Truth in Justice:

A Review of True Believer

Have you ever questioned the judicial system? Director Joseph Ruben has certainly questioned the U.S. legal system, resulting in his latest movie, True Believer. This movie starts with a murder committed in self defence in a prison. The murder prompted lawyer Eddie Dodd (James Woods) and his assistant, Roger Baron (Robert Downey Jr.) to defend the murderer; however, they decide to reopen the murder case their client was originally found guilty of eight years ago. As a result, Eddie and Roger must solve the real killer's identity in order to free their client.


The opening sequence with a murder in a prison is well directed, creating some suspense by panning the camera around the prisoners and quickly focusing on items. Unfortunately, this suspense is almost lost after the opening scene. Suspense is only derived from twists in the plot (yes, there actually is a plot), but this suspense is dulled in the movie. The theme of truth in justice, or lack of, is subtle at the beginning of the film, but is more apparent as the movie progresses. It seems as if Ruben somewhat sacrificed suspense, a much needed element, in order to make the theme more evident.

James Woods' acting is the power behind this movie. Robert Downey Jr.'s acting is good considering that he isn't given much of a character or many scenes to work with. Woods' acting also creates sympathy towards his client since it appears as if Eddie and Roger are the only people who believe in their client and therefore are making a greater effort to prove his innocence, despite the fact that he hides information from his lawyers.

Wesley Strick did a good job writing the script, keeping twists in the plot to add suspense, while allowing the portrayal of the theme of truth in justice to be expressed throughout the movie. However, the murder in the prison is ignored after the opening sequence, except for a couple of indirect references. This concern leaves a small hole in the script.

This movie is held together by James Woods' acting and a good script. These qualities can compensate for some, but not all, of the problems in the movie. As a result, I give True Believer a 6 out of 10.




