

Elections

Co-op Math rep Doug McDougall was re-elected last Friday in the Federation Math election. The victory by McDougall, the current chairperson of the Education Board is seen as another defeat of the free chevron (and its candidate Lorne Gershuny) administered by the present Federation government. Thompson had been greatly worried since three free chevron supporters had won elections in other faculties by acclamation. McDougall, while not formally a member of the CRG itself, supports many of its policies and his victory should make President Thompson somewhat pleased.

The extent of McDougall's landslide victory was obvious from the early polls, as he garnered 52 votes as compared to 10 for Gershuny, and 16 for Mathsoc councillor Brian Gregory. The questionnaire-type posters of Gershuny, nor the computerized posters of Gregory were no match for the person to person grassroots efforts of McDougall and his close circle of campaign workers. In fact late Friday the McDougall camp was confident of victory as they felt that they had gathered close to 50 sure supporters out of a turnout of 80. They even had a victory party ready before the vote was announced.

Ratfor is here!

Now those who must programme in FORTRAN can get relief from unreadable programmes caused by the primitive features (such as GOTO's) which FORTRAN demands. The answer is **Ratfor** (Ratfor); a preprocessor for FORTRAN with structured control statements such as IF-ELSE, WHILE, REPEAT and FOR, modelled after those used in Eh, B and C. This allows one to give a structured appearance to the programme and eliminates the need for the use of GOTO's.

The result is clear, readable and easily debugged programmes. Furthermore, the Ratfor-to-Fortran translator is written in FORTRAN itself, so it can run on any machine with a FORTRAN compiler. The time saved in programming, debugging, and programme revision can be enormous. Remember the first time you tried to understand that FORTRAN programme you wrote a month ago? It took almost as long to relearn it as it did to write it. Ah, where was Ratfor when you needed it?

Ratfor is available on the Computing Centre's VM/370, Honeywell TSS (expl ratfor), UNIX and the Psych Dept's PDP 11. If you are interested in finding more about Ratfor, see the book **Software Tools** by Kernighan and Plauger. Not only does this book introduce Ratfor but it is also one of the best books on programming I have ever read.

CSC FLASH

Last week saw 2 excellent meetings of the CSC. On Wednesday evening, just under 100 people turned out to hear Dr. Doug McIlroy of Bell Labs speak on voice synthesis techniques, while Dr. Jerome Saltzer of M.I.T. attracted a sizable audience when he discussed the MULTICS file system the following night.

Dr. McIlroy's talk centered around the difficulty of formulating language rules which will allow a computer to generate reasonably clear English phrases in real time. The scheme, in increasing levels of desperation, was:

1. recognize the word as a "known" word, either through table look-up or by its simplicity (e.g. "the", "a",...)
2. remove endings like "s", "ies", etc..
3. apply known rules of phonetics to the word
4. spell out the word (e.g. "CSC")

There are many rules of phonetics which can be applied but, as any grammar school student knows, there are exceptions to every rule and so the synthesizer does make mistakes. Better versions of the synthesizer are far from real-time. One method cited for formulating pronunciation rules was the extreme case of putting all of Webster's Pocket Dictionary on-line; a list of all words containing a certain word pattern (e.g. "ie") could be made quickly. A subset of the words in the list conformed to some rules of pronunciation; the remainder were scanned and eventually all were pronounceable either by rule or by rote. Many European languages (notably Spanish and Italian) have much simpler grammar rules, but unfortunately there is no method yet developed for reproducing the necessary trilled "r" (nor a good guttural German accent).

The demonstration of a talking computer which followed was made possible by using 2 telephone lines simultaneously: a terminal on one line enabled Dr. McIlroy to send commands to the computer at Bell

Labs in New Jersey, and another line was used to transmit the output (voice) from the computer. The most fun part of the evening was being able to type in your favourite word at the terminal and hearing the computer speak it immediately (apparently the computer is American because it says "zee" for "z").

