

St. Jerome's Update

A few issues ago, we mentioned that MathSoc had discovered that St. Jerome's students do not pay MathSoc fees, and as such are not actually members of the Math Society. Since then, the powers that be have been working behind the scenes to resolve the issue to everyone's satisfaction. At the moment, a meeting is being set up between MathSoc, the Math faculty and representatives from St. Jerome's to work out a solution. Hopefully, some action will have been taken this week. At any rate, we'll get back to you next issue with a full report.

C+D Changes?

As you will have read in the Prez Sez (you do read it, don't you?) MathSoc's contract for the C+D has come up for re-negotiation with the university (as have the C+D contracts of the other student societies.) Exactly what parts of the contract might be re-negotiated is not known, but we hope to have a clearer idea next week. In the meantime, there are a few facts about our C+D that you should know.

MathSoc's contract with the University to run the C+D ran for five years, from April 1983 through April 1988. During this time MathSoc has run the C+D as it's independent food outlet, providing quality food to the student body at reasonable prices. Originally, the C+D was supplied by Food Services. In September 1986, market forces encouraged MathSoc to tender for suppliers, which led to the decision to use outside suppliers for the C+D goods. Those outside suppliers are supplying the C+D today.

The MathSoc C+D does not, in fact, sell food at cost. A slight profit is made on some food items, which goes into a C+D surplus account. The money from this account is used by MathSoc to provide benefits to the students. So far, C+D money has been used to provide the carpet and comfy furniture in the carpeted lounge (1984 and '85), to buy the new furniture for the other C+D lounge (1986) and to create two new student bursaries, the Natural Log and Pink Tieo bursaries (1986). (The bursaries are available to B term students. Consult the new undergraduate calendar for details.) Ideas for use of the 1987 funds are still being considered, including increasing the bursaries, and ending loan obligations incurred for the C+D renovations.

The notice received on October 30th, within the six month's notice the old contract specified for re-negotiation, may or may not represent a threat. Had notice not been given, the contract would have been renewed automatically for another five years. As it is, we will have to wait until MathSoc meets with University representatives to see what changes may be suggested. Stay tuned for developments!





Attempted Theft Thwarted

WLU security has released the details of the attempted theft this past weekend of the Yates Cup.

Last Saturday, the WLU Golden Hawks were awarded the Yates Cup after they defeated the Guelph Gryphons 28-15. Five dissident players from our last place Warrior football team grabbed the cup at half time, and made off with it. WLU Security and the Waterloo Regional Police chased the five back to the UW campus. The chase went through several buildings, and at this time, it is believed that three policemen and a security guard are lost in the PAS building. Another seven are reportedly lost somewhere on the sixth floor of the MC building.

The criminals were caught when they tried to enter B.C. Matthews Hall (which is never open on weekends) and the cup was returned to Seagram Stadium in time to award it to the Hawks. Charges are pending.

Later, in a press conference, the five footballers stated that they wanted Waterloo to have the cup, and this was the only way they knew they could ever get it.

Search parties have been formed to try to find the eleven missing men. The RCMP has been called in with specially trained police dogs to try to find them. Thus far the search has been fruitless, but there have been reports of gunshots being heard in the PAS, which officials are interpreting as signal shots to the rescue teams.

One search party official expressed his concern. "They've been missing for close to a week now, and we're running out of time. They probably haven't eaten for several days, unless they've found a food services outlet. In they case, we're even more concerned about their health."

In all, we had the Yates Cup for about an hour and fifteen minutes. Let's relish the memory, because it may well be a long, long time before we get our hands on it again.

How Variables get Rich Quick

No doubt if you've had any experience with Pascal at all you encountered the often feared, but much talked about, issue of *inheritance*. The main question I've been asked about inheritance is, "well, just what is it?" I've had to answer like this: Our scientists still don't understand fully what happens when variables pass on, but one thing is clear—the value of the variable does *not* disappear.

Then, if dying variables leave behind little "nest eggs" (technically known as nesting), those values must be passed on. To whom, you ask? Well, if a variable has lived within its means, its savings are dynamically allocated to other variables within its family. Other variables which have referenced the dying variable kindly, hold responsible positions in the program, and are reasonably clean (for example, use scope if their breath is of low quality) can expect to receive part of the inheritance.

The death-bed of a variable is an active and exciting place. A telephone invariably sits at the stack-side. The dying variable may request that a favourite fellow be contacted. The stack pointer approaches ever nearer, and finally, with one quick motion, Joe's memory is released into the great mass of variables which have existed, and which will again exist. Yin and Yang are preserved.

Other scientists disagree. They feel that when Joe dies, no co-mingling transpires, but that Joe's identity is gradually corrupted by being overwritten, reassigned, linked and unlinked.


One question remains—when all the variables in a program have died, where do their values go? This is an open question in computer science research, and the answer should be most rewarding (especially to the banking industry, which routinely misplaces millions of dollars (in fractions of cents) within its computing systems).




