

Faculty of Mathematics to the... Faculty of Mathematical and Computer Sciences

Last term, there was a recommendation from the Ad Hoc Committee to change our name to keep up with changing times and the broadening of the faculty (mainly w.r.t. computer sciences). The term "mathematical sciences" is being more widely used today by organizations such as The American Math. Society, NSERC, and a research centre at Berkeley: The Mathematical Sciences Research Institute (MSRI).

Basically, it is believed by the Ad Hoc Committee that mathematics just does not cover the breadth of our faculty. This will be the third time the faculty has attempted a name change; the first two times, the motion was defeated by the Senate.

This year will be the faculty of MATHEMATICS' 25th birth-day. It may not have a 26th, depending on how the vote goes at the next faculty meeting. I WOULD LIKE TO HEAR YOUR OPINION! Challenge in Guyana

I'm sorry to interrupt this humorous (although some would argue that) publication with a serious article, but it's important. My name is Rob Bell and I am a Math student on my 2B work term. Krista Lovrics, a third year physical geography student, and I, are going to Guyana in August of this year with Youth Challenge International (YCI). YCI is a non-profit organisation with international and youth development as its primary goals. To this end, YCI organises community service, medical and environmental projects in developing countries.

The selection process for the challengers was rigorous. First, we each submitted a four page application. Out of hundreds of applicants, about forty were selected to attend a forty-eight hour interview, during which we went winter camping north of Toronto. Both physical and mental skills were evaluated and about twenty-five central Canadians were selected. With about ten people from each coast included, there will be around fifty

young Canadians involved.

Joining us in Guyana will be fifteen Guyanese, five Costa Ricans and five Australians. Together we will take on projects such as: building schools or community centres; vaccinating and educating the Amerindian people; and helping to establish Guyana's first national park.

When we return, the final stage of our participation will begin. We are committed to sharing with others what we have learned, including one hundred hours of community work, and

presentations to schools and other interested parties.

Although the Canadian International Development Agency sponsors YCI to a great extent, each participant has to raise \$3000. In this area, we require help. Krista and I will be running events on campus this term in order to raise money. We could use your support. Our first event is a bake sale planned for Wednesday, February 19th, although the date is not firm yet. Any kind souls willing to sacrifice themselves for a good cause to buy some homemade goodies should check this periodical in two weeks for the accurate time. (Place will be the CC). Also, we could always use more bakers. If you have the time and energy to do such things, please feel free. Our next event is going to be a book sale so if you have any old textbooks or even real books that are just cluttering up your room then throw them our way. If you are interested in donating books, baked goods, money, time, suggestions or just finding out more about YCI, please contact me at 886-2229.


