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

For over two thousand years, the legend of Medea, barbarian sorceress, has blazed in the imaginations of poets and playwrights. In no other period in history has the Medea story more pertinence than now. Certainly modern audiences will appreciate that she is more than just "a woman scorned". She becomes instead a symolic affirmation of self-realization: the human soul striving for fulfillment.

The University of Waterloo production of Euripedes' *The Medea* is a full-scale musical drama, and promises to be one of the most electrifying productions ever produced in the UW Humanities Theatre.

Professor L. Fejér (1880-1959) greatly influenced education and research in mathematics and in particular those fields of preference for the award of this scholarship.

The award will be made wholly or in part to one or more graduate students or senior undergraduate students enrolled in the Faculty of Mathematics and proceeding to a degree at the University of Waterloo. Preference will be given to those students whose field of specialization is Functional Equations and/or Information Theory.

The amount of each award will be determined by the Foundation. The total of all awards will not exceed \$1,600 in any one year.

Applications should be made by letter to the René Descartes Foundation, Faculty of Mathematics.

Dear mathNEWS:

I am pleased to see that the Campus Reform Group (CRG) has finally come out and said something. I am also flattered that JJ Long and Sir R got ruffled enough to refer to my SOUNDOFF in their articles last week. I would like to make a few remarks to the CRG and I presume Thompson's Rebound that was scrounged up just before mathNEWS went to press.

Thompson and the CRG say that they welcome input from students. Why, when this motion was put forward in early November, has the CRG then never published their 'elaborate four page motion', or publicly ask for student input? Why did it take until my article before they would say anymore than that there was such a motion in existence?

It is not premature to think that the society editors will not work on the Journal. It is a sure thing that they will not have the time, and one reason is that they have enough trouble getting out their own society papers. This means that the coeditors and the Board of Publications chairperson will probably have effective editorial control. Any CA student worth his/her salt, or anybody with any com-monsense at all will tell you about the chances of partisan opinions controlling the content of the Journal under those circumstances. Oh, but they say, the Fed Council would step in and fix it all up. Considering that the Feds took over two years to even get the Board of Publications to meet, and that they then approved someone who admitted she had no qualifications, and that said board is pleading for someone to staff it, that is pretty wishful thinking.

I said all of this in my article last week. Yet Thompson and the CRG incredibly have the vision to say that I do not disagree with his guidelines. Will you please take Mad Dog's advice, and go down to optometry for a checkup, so there will be no doubts in your minds about my next sentence. I said it last week and I will say it one more time: Thompson, your guidelines stink!!

The final point is the statement that there is enough advertising for the Chevron and Thompson's journal. In the last audited financial statements, available at the Fed office, the Chevron generated more than \$70,000 in advertising revenue. The students still ended up subsidising the paper to the tune of more than \$10,000. The "Real Chevron" survives only because of the heavy amount of Fed advertising, and Fed subsidies. The "Free Chevron" is hurting because it has lost some of its former ads, and all of the Fed ads. If you rob Peter to partly pay for Paul, the students are going to have pay more for both.

Several things about the last issue bothered me enough to make me break my usual habit, which is to write to the paper only about relatively trivial things.

First, and in passing, I am sorry to read that Mark Brader has seen fit to dissociate himself from mathNEWS. His editorial policy seems to have been more moderate and apolitical than most. Next, I am all for ' a concerned and responsive federation'. Perhaps the Campus Reform Group (an unfortunate choice of names, incidentally, since it conjures up visions of burly men in blue jackets keeping a sharp watch on my morals and personal cleanliness. The implications are still that either the CRG doesn't want to give out its membership list, or that they have some sort of ' party line' that requires that all responses must come from the group as a whole. Also, is mathNEWS to be a maildrop for every group on campus? Surely some of these people must have bun accounts, and thus mailboxes, for example. Also, I do not agree that the Mathsoc office should be used as campaign headquarters for any candidate in an election (even a mathie) In ijlong's column, he gives his support to Doug Thompson and the CRG, saying that he feels that they are the best people, in effect, to get this campus out of the present mess. This may well be true. It has long been true that you can do more with a

As I said last week, Thompson and the CRG believes that the best way to eliminate bureaucracy is to set up their own. The best way to do that is to use somebody else's money, and don't bother to tell that somebody that you are doing it unless you absolutely have to.

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




Puzzle Four: (What has thousands of feet, no toes, and no legs?) Again Paul and Tom had the correct answer, a mile.