The following evening professor Saltzer gave a historical talk about MULTICS. He described its early beginnings as a project, and the process they used to go about choosing the hardware for the MULTICS machine. Apparently when the decision was to be made between IBM and General Electric as the manufacturer, IBM said they would consider the engineering specification changes that M.I.T. was requesting, while GE said they would send their chief design engineer down to work for them on the project ... so they chose GE.

Saltzer talked about the development of the PL/1 compiler for MULTICS and the use of PL/1 as a language for systems programming. An interesting co-incidence was that Dr. McIlroy who spoke at the previous night's meeting was one of the two authors of the first MULTICS PL/1 compiler.

For most of the evening the audience sat listening to Saltzer in silence. After the talk, he opened the meeting for questions, and people asked about the file system, and various design considerations in MULTICS. Some people brought up UNIX as an example of a more elegantly designed file system, but Saltzer explained that Ritchie and Thompson had the benefit of other people's experience in their design.

Three more CSC meetings are planned this term, and a field trip to Toronto International Airport is in the works for the very near future.

The next meeting is Thursday June 16 at 7:30 in M&C 5158. The speaker will be Roger Moore of I. P. Sharpe Associates. He will be talking about a high level language for data communications. As usual, coffee and donuts will be served.

GOES ROUND THE BEND!

This article sees the unveiling of the new signature (as noted above). While the old one will still appear for various transitional reasons, you will probably be seeing more of this one in the next few months. The new signature features more concise j's and a slightly different, more unique spelling not used since my appearance at UW many years ago. (I also hope this new signature will help eliminate any confusion between myself and a certain Social Credit perennial candidate in Cambridge.)

Moving on from style to substance, a few words about the upcoming Federation fee referendum. While the Engineers have a few good points about the idea of forcing people to join an organization that they do not want to join, I feel they fail to realize many important realities. Grant you refundable fees would be a useful way to indicate one's dissatisfaction with a poorly operating Federation. In reality, though, many people would take out their fees so as to have a good time or to spend twenty seven odd dollars on other things. They would be getting refunds for the wrong reasons, not realising that one of the other things the \$27+ is spent on might be part of a \$200 tuition hike (and if there is no Federation how can they effectively organize opposition to the hike?).

If I felt that the Federation could survive with refundable fees, I would be quite sympathetic to them. However, regardless what proponents of refundable fees say, I don't believe the Federation could survive too long with a refundable fee structure.

Some evidence in support of this is available from nearby U. of Guelph (where Dr. Burt Matthews was Vice-President Academic near the time of the collapse of the former Guelph student federation).

Another problem with refundable fees, is that of people taking their fees back and still benefitting from the intangible (and tangible) benefits the Federation provides (like it or not) to all students. Would these refunders become the "welfare bums" of the Federation? Even if the Federation did survive, could it have legitimacy with other authorities if a sizable minority of students were not members? Other groups with either variable or unknown numbers, would rise and claim (I believe wrongly) that they were the "true" representatives of the students.

Of course being not totally against refundable fees, I would support the idea of a 50-50 split refundable-compulsory fee. This would allow the Federation to still function (Yes I really do believe we need a Federation), but prevent it from becoming too arrogant and isolated from the students. I believe a \$7 a term split each way would be fair. If however the referendum is inflexible and only offers the two extremes, I will probably support a compulsory fee. If the fee was refundable, I would still pay it. I base this claim on the fact that this term I have as a part-time student (who normally is not charged Federation fees with tuition), tried three times (at registration, at the pub, and the ice-cream stand) to pay my \$13.75 for the

term. I have been refused each time but will not give up until my fees are accepted. While I feel the Federation has problems (not the least of which is Docherty and the chevron), I don't believe the "do-nothing" option (as first dismissed and later practised by Engsoc) is the answer. Like in any organization one should make a "serious" EFFORT to work for change in the Federation before disbanding it.

