- Dr.Reginald Petty of the International Education Services in Washington, D.C., discussing the role of youth in Third World development
- Dr.Penny Andrews, a South African legal studies lecturer from LaTrobe University in Australia, discussing the issue of Third World Development
- Father Elias Chacour of the Elias High School and Community, discussing the Middle East conflict

This conference can raise the profile of the university, the community, the province and Canada itself. In order to obtain financial support from anyone, one has to show the benefits to all parties involved without sacrificing the basic principles of the organisation. I feel that much can be gained from this conference in a positive light. I only hope that the governments open their eyes to this in time.
