

From The Executive ...







Bruce replied again, to Bruce this time. "Yeah, the green. What's this brunette you're talking about, though?"


Bruce spoke for the first time now. "I didn't see her either, but I did see the other four. Way up on north campus."

- · Conventional types were Zoodles! and Bluebeard, and blank.




