It will be shown in the Theatre of the Arts on Nov. 17, 18, and 19. The Wandering Minstrel program is continuing through this term at various locations around campus.

Don't forget to mark your calendars for Homecoming next weekend, with the highlight being the Naismith Tournament as always. The Warriors play at 8pm on Friday and Saturday, with Acadia, Mac, Ottawa, Saskatchewan, Toronto, Laurier, and Winnipeg filling the slots at 12 , 2 , and 6 pm . Saturday has the consolation final at 10 am , with the Runners-up game at 12 noon, and the championship at 2 pm . The Feds are sponsoring numerous events associated with Homecoming: watch for posters for details.

## The Davis Center, Explained

After several weeks of experimentation to verify our hypotheses, we feel that we can publish our preliminary results on the reasons behind many previously inexplicable characteristics of the Davis Center.

The responsibilities of the Executive include, but are not limited to the following:

## President:

- be the chief executive officer for the Society
- preside over General Meetings of the Society
- provide for Society representation and official functions and on public occasions
- be an ex-officio member of all committees of the Council, except those to which he has been duly appointed


## Vice-President:

- exercise and discharge the powers and duties of the President or the Treasurer in either's prolonged absence or incapacity
- be responsible for Society public relations
- be an ex-officio member of all committees of the Council, except those to which he has been duly appointed


## Treasurer:

- generally administer the finances of the Society
- be responsible for keeping accurate and complete records of the financial transactions of the Society
- present a budget for the operations of the Society
- prepare a closing financial report for each academic term and present such a report to the Council when audited

In addition to these elected positions, an appointed executive consisting of Council Secretary, Publicity Director, Social Director, Office Manager, Mathletics Director, Council Speaker, External Affairs Director and Internal Affairs Director will be needed for the Summer term. No experience is necessary for any of the above positions, although it does help for some of the more demanding ones such as President, Treasurer, and Social Director.
