I can't help but feel that this type of discussion is of paramount importance to any student federation.


At Waterloo, particularly at this time, a clear understanding of student government is required. A fresh understanding of the services provided and a renewed mandate from the student body is absolutely needed for the federation to be functional and effective. Once the referendum is completed, and all the dust has settled, the results in, there can only be one question resolved. That question is, have some of the students, both on and off campus, expressed clearly to all students of Waterloo the basic premises behind the federation of students.

In this article I attempt to outline some of those reasons and why a strong federation is absolutely dependent on collective membership.

The last few years has seen growing faculty societies, the secession of graduate students from the federation and some student discontent with the federation. When we look at the events of the last fewcontinued on page 3



First, a correction to the last column. The version of COMPRESS I printed was the origin-0 one. If the ">" is changed to ", the fn will work in origin 1.

I have decided to extend the time for the Second APLsauce Contest. There are several reasons for this, which I won't bore you with here. Note that this gives you some extra time to work on the problem, so GET THOSE ENTRIES IN! The new deadline is Thursday, 30 June.

One warning: notice that COMPRESS is not supposed to reverse the entire vector, just the order of the letters within each word. REV 'HOORAY FOR DR. IVERSON' is 'YAROOH ROF .RD NOSREVI', not 'NOSREVI .RD ROF YAROOH'. One of the entries received so far made this mistake: I would like to ask the author to submit another entry.

A small piece on the word "operator". This word is often used around here to mean all sorts of things. I would like to give the proper meaning of the word (as defined by Dr. Ken Iverson (the inventor of APL) and his associates at IBM's APL Design Group) here in APLsauce. "primitive function" (more often just called a "primitive") is a function which is defined in APL itself, such as + or -. A "user-defined function" (or, simply, "defined function") is a function which is defined by a user (what else did you expect?) and is usually just called a program. An "operator" acts on a function (theoretically either primitive or user-defined, although I don't know of any implementations which allow operators to act on user-defined functions) to turn it into a "derived function". For example, the reduction operator /" can act on the addition primitive "+" to form the derived function "+/" (plusreduction). An analogy: if you think of a function as a verb, then an operator is an adverb which acts on the verb to change its meaning.

I hope this clears up the confusion. Dr. Iverson and friends have been using this set of definitions since about 1970, and it's apparently taken until 1977 for it to make it to Waterloo!

MILLS OUSTED

(M&C 3038)During the Math Society meeting of June 27, 1977, the Duke of Earl of Bunwich, Bruce N Mills to his few friends and JJ's nose to those who know him, was unanimously voted out as editor of mathNEWS.

One of the reasons being that he wasn't present at staff meetings he called, didn't meet deadlines and offended many of the staff (by his general lack of body hygiene).

The straw that broke the camel's back being the attempt to produce this issue of **mathNEWS** on time. The meeting was called, and as usual the editor didn't show up. He had the password for the account and no one could get on without it. Only the most dedicated of the staff waited. When he did show up, he was too bent out of shape to work. Then he attempted to clear the office so he could CRASH for the night. Bunwich was thwarted by a massive staff revolt. He stalked out, after many grumblings and unkind compliments about his performance as editor.

The next night he committed the ultimate no-no by frelling an article for **mathNEWS** which showed him in an unfavourable light. As you can see, "Selfappointed censors won't stop me!" On Monday June 27, 1977, MathSoc council passed a motion supporting compulsory federation fees. Rationale for the compulsory fee was discussed and the following are some of the points which council members felt were important in the decision that was made.

Past precedents indicate that where voluntary fees were adopted for student councils at other universities in Canada (most strikingly at the University of Guelph) the student organization would quickly disintegrate. This would leave the students without any effective representatives to lobby the university administration.

The orientation events, early in the fall term, operated and entirely funded by the federation, require a large sum of money. The federation does not obtain its funds from compulsory fee levies until mid-October. Thus, to fund the orientation mentioned above, loans must be obtained from private lending institutions. The loans are given on the basis of the compulsorary fees collected for the federation by the university administration (*i.e.* the compulsory fees are a collateral).

Other union or professional organizations, though not requiring membership or participation, have compulsory fees that are usually built in to licensing practises of the juridiction concerned. Such organizations have socially desirable services, and are used to represent the wishes of the membership to governments, etc. Without such compulsory fees, the budgets of such organizations would be too small to ensure effective operation.