Concluding, I'd like to comment on a recent happening in the Federation office. Recently the job classification of a Federation employee, Sylvia Hannigan was declared "redundant". I must say here that I don't think too much personally for Ms. Hannigan or her job performance and I have also felt since 1975 that her job of Board of Publications Office Manager was unnecessary. However, I also feel that if she was suitably qualified for similar jobs held by other employees with less seniority, that she should have, for the sake of fairness, been offered the alternate employment. If there were grounds to actually "fire" her then that should have been done through proper procedures. It is true that as an employee of the university she was entitled to certain procedures. Now I know that Ms. Hannigan has some sympathies with those people in Free and Democratic Publications, so I hope that the athletes in action don't construe my concern over the declaration of "redundancy" of Ms. Hannigan as support for any of their aims. I am just concerned over fair action and I don't see this redundancy action as an "expedient" move.

THE TIME HAS COME, THE WALRUS SAID...

I confess. I slept on a waterbed and liked it. In fact, I liked it so much that I immediately went out and found out all about waterbeds.

Waterbeds cost about \$150 but you can get one for as low as \$10. Usually waterbeds come with a frame, to keep the bed in one place, and a heater, to keep the bed warm. If you only pay \$10 all you get is a used bed. You don't really need the frame around the bed, except that it helps to keep sharp objects away. The only problem with a frame is that the bed is not as bouncy. You also don't need the heater, and can instead use a pad of foam about half an inch thick over the bed. This still gives the feel of a waterbed and would only cost you \$10 for the foam.

Waterbeds are great fun. They are great to sleep in, especially with a member of the opposite sex. They are a great conversation starter ("Want to come see my waterbed?") and a great conversation stopper ("Want to try my waterbed?"). Since this is **mathNEWS** I have to mention the chevron, since we all are secretly jealous of it. On Saturday June 11, 1977 the Democratic Centralists took over the chevron office for 4 hours in a bloodless victory. The victory celebration consisted of two pizzas.

In 1975 a new rock group called **HEART** released their first album called **DREAMBOAT ANNIE**. The group mainly consisted of Ann and Nancy Wilson. Ann did the lead vocals, and Nancy played acoustic guitar. Roger Fisher, their lead guitarist, provided the necessary depth and commercial sound. Because they recorded their album in Vancouver they were Canadian content and they quickly got airplay. It was not until 1976, though, that they finally broke out on the U.S. market, thanks due to their Canadian fans, and being back up group on B.T.O's U.S. tour. Almost two years after the record came out **ROLLING STONE** managed to review it.

Stuck with an unknown label, **MUSHROOM RECORDS**, the group had little promotion and wished to change to a large label. Money was the main consideration. They attempted to escape from the contract by using a small loop hole. After recording an album called **MAGAZINE SMILES** in late 76 on Portrait label (a division of CBS), they were stopped by an injunction. While the battle to quash the injunction raged in the courts **HEART** decided to re-record the album, and did so during the winter of 77. Finally in late May they were able to release the album.

The album is called **LITTLE QUEEN**, and it is very good. One notices several differences right away between their first album and this one. The production job is much better, even though they kept the

same useless producer. The album is recorded in Seattle, where most of the band comes from. Thus the Canadian content status may not apply to this record. The group now consists of six members, keeping the best of the three drummers who played on **DREAMBOAT ANNIE**.

The first song of this album is also their first single. It is called **Barracuda** and is very commercial sounding, though not up to **Magic Man** or **Crazy on You** of their first album. The second song is **Keep Your Love Alive**, and is lovely song, building up from a simple acoustic background to Ann's vocals to a good solo effort by Fisher. The next two cuts, which blend together, form the best cut of the album. The first song utilizes two mandolins, played by Nancy and Fisher, and a Moog bass, supplied by Howard Lesse. The effect is very pleasing. The song moves into the next song, titled **The Dream of the Archer**. The lyrics of this song deserve to be called poetry. Combining excellent vocals by Ann Wilson, and the mandolin sound from the last song, the song has a good chance of being an FM hit. The last song on the first side is **Kick It Out**, a trivial song by Ann Wilson.

