## **Chevron Fees Frozen**

October 24, On Federation President Rick Smit froze the account containing the fees collected for the Chevron. In a letter to Chevron Editor David Carter, Smit stated that there were "insufficient funds remaining to pay salary costs for the remainder of the term." He also stated that "if salary costs are to be maintained until the end of the term, the account is already (his emphasis) \$2400 overdrawn." The Federation is liable for all debts incurred by the Chevron before they incorporate; and therefore, on the advice of their lawyer, hold a reserve fund to cover debts which the Chevron might default on prior to incorporation. The Fee Account has been frozen, and "no further disbursements, including October salaries, will be permitted on the account until such time as the Chevron incorporates." When the Chevron does incorporate, says the letter, the liabilities will be resolved and any money left over will go to the Chevron. The letter closes with the statement, "We look forward to the incorporation of the Chevron, and the resolution of the Federation's liabilities, as soon as possible."

As soon as possible. In a telephone interview, Carter stated that there was "no problem" with the budget; although they would "have to check which bills the Feds have deducted" before he could give a final verdict on the Federation figures. He referred to an article in last week's Chevron saying the Federation deducted a bill for \$400 which the Chevron claims the Federation should pay because of an agreement signed at the time of the "Shane Roberts vs. the free chevron" conflict. He stated that "It certainly shouldn't have been deducted from the current budget." Mr. Carter further stated that advertising revenues are about \$1200 a week and go into a different account than the one frozen by Smit. Carter concluded the interview with statements pointing out that The move was done with "no consultation at all, which is typical of the man" and "Smit refused to even talk to a Chevron reporter this morning."

Obviously it sat around for a while, probably in the fed offices, until it was decided that the Mathies, by far the best broomballers on campus, should become holders of the trophy. It is currently on display in the glass enclosure in the third floor foyer; it's the one with the old Carling symbol and the broken victory cup.

Each fall and winter term Mathsoc, in co-operation with our fifth floor friends, play a fun broomball game. In Fall '77 the game ended in a 2-2 tie but it isn't easy to get a line on what happenned in the winter term. To be totally honest the faculty team won the game by one goal, probably 3-2, but of course that won't be found on the trophy (for some unknown reason no one in Mathsoc sent it to the engraver). The faculty team included McGee, Scoins, Beach, Steve Brown, Rob Brown, Bev Marshman, and Cyntha Struthers. Those are all legitimate faculty members so we couldn't even accuse them of bringing in ringers.

The game this term will be played on Friday Nov 10, 2-3pm, at St. Clements Arena. The Society team is being formed of Math people who do things for the rest of the student body. Hopefully the team will be composed of representatives from Math Council, Watsfic, Coffee & Donuts, CSC, MGB, **mathNEWS** and so on. The Faculty team has yet to give us a roster, but is usually made up of any profs who have the interest and time to play. Hopefully even the Dean will make an on-ice appearance If you have a mid-term scheduled on that day and time then you can assume your prof is not a broomball player. We certainly can't advocate cancelling or skipping classes for something like this, but every effort is made to arrange the game at a time which is most convenient for everyone. Spectators are definitely welcome, and cheering for the students is even encouraged. The game is intended to be fun; the St. Clements Hotel is just around the corner and a good place for post-game strategy. It's really not a bad prelude to MATHWEEK.

## **ETAOIN SHRDLU**

For a while there, it looked as if disco was taking over. The Bee Gees, who had been a hit for years with their Beatle-styled pop, had the biggest success of their careers when they went disco. Saturday Night Fever (and its soundtrack) is well on its way to being one of the biggest movies (and records) of all time. And even the Rolling Stones' most recent singles have shown a definite disco influence.

Through it all though, it seems obvious, at least to me, that good old rock and roll is bigger than ever. Consider these facts: Three of the most successful new acts in recent years have been Boston, Foreigner and Meat Loaf. And no matter what you think of the content of their music, you've got to admit that the style is pure rock 'n' roll. The Rolling Stones and The Who, arguably the two best rock bands in the world, have been dominating the charts lately with a couple of albums that, despite a few minor lapses, offer more all out rock than anything else. And even Linda Ronstadt, who is usually categorized as a country singer, has released an album that rocks unashamedly.

Last week, I picked up a couple of albums that do a pretty good job of summing up this trend. The first was A Tonic For The Troops, by The Boomtown Rats. Aside from the fact that the Rats are a six member New Wave group from Ireland, and that they make brilliant albums, I don't know a thing about them. *Tonic* is their second album; their untitled debut album was released here late in 1977. The two albums are fairly similar. There's nothing new or innovative here, but these guys have obviously done their homework, and both albums rock along like mad. As you listen to them, you keep thinking that you've heard this all before, and you probably have. The difference is that the Rats play this stuff with a passion, and an energy level at least three steps ahead of most other groups around today. There are several standout tracks on *Tonic*, but if I had to pick one, I'd go with "Rat Trap". It opens with a driving sax solo, and has an almost hypnotic, two note bass line in the chorus. A Tonic For The Troops isn't for everyone, but if you're still convinced that the New Wave began and ended with the Sex Pistols, then you should give it a listen.

The other album was Stranger In Town by Bob Seeger and the Silver Bullet Band. Seeger has been working out of Detroit for years, as anyone who grew up listening to CKLW will attest, but his first big national, and international, success came with the release of his Night Moves album a couple of years ago. Just about everything I said about the Boomtown Rats applies here as well. Nothing really new or different, but a solid understanding and working out of the basics of rock 'n' roll. Seeger sings lead vocals with a slightly raspy voice that is a little bit reminiscent of Joe Cocker, or maybe Rod Stewart, and it suits the or maybe Rod Stewart, and it suits the material perfectly. Once again, there are a lot of outstanding songs, but the best are probably "Hollywood Nights" and "Feels Like A Number". The latter sounds as if it was inspired by The Prisoner, with Seeger singing I'm not a number on the chorus. There's another song on the album called "Old Time Rook 'N' Roll", which sounds a lot like Seeger's "Katmandu" hit single of a few summers ago. It nicely captures the mood of both A Tonic For The Troops and Stranger In Town. In it, Seeger complains that "modern music ain't got no soul", and tells us that he'd rather listen to that "old time rock 'n' roll". I couldn't have said it any better myself.

Of the two albums, I have a slight preference for *Stranger*, if only because the sound is a little cleaner, and Seeger is a little better singer than the Boomtown Rats' lead vocalist. But Tonic is just as good in other respects, and both albums are worth listening to.

Does all this mean that disco's days are numbered? I doubt it, because the pop music audience has become so large and so diversified that it's possible for several different styles of music to be successful. It is apparent though, that there's a lot of interesting music being made on both sides of the New Wave, and that rock 'n' roll is not only alive and well, it's definitely thriving.




## **BIKE RACE**