MathSoc council feels that services provided by the federation, such as the housing office, supplementary manpower office, bus service to Toronto, para-legal assistance, Radio Waterloo (CKMS), and others are important to many students. As well, federation funds are disbursed to many student organizations on campus such as the various student societies (e.g. for activities, Math-Arts-ESS Week) and many student clubs (e.g. the Computer Science club, the Amateur Radio club).

For the above reasons and others, council feels that the federation fee should remain compulsory, and urges students on campus this term to vote for compulsory fees in the upcoming referendum.

services is that we have endowed the concept of students providing student services. Certainly all people would think this is a good thing.

The second reason is that we students do not want an across campus student organization for any purpose. We do not want one now or for future students. Some people say that an across campus student association, built from the ground up, could be based on voluntary fees. The type of federation I've described earlier cannot be based on voluntary fees.

In order to be a strong, healthy student federation requires many things. But one thing it needs is capital. For the federation or any student union to do anything, that will be viable, it must have a constant and sure source of money. How can student council members bring forward programs if we are unsure of the financial basis on which we stand. Common sense would seem to make the answer quite clear. A stable supply of income is essential if the federation is to borrow the quantities of capital need to start and develop long range programs. Planned budgeting cannot be based on uncertain reserves of cash. What type of leadership will be part of this type of central student association? Will weak leadership rather than effective leadership be the case?

Some people say the administration could provide a few of the services we do. Perhaps, but at what cost? Presently the federation must "lose" all of its money to break even. Would the administration choose to do that? Shall we lose the student control we now have? We could always go for the tokenism of one rep on some obscure administrative committee. More importantly within the current cutbacks, months it would look like the federation is falling apart. The proverbial "who gives a shit" is vogue and has taken its toll on any organization, from the federation to the Red Cross. When I look at this, it seems to be only one ramification of the pessimism that we find all around us, in society, in school, at work.

All students know the need for taking stands on the collective level. Why else have societies or course unions? We all know the importance of taking, if we must, stands on issues together. Whether it be on administrative assaults on coffee and donut stands, faculty rollbacks of drop deadlines or the quality of our education.

We need to have a campus wide organization to further our own goals and objectives and at the same time advancing the common interest. The type of organization should be able to organize and articulate our collective concerns. At the same time ensure our own personal aspirations are not shut out. That is what our federation of students is for.

There are only two types of federations that should not have compulusory fees.

First, if the federation was an extremely biased political organization. A political organization that did not represent students on this campus or serve in their interests. That type of organization that did not represent students on this campus or serve in their interests. That type of organization should not be encumbered by what the majority of us want. The statement that it have a check of a voluntary fee is logical and therefore valid. However, in our case, what is political about a record store, ice cream stand, post office and the fed flicks. Just about the only political thing inherent in these three what priority would an ice cream stand or record store get? Not very high I can assure you. We could not even be sure of getting these services after some future date.

At this point we must deal with individual rights and compulsory fees. Sure, we all have individual and personal interests. However there must be some interests we all share and hold important. The body for this type of activity is the federation of students.

That is the desirable part of the federation of students. All of us can change the federation because of its constitution and charter which states that its mandate is to "serve in the interests of the students". How we put that phrase into action is how we vote on elections and referenda. That is how we build a student federation and that is how it must be kept.

I know of two examples of student unions operating on refundable fees. The first is in Lethbridge, Alberta. It just lost a referendum on the question. In a few short months it has fallen completely apart, it can't even pay fees to the National Union of Students or to the Alberta organization. Its end will be here shortly, so much for a student union. A few years ago Guelph tried the same route. That student organization lasted 18 months. It took three years before a new central student association started, this time on compulsory fees. Don't let it happen here! Vote for a federation committed to all of us. Vote for compulsory fees.

Roger Moore of I.P. Sharp Associates, Toronto spoke on July 16th about a high level language he developed for writing the operating system on an IBM 3705 communications processor. The operating system he wrote acts as a control for the network of dial-up terminals I.P. Sharp supports. The compiler he wrote is not exactly of the highest level, to add, for example, A and B, requires the moving of B to a register and adding, i.e. you must do all register allocation for arithmetic yourself. Further, so as not to confuse variable with registers, variables must be 4 characters long. The registers are called A, B,...
