Faculty Facts

Scholarships and Awards

Arthur Andersen Management Consulting Scholarship

Two annual awards valued at \$400 each are given to students entering their 3A term in either the Faculty of Engineering or a Co-operative Mathematics program. Selection of recipients will be based on academic achievement, active participation/leadership in extra-curricular activities, ability to communicate and career objectives of implementing change through Application Systems Development and/or Manufacturing Process Improvement. Relevant work-term experience will also be considered. Applications should be submitted to the Student Awards Office during the student's 2B term. The application deadline is June 30, 1989.

Sun Life of Canada Award

This \$500 award may be awarded to an outstanding student who is entering third year of an Actuarial Science program. The deadline for applications is June 30, 1989 and is open to 2B students.

Bell Canada Scholarship Engineering and Computer Science Awards

The value of these awards is tuition for the final undergraduate year plus an offer of work-term employment (acceptance of employment is not a condition of the award). The awards are available to third year Engineering or Computer Science students who rank in the top half of their class, have an interest in telecommunications or related fields, and have been involved in on-campus or community activities. The application deadline is June 30, 1989.

A.C. Neilsen Company of Canada Ltd. Bursary

A.C. Neilsen Company of Canada Ltd. has made available several bursaries in the amounts of \$500 to be awarded to a student entering second year Computer Science at the University of Waterloo. Financial need and academic standing shall be the criteria employed in determining the award winner. Students currently in their 1B term should apply before May 31, 1989.

Proof of the Week

Consider the inequality $\frac{-1}{x} < 2$ which has solution for $x > \frac{-1}{2}$. Any Waterloo Mathie will notice that $x \neq 0$ so the solution set is $\{x|x > \frac{-1}{2}\}$. Although $\frac{-1}{x}$ is not defined at x = 0, consider the left limit as $x \to 0^-$, taking on negative values which are greater than $\frac{-1}{2}$. As $\to 0^-$, $\frac{-1}{x} \to \infty$ thus the resulting inequality is $\infty < 2$. Therefore ∞ is much smaller than we thought or else 2 is much larger than suspected at first glance.