The first song on the second side is the title cut **Little Queen**. This song is not as good, commercially, as **Barracuda**, and may not do so well on AM. But still it is quite a nice song. The second song is **Treat Me Well**, by Nancy Wilson, and is not so good. The next cut is **Say Hello**, a refreshing song that has plenty of promise as an FM or AM short cut. The second last song is **Cry to Me**, a solo effort by Ann and Nancy Wilson. It is terrible. The last song is **Cry Again**, an excellent Pink Floyd imitation. It combines Roger Fisher's great guitar work with a half decent production.

On the whole it is a very good second album, though not as initially likeable as their first. The lyrics are, for the most part, excellent. The vocals, guitar work, and percussion are top notch. But still I recommend listening to this album before buying it.

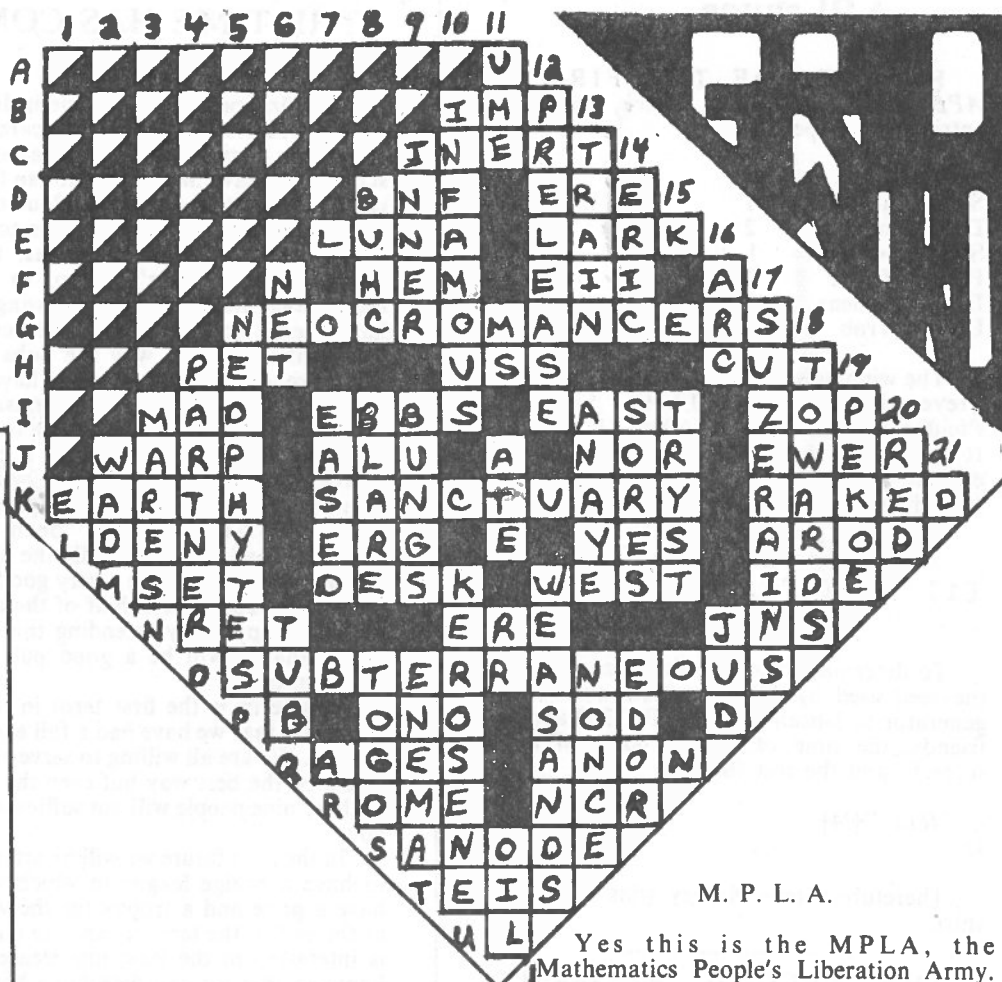
Rabbits
