard about it until afterwards.

Why?
Article five of the motion states that positions for co-editors will be advertised, and applications submitted to the Board of Publications. The Board then sends its recommendations to the Feds for ratification. The Board, which is responsible for the student newspaper, had its first meeting in two years last November, and currently includes a CRG member, "Mad Dog" Dillon (I.S., one of mathNEWS's editors), and Rob "Rag" White (Math, Speaker-Fed Council). The current chairperson is Leona Kyrytow. Kyrytow was the controversial Roberts appointee who admitted that at the time she had no qualifications. Contrary to policy, the position was not widely advertised. (Author's note: J.J. Long wants it clear that he, as well as Larry Hannant and others, opposed her appointment.)

Article six says that the co-editors' terms will be eight months, except that in the first year only, one will be for four months. It then goes on to claim that any co-op student will therefore be able to participate. I'm sorry, but my understanding is that if a co-op student did become an editor in later years (for eight months) he would be off campus for four months, leaving the other editor with effective control.

Article nine sets up a special review board that will handle complaints, and report to the Feds. Voting members are: all society editors (6), the co-editors (2), the Board of Publications Chairperson (1), and last but least the editor of the student paper (1). More on this review board later on in the article.

Article ten sets out Thompson's idea of an editorial policy-R. B. Burton, Thompson's "friendly" "real chevron" editor, take note! The main emphasis is to be an even balance between Education, Politics, Arts, and Sciences. In case of a shortage in one section that can be made up by other sections, the first rule of substitution will be the article's "timely and topical nature", that is, its newsworthiness. Make up your mind, Thompson, do you want a journal or
a newspaper? Failing that, the next rule is drawing of lots. Recently published authors get one lot, not so recent two.

The real clincher in article ten is paragraph "E" though. "Decisions regarding what material is to be included will be made by the review board in accord with the aformentioned criteria and procedures outlined above or added or amended by Council from time to time." Thompson, what were you thinking of? You select two paid editors and then put them in a position where two things can happen. One, the society reps will actually find time to show up each month for the unpaid job of helping a paid Fed appointee and paid editors put together a journal. In this case why be stingy if you want to do a good job? Spread the students' money around and pay everybody. The more likely thing to happen of course is that the society reps will not show up. That leaves two editors appointed by a Fed Board and the Chairperson of that Fed Board and the student paper editor voting on each issue. Cute if you can get it. The best part of the motion is yet to come-Articles eleven through fourteen, dealing with financing and advertising. Article eleven provides that anyone who is not satisfied with the way they have been handled by the review board, or who want to guarantee that their point of view will appear in the paper, can always buy space in the journal, at cost.

Article twelve states the size and therefore the content of the journal is to be dependent upon the amount of advertising to be raised. One third of the journal is to be advertising to pay for the rest. Said raising and soliciting of advertising is to be the sole responsibility of the Board of Publications, while student papers have always had this responsibility themselves

Article fourteen sets the issue run at 5, 000 with the journal to be printed monthly. By comparison, the student newspaper run has been 11,000 to 13,000 , the approximate full-time student population mathNEWS is 1200 issues per run.

Clearly, the success of this journal depends on competing with the student paper for the advertising on campus. The Board of Publications, who is responsible for the student paper, is suppose to help cut its throat. Does anybody remember the Fed's and the present CRG councillor's stand last year when Like it is was run off campus because it would compete against the Fed-funded student paper for advertising? Does anybody remember the recent referendum where the students voted $8: 1$ to have a student paper?

No where does the preamble to Thompson's motion state that anybody had actually asked for his journal. It does claim that a large number of students do not want such topics in the student paper. When did a "large" number or any number say this? There were no petitions, there was no such question on any referendum. Does anybody remember being asked? Maybe
the CRG polled themselves, since they claim to represent a "large" number of students.

