Taking A Cut

Last issue, we gave you a bit of background about the C+D, and the contract renegotiations that will commence in January between the student societies and the University regarding new C+D contracts. Now, one week later, there have been a few interesting developments.

On the University side, Dean of Students Ernie Lucy has told other parties MathSoc is in contact with (such as Fed President Ted Carlton) that the University is considering raising our C+D rent, and/or taking a percentage of our C+D sales. The former option, while not to be looked forward to, is not unbearable as long as the increase is not vast. The latter, however, seems completely wrong to many Society members, myself included. To see the University, or any other group, benefit from the hard work we have put into the C+D is completely unjust. I cannot imagine a similar situation, with the exception of Income Tax, of course. It seems to me clear that it is not the place of the University to, in essence, tax our food. Surely we are taxed enough here as it is!

From the MathSoc side, this stream's MathSoc Council and the off-stream Exec have approved motions to disburse this year's C+D surplus. The exact amounts of this surplus are not available at this time. Joel has a few minor points to clarify in the books, as he is attempting to unify two year's worth of varied accounting by at least three different C+D managers into a cohesive whole. When he finishes this Herculean task, MathSoc has determined to do any of four things with the surplus fund. First and foremost, MathSoc will repay the \$3000 remaining on a loan from the Descartes Foundation, which was used to buy the C+D comfy chairs. This will already have been done by the time you read this article. Having done that, MathSoc may donate up to \$5000 to the Descartes Foundation, bolster the Natural Log bursary by up to \$5000, bolster the Pink Tie & bursary by up to \$5000, or any combination of the above. These motions are coupled with the desire to keep about \$10,000 in the surplus for emergencies, like a freezer dying. Our freezers are older than most of us, and in even worse shape.

The upshot of the above is that there could conceivably be a lot of money in the C+D surplus account, generated from revenues on the goods you buy in the C+D. Not necessarily is there enough in the account to do all those things-MathSoc just approved the possibility of doing them. In two weeks, I'll be able to tell you for sure. If you're curious about future plans for C+D revenues, ask the election candidates-they'll be involved in next year's plans. In the meantime, keep on shopping C+D-the best value around for your money!


Tom Vandeloo


In The SAC


