

It makes me extremely frustrated and upset (as my girlfriend can attest to) when instances such as the above are brought to my attention. It seems that every day I hear reports of students abusing the lounges, taking supplies from the Office, trying to get away with just a bit of extra coffee from the C& D, or just plain destroying MathSoc property. It makes me seriously consider why MathSoc provides these services in the first place, why we don't just shut down and let everyone find their own staplers. For instance, the big project at MathSoc right now is the acquisition and implementation of a Mac Lab that would be available at a nominal cost, 24 hours a day, complete with software and laser printing. But why should we bother when all that will happen is that someone will try to abuse or destroy or steal the equipment?

The answer of course is that its only a small minority of students who are abusing MathSoc services, the rest simply use them as they were intended. Unfortunately, it is this minority who may us to restrict our services to everyone. MathSoc does not have the resources to police all of its activities — we work mostly on the honour system. As a result, we get burned sometimes, which ends up singeing the rest of the Society.

So what can be done, what can you as honest upstanding citizens of Math do to help? Simply put, don't abuse MathSoc services, and if you see anyone who is, either ask them to stop or come and tell us. I know it may be uncomfortable to do this, but when the alternative is withdrawing the service altogether, I think you'll find it worth the effort.