By endorsing Thompson's journal, the CRG has told the students (in this "elaborate four-page motion" only of course) that they want the students to shell out $\$ 600$ per year for two editors that will do either nothing or everything, plus any costs that their advertising won't cover (don't forget those 5,000 issues each month). Thompson and the CRG want to set up direct competition against a studentfunded newspaper for advertising revenue, and if they both can't find a lot more new ads, the students will have to subsidize the costs of both more than they already do. They want to do this to a paper that the students have already said they want, without giving any evidence that anybody but themselves want theirs. In other words to hell with what the students want

There are several CRG members in mathNEWS and Mathsoc. There are seven admitted members in Fed Council, which because of typical low turnout, gives them an effective majority block. They can and will try to ram this through the council meeting tonight (Thursday). They have tried in the past, but quorum was usually broken.

If you don't want Thompson's Journal, go to the Mathsoc office and ask where to find the following Math Reps (Fed): J.J. Long, Kevin Willis, Doug McDougall (all CRG), Ron Hipfner (former CRG), and Rob White (Fed Speaker). Ask them where they stand, and tell them what you think. If they aren't interested or can't be found, remember to ask them why before the councillor's elections coming up soon.

If you want to speak at the council meeting about a pertinent point, or if you have a question, the Ontario Corporations Act gives you that right. Council in the past has tried to require sponsorship by a councillor before they would recognize you, but some councillors pointed out that they legally can't get away with it. The best thing is to have a councillor explain a few of Roberts Rules of order, so that councillors or the speaker can't cut you to ribbons for not following procedure. If you are intimidated by all this, at least talk to a councillor, and then watch him at the meeting to see if he listened to you. If the motion still gets through and you still don't like it, councillors have been known to change their minds at future meetings if someone talks to them about the elections just around the corner. After all, Reps are responsible to the students who elect them, not some party within the Feds, aren't they? Arn't they?

Many vocal CRG members are third and fourth year students, which means they won't be around much longer-unless like Roberts, they plan to hang around for seven years and counting. If by any chance they wanted to get themselves into any

## SOUNDOFF on the REBOUND

Since Mr. Rekuta has taken the time and effort to write an article on the inadequacies he sees in the proposal for a monthly journal of Education, Politics, Science and Arts, we would like to make a few comments in return.

1) We have never claimed to be perfect. If Mr. Rekuta or anyone else can find weak points in the proposal, we would be happy to discuss them and make any changes that prove to be neccessary. The Campus Reform Group welcomes input from all students on any proposals that it puts forth. Only by working together can students solve their common problems.
2) Regarding the problems with coop students being one of the coeditors. This is a good point. We're not sure how it can be resolved yet, but one possibility is to allow co-op students to serve 2 non-consecutive 4 -month terms.
3) You say that the review board members are likely to miss meetings, thereby allowing the Fed appointed board members to run the journal. Well, as long as the journal is run according to the guidelines set forth to ensure fair treatment for all writers, this should present no problem. However, if the board cannot mobilize all its members for an appeal meeting or if the editors start ignoring the guidelines, then Students Council can step in to change the makeup of the board. We think that assuming that the members of the board will be negligent in their duties before the journal is started is a bit premature.

In any case, the important thing here is the guidelines by
which the journal is run, and you seem to have no quarrel with them.
4) On the subject of advertising. There is more than enough advertising available in this town for both the chevron and the journal. There can be no competition because the advertising for both publications will be solicited by the same person, namely the Board of Publications ad manager.
the problem with the magazine Like It Is arose mainly from the fear that it would erode the stability of Youthstream. Youthstream is the national advertising service of CUP that provides a large part of the old chevron's advertising revenue.

What we have said so far is mainly what was discussed when the original proposal was formulated. The proposal has been before Council since November 11, and has not yet gotten to the stage of being discussed by Council. The CRG does not intend to "ram" this proposal through Council. We feel it is a good idea and should be discussed by Council.

And finally, the CRG is interested in what the students want. We would like to thank Mr. Rekuta for his comments. They pointed up at least one weak point in the proposal. That, and the rest of your comments will be taken into consideration, and the proposal for the journal will be reconsidered at the next meeting. We would also like to encourage students to comment on any or all of our activities. Mail sent c/o mathNEWS will reach us.
