To: Pure Math etc... Club From: Peter Hoffman Re: the Open Challenge





This Week in Space.

Friday November 8, NASA's Administrator for Procurement, Darleen Druyun, suspended Collins Commercial Avionics from further government contracts. The contractor and one present and one former employee were indicted on 15-counts of defrauding NASA for several years on production and repair of shuttle equipment. The two named employees, and others not named, billed NASA for work which was not performed and fraudulently inflated vouchers which had been sent to NASA for payment. If convicted, Rockwell (the parent company) could be fined \$7.5 million and the named individuals could be fined \$1.5 million and face a possible 30 year prison term. (The hammer? Oh that'll cost ya \$299.99. Ya that's the ticket.)

An IMAX film has been made from Magellan's radar imagery of Venus. The film's premier won rave reviews at the Magellan science briefing several weeks ago. (Hopefully we'll get a chance

to see it here in Canada.)

The big news this week comes from the Galileo mission team. They were able to download a low resolution black and white image of the asteroid. The asteroid is 8-10 km across, about the size of Oahu, has $1/2000^{ths}$ earths gravity and an escape velocity of 10 m/s. The asteroid exhibited features such as craters, ridges, and "grooves" similar to those seen on Phobos. The grooves appear to be fractures left by an impact which didn't quit break up Phobos.

Without the high gain antenna the image took 20 hours to transmit. If the antenna were deployed it would have taken one

minute.

Plans to free Galileo's stuck high-gain antenna, were detailed this week. They include a series of cooling manouvers which will shrink and expand the antenna components in the hope this will unjam them. To cool the antenna the spacecraft must be powered down to essential systems only and then be pointed away from the sun. This will mean a loss of contact with earth for up to 50 hours. The craft must turn back to face earth autonomously if any more commands are to be sent to it after the cool down period.




