# **10-speeds Wheeled Off**

In the past week numerous tenspeeds disappeared from their appointed parking spots, in fact, it seems, there was a rash of such thefts on Tuesday night (the night of the wine and cheese). In at least one of these cases the bicycle was used to transport a stupefied student homeward, unfortunately (for him), he was unable to control his newly acquired transportation and found himself sprawled against the pavement in awe. Being totally disoriented, the rogue abandoned his almost trustworthy steed where it lay, only to be returned to its rightful owner two days later.

After hearing about these reported thefts, we decided to check whether or not this past week's statistics were in line with other years. 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# FACULTY

The 1979/80 "Circles" booklet describes a recently approved English Essay Requirement for all new Math students. The Faculty is attempting to develop a list of courses which would satisfy this requirement. So far, no courses have been identified for the fall/79 term. Hopefully, such a list will be available (in the Math Undergrad Office, MC 5115) for the winter/80 term.

The December/79 exam period has been extended until **5 p.m. December 22nd.** This should be taken into account when making end of term travel arrangements.

The deadline for **adding** fall/year courses and for fall term transfers between corresponding honours and general math courses is Sept. 21. (That's today)

The deadline for **dropping** fall half courses and/or withdrawing without academic penalty is Oct. 19.

#### REAL WORLD 100 - An Introductory Course

#### ASSIGNMENT #1

Suppose a bicycle is placed upright on a smooth surface in such a way that it can move freely back and forth but cannot fall sideways. (W.O.L.G., let us assume that it is a standard ten-speed in complete working order.) The crank is aligned vertically so that one pedal is in its lowest position. Assuming the tires cannot slide, if a force directly backwards is applied to this pedal, does the bicycle move forwards or backwards? Watch for the answer in next week's issue. Your Assignment

Your algebra assignment is due in half an hour and you can't get number 3. Simple solution- ask someone you know in the class. You went home for the weekend and the CS assignment is due 8:30 Monday morning. Just borrow someone's programme and change the variable names and comments. The calculus assignment has a proof on it that no one can get. A visit to a professor proves helpful (he does it on the board for you) and you have an answer.

Right now, events as common as these are getting the faculty quite upset. A student has just been suspended for 8 months for copying computer assignments. Some professors feel that plagiarism is "rampant" throughout the math faculty.

And they're probably right, for the simple reason that students are not made aware of how serious this crime considered. It wasn't until I attended a faculty meeting (at another school) that I learned just how serious they are about it. But, in general, students do not seem to realize this, probably because we're not told! Everyone knows that blatant copying is not good, but "helping" one another doesn't seem bad.

Professors don't warn us of the consequences- only two of my profs in the last two years have made any comments to the class about it. Some profs have said they don't mind people working together on an assignment because the exams would determine the students' real knowledge. First year CS tutors tell students that if they're going to copy to at least change the variable names!

Alas, the very way we learn math is one of using someone else's ideas (thus plagiarizing). We're not asked to prove the first theorem of Calculus but to memorize it for the exam. We're shown methods for solving certain types of stats problems so that we can do our assignments and finals. We are not taught mathematics, but how someone else did it. So, be forewarned. Find out how your professor feels about it before you get "help" from anyone and be aware of the consequences.

# BURLOAF:

The PAC is a good place to start. Have you noticed the shiny new guard towers which have been installed to limit access to that building? You probably have missed, though, the mine fields, barbed wire, guard dogs, and nifty new PAC security uniforms with the cute "SS" on them. Although I don't see how. Well.....perhaps things aren't that bad yet, but as everyone knows now, the PAC has instituted a new policy of handing out little plastic discs and coloured wrist bands to show that you have paid vour athletic fees. To the many frosh who decided to come here after the impressive spread put forth by the various computing entities on campus, "Too bad!". Although the computing facilities here are indeed awesome and the promise that you will get an account as an undergrad is true, your patience will strained to the limit.
