14 women died in Montréal on December 6, 1989. 89 women were killed by their partners in 1989.

I've subsequently heard that USET service is not used very much. I've also heard the rumour that it may not be available next term due to lack of interest from the student body. This is a great service that may be eliminated, if we don't start taking advantage of it.

There is no walk short enough to be *safe* nowadays. If you live in Village, get USET to walk you home. If you drive to school, get an escort to your car. If you live off campus, you can take the Safety Van. We have a great school with excellent student safety programmes. Use them, or we may just lose them.

# Waterloo Co-operative Residence Inc.

WCRI is student built, owned, and operated, and is located within a five minute walk to the University. Applications are accepted from all students regardless of whether or not they are enrolled in a university coop program; the word "Co-operative" here means that the residence is owned and controlled democratically by the members who live here.

WCRI has three co-ed residence divisions: Dag Hammarskjold, at 139 University Ave. W., and Phillip North and Phillip South, at 280 Phillip St. Each residence has a dining room where meals are served daily. Each floor has a lounge and a kitchenette where members can make breakfast and snacks with food supplied by the Co-op.

The apartment divisions have a combined total of 16 onebedroom, 48 two-bedroom, 58 three-bedroom and 35 four-bedroom apartments. Each apartment is equipped with a fridge and stove.

WCRI's small-community-like atmosphere encourages members to get together for many events such as pubs, movie nights, fitness classes and excursions. Members also have access to piano room, bike room, study carrels, recreation rooms, and laundry facilities.

# ACE on Bridge

This week in ACE on Bridge, we will talk about preëmptive opening bids. First, let us define a preëmpt. The first part of the word is 'Pre' meaning 'Before or prior to'. The second part is 'empt'...

Now for those of you who didn't understand (I'm one of them), maybe I should go into a little better explanation. A preëmpt is designed to take away the opponents' bidding space so that they must describe their hands to each other with fewer bids to choose from. It is most effective to preëmpt with fewer points (within reason) because it is more likely that the opponents will bid game/slam and you may make it difficult for them to find the right place.

But everything is not a bed of roses. There is the occasional time that the opponents will be evil enough to double you and you go down for a telephone number, but the advantages of preëmpting far outweigh the disadvantages.

And now...for the explanation of the opening bids. (Responses are normally forcing for one round...asking partner what he/she thinks of the other suit as a proposal)

#### 2 $\Diamond / \heartsuit / \spadesuit - Weak Two bid'$

6 card suit - Should be fairly disciplined (2 of top 3 or 3 of 5), 5–10 High-Card Points, No side 4-card major

A lot of people say that you shouldn't open with a void either, but I don't go along with it. I advocate the theory that any excuse to preëmpt is a good excuse. As long as you think you can take 5 tricks with your own hand, it should be all right.

#### 3 $A/\Diamond/\heartsuit/A$ —'Evil Threes'

A new system on the scene that makes life very difficult for the opponents. The bids themselves aren't new, but the name is. The theory behind the opening is that you can have whatever you want in your hand, as long as, if doubled, you will go down only the value of their game. As long as you have less than 10 HCP's, it should really muck up the action for the defense. Discipline is recommended, but not necessary.

Suppose you had  $\bigstar JT987654 \heartsuit 2 \diamondsuit 32 \bigstar 32$ . You are Not Vulnerable vs. Vulnerable opponents. Don't you want to preëmpt them? Open 3 the and watch them squirm.

#### 4 A/O/O/A —'Forceful Fours'

Somewhat more disciplined than the Evil Threes, these bids are bid to show 8 (9) playing tricks in 1 or 2 suits. As such, most of the points should be in the Trump suit and very little defense against an opposing contract. The limit on this bid is around 12 points, but you can have more if the hand is appropriate. With points outside of the trump suit, open at the one level.

And that's about it. Aside from obvious things, like when to restrain the temptation, and when to lie just a little, and open a weak two with a 5 card suit, the basics have been laid out. Now let's see if we can get a little more action going in the Comfy lounge. Flash!

# The Joy of Pronking

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#### Beginning to Pronk
