## Room Temperature Partial DE's

## Another UW first

Waterloo (MNP) After years of research in grimy, dark computer labs on the 6th floor of the MC , two $\mathrm{U}(\mathrm{W})$ professors/researchers announced in March that they had succeeded in solving a partial differential equation in a room-temperature environment.
