Social Studies


Howdy, my name is Lori and I'm your Social Studies professor this term. I'm always open to new ideas for events and for volunteers to help with social events.

More of the Soup Saga

Dear Editor-Cook:

I tried the "Two Soup Spaghetti Sauce" recipe in the last issue of MathNEWS. May I suggest the following changes for a palatable soup/spaghetti sauce:

Replace the 1 cup of single serving tomato soup with 1 can of cooked tomatoes.

Fry the hamburger by itself in the frying pan until it looks done. If the pan is Teflon, use plastic utensils to avoid scratching the surface.

Transfer the hamburger to a pan with a snugly-fitting lid (possibly the same pan), and add all the other ingredients.

Instead of "crank the heat, all the way up", put the lid on the pan and set the burner at its lowest setting. Leave the mixture to simmer for forty-five minutes to an hour. This brings out the flavors without burning the food.

Serve and enjoy.

Suitable spices include oregano (if you feel Italian), tobasco sauce, peppers, chili powder (if you like it hot), and garlic.

Variations on this recipe can be tried by adding various vegetables, i.e. chopped onions (fry with the hamburger), kidney beans. Note: If you add the onions and beans, you obtain a chicken-flavored chili. The chicken soup may be omitted at the cook's discretion.

This soup counts as both a serving of vegetables and a serving of meat. If you serve this soup over pasta or with bread on the side, and with a glass of milk, you will be serving a square meal with servings from all four food groups.



Interview With the Dean

Dr. Jack Kalbfleisch became Dean of the Math Faculty in July, 1990. His former position was chair of the Department of Statistics and Actuarial Science.

mN: How eventful have your months as Dean been?

In the undergraduate program, we have begun to re-examine the first and second year core math courses, including the enriched sections. One concern is how the high school curriculum meshes with our early courses. There have been many changes in the high schools - that's one area that hasn't been static for a long time - and there is a wide variation among high schools. The University curriculum should also be influenced by the kind of program students want to pursue. There has been work on bylaws and policies of the university, for example, tenure and student appeals. The alt. news group was also an issue during this time, with the need to decide whether alt.sex and alt.cobol should be allowed on campus.

mN: How does the Dean's position compare with what you expected?

JK: I was acquainted with much of what went on. This is a different perspective than department chair, with a broader view of the Faculty and the University. It's quite busy here.

mN: What do you see as your responsibilities as Dean?

JK: A Dean should provide leadership in the research and educational activities of the Faculty. A Dean should promote discussion between departments and must interact with faculty and senior administration. It's interesting with a broad view of the Faculty and university. mN: What are your goals as Dean?

JK: To enhance the research and educational activities in the Faculty of Mathematics and the University. As they pertain to undergraduates, this means continuing to look for ways in which the faculty can better the needs of students. I think the objective of university is for the student to learn how to learn and how to go about that learning independantly. My philosophy is to try to promote that kind of approach by the students so that the onus is clearly on the students to do the learning. I sometimes wonder whether the highly structured approach of many assignments to be handed in, graded, and returned promotes this end. Students need to understand that it is their responsibility to master and understand the material. It is important to learn how to learn. Other skills developed here can become irrelevant in a short time

mN: How has the budget tightening at the University affected the Faculty?

JK: Adversely. There has been an increase in enrollment without a commensurate increase in funding and also without an increase in the faculty complement. There are larger classes and higher student-teacher ratios. Over the past few years there has been a substantial increase in research and research expectations, such as Centres of Excellence. There is funding coming in, but additional stresses also. The main effect is a Faculty stretched more than it was. It affects the quality of courses and education that we can deliver. The Faculty has responded well but budgets are a concern.

mN: What plans are there for upgrading facilities to improve the quality of education required?

JK: If you walk around the third floor, you can see things that were state of the art ten years ago. We are currently working on a plan for the Faculty for renewal of teaching equipment, mainly computer equipment. I would hope that in a maximum of two to three years, we will be able to have modern computing environments, such as X-Window terminals, available for undergraduate use.

mN: Some concern has been expressed regarding the usefulness of course evaluations. How important are they to the faculty? JK: 1 think there is much value in inviting students to have input, o express opinions about courses, and to provide feedback to instructors. The evaluations themselves are used as one aspect of assessing teaching effectiveness of faculty. It is important that we have a constructive process, and I think most faculty members value considered student input. The comments are communicated directly to the faculty member. I think the model is a good one; the faculty administered questionnaire invites constructive criticism. The questionnaire itself has evolved from discussions among faculty and students. If there are specific areas where students feel the process could be improved, the Faculty is certainly open to suggestions.

mN: Are there any new Math programs coming?

JK: No, but we are enhancing existing ones. In Chartered Accounting, for example, we are talking with the School of Accounting on how best Arts and Math Accounting can cooperate with program delivery and structure. We are also changing the accounting programs, brought about in part by suggestions from the professional bodies for Chartered Accounting and Management Accounting. In altering professional programs, it is important to use our judgment on changes while taking as input the opinions of the profession.





Dr. Movies Returns

The Terror Continues Or a Review of Once Around

Through out my movie reviewing career at mathNEWS, I have never been able to see a Sneak Preview that played the weekend before Production Night. My luck changed last weekend so I've come out of retirement to write a review that is published the actual day that the movie is released!!!

Even though people progress in life, they eventually complete a circle and return to a starting point. This idea is the premise in the movie Once Around. The movie focuses on the Bella family as they try to keep the family unified. However, a problem occurs when Renata (Holly Hunter) falls in love with a successful condo salesman, Sam (Richard Dreyfuss), who represents everything the family is against. As a result, a conflict occurs and the family must redefine their values to accommodate the relationship.

A major strength of this movie is the characters' depth and realism. This strength allows the audience to sympathize with the characters and even almost psychologically understand them as the characters undergo an emotional roller coaster. This quality is a result of Lasse Hallström's excellent directing, Malia Scotch Marmo's good script, and some fine acting. For example, the movie sometimes portrays Sam as both an arrogant, insensitive, selfish person and a caring, giving person. In addition, the movie portrays Renata's different sides. The result of these portrayals is a movie that explores such emotions as jealousy, love, and hate.

The main force in this movie is Holly Hunter; however, her performance would not be as effective if she was not supported with a strong cast. The best supporting members of this ensemble are Danny Aiello and Gena Rowlands as Renata's parents. For the most part, the script contains some excellent dialogue, but as the movie develops the relationship between Renata and Sam, the dialogue between the two seems unbelievable. The director's choice of filming the movie against a peaceful background adds more power, since the contrast emphasizes the characters and their emotions.

Once Again is a warm, "feel good" movie. Despite some bad dialogue at the beginning, I give this movie an 8 out of 10. When you see this movie, watch the background for disappearing ships.
