# **RECALLING SEASON OPENS**

#### **RECALL STARTED**

An official recall of Doug Thompson has started. The signature of the Chief Justice (who is Thompson himself) was attached to the petition last week. The official reason listed is that Thompson violated the last referendum.

The prime mover behind the petition is Mathsoc official and former Federation speaker Robert (RAG) White. Apparently he has been motivated by some of the recent "offers" of Thompson which have proposed various types of re-instatement of the free chevron. Last week White unofficially claimed to have about 200 signatures on the petition. Included among the signers of the petition were some of Thompson's former supporters who have felt betrayed. Others have included free chevron supporters, many of whom dis-trust Thompson. However free chevron personnel may start their own recall petition as many disagree with the legitamacy of the referendum. Some persons have not signed the petition yet feeling that three weeks is not enough time to judge whether Thompson is good or bad.

With these varying opinions it is difficult to determine the effect of the petition. Thompson can be recalled any time during his time of office. About 1500 signature are needed to recall Thompson (this is about 700 more than who voted for him). Depending on the progress of the petition, his position could be tenuous in the next few weeks or months.

# **Election & Question**

## Results

On March 15 Mathies went to the polls for the first time in three years to elect an officer to their council. It was a typical mathie showing; hardly anyone showed at all. On campus 155 took time out to vote, this is 7 percent of those on campus. In comparison 172 mathies voted in the off campus mail-out, this is about 20 percent of the off campus mathies. This is a total of 327 or just under 10 percent of the math students registered.

The winner is Ken Lynch and now is Vice-president elect (not acclaimee) until April '78 or when he dies. The score was 151 Ken Lynch, 129 Andy Mueller, 37 blank, 10 spoiled. The off-campus vote was overwhelmingly in favour of Ken as he received 50 more votes than Andy.

# FILLER QUEEN

This is the first column in a series of two. Actually, this week's **mathNEWS** required filler and at this stage Dennis said that we might be able to make only a four page issue. Thus what you are reading now is filler.

Anyway, it's a good thing we got a chance to write this, because as of this date, we have yet to see a reasonable review of the Queen concert in Toronto on Feb. 1. The Star's Peter Goddard who rarely says anything good about anyone, gave a mediocre review calling them "overpowered". Queen was certainly loud, but then so were David Bowie and E.L.O. Loudness is something to be expected of rock concerts; however, some bands use sheer volume to make up for a lack of ability. This was certainly not the case with the Queen concert. While loud, everything was perfectly clear and the production was excellent.

Queen is one of the few bands today that doesn't make use of synthesisers. They are proud of the fact, and mention it on every album they've released. Even Roger Taylor's drums looked quite small up there on stage, compared to the usual impressive collection used by many bands. Some of their songs, like Bohemian

Rhapsody, Prophet's Song, and Tie Your Mother Down, are so lavishly produced for the albums that there are problems performing them live- for instance, they used the difficult part in Bohemian Rhapsody to do a wardrobe change. That is, they turned out the lights, put on a recording and left the stage. Then they rejoined the song after the difficult part.

Queen's stage show was also good, if you go for that sort of thing. There were the standard flash-powder explosions and fog machines (the fog machine was so good it fogged out the first five rows), but the real attraction was Freddie Mercury himself. He pranced about the stage, flaunting his body in a white leotard which couldn't be much tighter, and then later changed to a black leotard. For the encore, he wore a pair of red and white striped hot pants with red suspenders and nothing else. These too were so tight they left nothing to the imagination. One admirer, unable to control herself any longer, flung herself at him from where she was standing in front of the stage. He quickly evaded her, and the roadies escorted her backstage.

All in all, even not counting the gimmicks, Queen gave a solid performance.

# Toronto & Ottawa Pubs

The co-ordinators are responsible for calling the pubs to check on entertainment, choosing one for each pub night, and preparing the recording. Help will be given in the form of advice to get you started and there will be at least one former coordinator in Toronto.

The first pub is on Wednesday, May 4th, at the NICKELODEON. The 'NICK' is located on the east side of Yonge, south of Dundas. There is a 24 hour service to find out pub information. The current phone number is 787-7980. That number will change on or about May 1st. The operator will give you a referral if you dial the old number. Or, you can phone information and ask the number of "Hugh Hexad". You'll hear a 60 second tape containing all sorts of info. Come out to the pubs for good times. We almost always get a reduction or elimination of a cover charge (if there should happen to be one.) Regular students home for the summer, and all alumni are welcome, of course.

