
To all you Math Grad wantabes, we have a little news for you all:


Co-op Job Opportunities In Japan

OK. Beginning in 1992, five to ten students will have the chance to go and work in Japan for a period of four to twelve months, depending on the situation. 


Well, if you answered yes to any or all of these questions, you may be suffering from what many University students refer to as "Heatus negatus", better known as burnout.

GreyhoundNet:

An intercity transportation guide for the compleat geek

Every day we in the computer field talk about the latest architectures, the nicest platforms, the fastest buses—yet for years we have been ignoring a very efficient, accessible, and, relatively speaking, cheap means of interfacing. I am referring to GreyhoundNet: a flexible, public-access network connecting wildly different platforms approaching the diversity of UNIX (U.I.A.R.T.O.A.T.T.B.L.I.)¹ and using the very latest in bus technology. The platforms are usually housed in easily accessible buildings near the centre of every major city, and most towns and villages throughout North America, and cost is based entirely on propagation distance.

All platforms and local networks of platforms (also called 'bus stations') on the continent are connected with ribbon wires made of asphalt or, occasionally, of gravel, which is cheaper than asphalt, but leads to larger propagation delays. Although both these media are notoriously poor conductors of electricity per se , the bus technology used in GreyhoundNet uses virtual current , which is to say that although the packets are dispatched from one platform and received at the other, no electricity is actually needed for the transfer. This permits the buses to travel more quickly than electricity, sometimes at speeds approaching that of light.

The result that GreyhoundNet achieves with this setup, connecting incredibly disparate platforms with ease and zero transmission errors ², is achieved by its transmission protocol: everything is transmitted in the form of one of two data structures, conventionally termed 'passengers' and 'baggage'. Normally, a baggage packet is associated with a passenger, but there exist provisions for baggage being transmitted on its own.

GreyhoundNet is also quite a cheap service, when compared to the alternatives. Cost comparisons are made in the fourth column of this series, but it suffices to say that it outperforms the alternatives of all varieties by a factor of 3 or more.

How to Write a Work Report

Know thine enemy! When the evil work report writing time comes you must be prepared to do battle. The work report writing guide recommends that you start working on your report half way through the term. However, if you start on the last week of the term, you should have plenty of time since, on average, it requires about 8 to 10 hours of work to write a "satisfactory" work report. For those keeners out there, a mark of "outstanding" can be had for a mere 100 hours of work. For your trouble, you will be eligible to win \$100. Note that that is \$1 for every hour of effort. Thus, your time is much better spent at the WatPub or putting in overtime to make real money.

Your work reports will likely be marked by an English grad student. Grammar, spelling, and punctuation are extremely important while the importance of factual data is near null as the artsie probably has no clue what you are talking about. But never fear, a good spelling and grammar checker will fool most of these guys. (They are, after all, only Waterloo English grads and will soon be replaced in the work force by the same grammar and spelling checkers anyway.) To really wow these guys, though, requires a lot of dazzle. Developing a new energy source will not impress these people without lots of graphs and diagrams, preferably in colour. They are also impressed by bulk. A report that makes the desk sag is a force to be reckoned with. But beware, he doesn't want to spend a lot of time reading this report so you have to keep the size to less than 2000 words. Three inch margins, quintuple spacing, 20 point fonts, and the odd blank page are good ways to pad out your report. The real secret to massive bulk, however, lies in the appendices.

The appendices are collections of data, source listings, etc. which substantiate your findings but which no one will ever read. So if, for example, you measure a quantity every second for four months you could report the average in your write-up and include the 10 368 000 line table in Appendix A. If you reference a manual, heck, there's Appendix B ... just staple it on. If you made a phone call then including the white pages in Appendix C is a must. And so on.

Binding is also important and despite what happened to Calvin, a clear plastic binder with an impressive colour photograph on your cover page will put you in the awards category every time. Your letter of submittal should be on company letterhead with a big colour logo in the corner. If your company doesn't have a good enough logo, use someone else's. Inconsistencies like this are rarely noticed by artsies with little concept of the real world.

To complete your work report just keep the following things in mind:

- Baffle them with bullshit.
- Spelling, grammar, and proper formatting are an order of magnitude more important than any facts or analysis.
- The bulkier the report, the better.
- Minimum effort for maximum marks.





This Week in Space

The Galileo science members have reported that data they acquired during its flyby of Venus nearly two years ago indicates that Venus likely has lightning storms occurring in its atmosphere. Galileo's plasma wave instrument took the measurements during its sling shot manoeuvre around Venus.

Galileo continues on its way to Jupiter where it will drop a probe into the planet's atmosphere. The high gain antenna on Galileo has not fully deployed, reducing significantly the amount of data it can transmit in a given amount of time. There are concerns that much of the mission data gathered at Jupiter will be lost due to the reduced bandwidth.

The Upper Atmosphere Research Satellite continues to undergo testing and all systems appear to function. Preliminary data confirms other research about the chemical processes which lead to ozone depletion. The UARS will provide scientists with a three dimensional global map of ozone and chlorine monoxide distribution.

The Magellan spacecraft continues to map Venus' surface, well beyond mission specifications. Using radar to penetrate Venus' thick clouds, Magellan is working well but continues to suffer several glitches. The spacecraft has suffered from overheating problems and must turn its radar away from the surface of the planet to let its sunward side cool. The craft has also suffered 15 spurious shutoffs (SSO's) of the high power transmitter, but fault protection, added by ground controllers, can now restore operation with no loss of data.

JPL researchers tested a mini-rover, Rocky III, designed to explore robotic exploration techniques. The robot is 52 pounds and contains geologic and atmospherics sensors, and cameras. It was tested in California's Death Valley, a surface which closely resembles the surface of Mars.

In Canadian news, Anik E-1, the sistership of the recently saved Anik E-2, was launched September 26 atop the Ariane 44P.

Planning for the shuttle's Hubble space telescope repair mission is well underway. In addition to the flawed mirror, the repair mission will also replace instruments, gyroscopes, and solar arrays on the spacecraft.