Last fall pubs were tried in Ottawa. Some success was achieved and some lessons were learned. This summer it is planned that about five or six pub nights will be held. They will be held on Fridays. The first is on Friday, May 6th,at the BLIND PIG. The BLIND PIG is the second pub in the Holiday Inn downtown. At that time, the second pub will be announced and by that time, all others should be planned. Hopefully, printed handouts will be available at the second pub, giving all the details. Watch the newspapers (JOURNAL or CITIZEN) also in case we get them printed there. There is no telephone- tape-recorder system in Ottawa, but one may be installed at a later date if it is felt this summer's participation warrants it.

We need an Engineer co-ordinator for Ottawa to work with Steve Risto, who is the Math co-ordinator. Steve is from Ottawa and is familiar with the city. Again, regular students home for the summer, and alumni, are welcome. These pub nights provide a valulable service to over 700 students in Toronto and to over 200 in Ottawa (that's co-op, Math and Engineering). There are about the same number from each faculty in each city. All students are welcome, but since these are the two major groups, Mathsoc and Engsoc are working together to put on these pubs. The societies provide services for their students and this is just another service. Co-op students lose out in some ways on their Federation fees, (typist's comment: Who let the cat out of the bag?) so in the near future the societies may approach the Federation for funds. So let's support your society, and have a good time in the process by going out to the Waterloo pub nights.

# **OPIRG** & the

## secret ballot

Belated though it may be, I have been asked to write a short article on the OPIRG election procedures.

The basis of our electoral system is the secret ballot. This procedure allows a person to vote without fear of reprisal for voting one way or another. OPIRG. however, favours a method whereby each ballot is numbered and the number on your ballot is recorded against your name on a master list. OPIRG defended this procedure when challenged on 3 points. The first was that this is a very popular method of conducting elections in the United States. (By the way, what country are we in?) The second was that with this method, if there was a challenge to the election. OPIRG could then determine who voted and whether or not there was ballot stuffing. The third point was that they could not implement the method used by the Math Society of having two people at each poll because they could not get enough people. I point out at this time that during this previous election they had one (1) polling station located in the Campus Centre.

I complained to the Federation. OPIRG, and the University. From the Federation I was informed that there is nothing that they could do as OPIRG is a separate entity that the Federation has no control over. From the University I heard nothing. Finally, from OPIRG I was told the previous points and invited down to observe the ballot counting so that I could be assured that there was no matching of ballots to names.

Apparently these people are unaware that the principle is not whether matching was done at this time but that matching could be done.

If you feel the same way that I do, that this is a very bad way to run an election, voice your opinion to the people elected to **OPIRG** at that election and demand that proper electoral procedures be used. R.A.G. White

Now that council has faced up to the issue and has approved Larry Smylie's motion for an investigation into the chevron issue, perhaps we can get on with the more important business of the Federation. Of course I would have preferred an outside investigation, however Smylie's idea is at least a start and a step in the right direction. If the investigation finds that the chevron closure was indeed illegal, then re-instatement would be necessary. However if the action of last year's council is only judged as immoral, the re-instatement issue would then be have to be submitted to a referendum since referendums like the one in January are legally (and morally in my opinion) binding on the Federation if the turnout is above 10%.

In the past week the free chevron gave their interpretation of the chevron closing to an informal meeting of Student Councillors. Many of their points cast doubts in my mind about the validity of the closing.

This is not the time, however to make a hasty decision about re-instatement. Though they claimed that the closing was illegal in past arguments, much of their recent arguments are based on moral judgements. They claim that "due process" wasn't followed. It still appears to me that there was a case for closing the paper, but that Shane Roberts may have made some tactical mistakes. Since the closing of the chevron was not a criminal case, but a corporate action, I wonder how much the conventional wisdom of due process applies. If the terminated employees had a case, why didn't they go to the Labour Relations Board? Do they have contempt for the legal process or do they feel their case has no basis in law. There is talk of the "immorality" of the closing, but did Shane Roberts have "due process"? Is it moral for a small group of people to have editorial control of a newspaper paid for by all the students and meant to serve the students? Is it moral to obstruct the conduct of and disregard the results of a democratic election? Many of these questions will need to be answered in the coming weeks. You can see the task of the investigation is not easy, and it will take time.

In the meantime we should concern ourselves with more important issues. The Federation budget is up for consideration. There is talk of the Federation providing some sort of local bus system for students, in areas not serviced by Kitchener Transit. How can we improve entertainment on campus? Better relations with the societies

are needed. I am asking for your ideas in these areas. I can be reached through the Mathsoc office to hear your ideas.
