Two weeks ago, on a Thursday afternoon, nine Act Sci students piled into a van headed for Quebec City. They were off to the ANEA/ASNA Conference. For those poor souls who was not able to attend, here is a brief summary of the weekend.

Friday afternoon we claimed our cool T-shirts (after Wayne talked us into more Congress tickets because he left ours safely at home) and met students from Laval, U of Montreal and Concordia while playing volleyball or wallyball (volleyball in a raquetball court). The evening's speaker described "Actuaries as seen by the Business World," which was basically encouragement to branch into non-traditional fields. (And the simultaneous translation which was offered for most sessions came in handy for the more anglophone of the group.) There were seven talks on Saturday, most of them running two

at a time (and behind schedule). I attended three.

The session on the entrepreneurial actuary was given by an actuary who owns a company with four partners. He said that there is no recipe for success, but that assets, both tangible (\$) and intangible (reputation, competence, and honesty), are a must.

The financial risks session was led by an actuary from Mercers in Ottawa. This seminar was in English. The speaker outlined approaches to evaluating financial risks. This was the most tech-

nical of the talks that I attended.

The last session I attended was about working in the U.S. The presenter was a graduate of Laval and works for Tillinghast in Chicago. He pinpointed which practice areas may hire Canadian actuarial students (depending on experience and exams) and how students can talk themselves into jobs in the States. Based on the questions posed by the audience, a number of Quebec students are actively searching for employment in the U.S.

Before feasting on dinner, we participated in the "actuarial" games of Win, Lose or dessin or University Feud. Two UW students on exchange at Laval this year deserve special mention as bilingual hosts of one of the Feud games. Saturday night was time to party (of course) at a bar in Old Quebec. Up til 4 a.m.

Improve Your Student Life

The "Endowment Fund Committee" has allocated over \$200 000 for student life projects to be undertaken between the Fall '92 and Summer '94 terms. Such funds have been available for the past 2 academic terms. Here's a sampling of some of the projects which the Committee has agreed to fund:

- The improvement (through renovation and/or purchase of new equipment) of the following student lounges: Math Students Lounge, SciSoc Offices & Student Lounge, Psychology Society Offices and Arts Student Union Lounge
- New lighting along 150 ft. of pathway leading to the Women's Residence of Renison College
- New lighting at St. Jerome's College
- New aerobic and weight equipment for the P.A.C.
- New equipment for the U.W. Archery, Fencing and Sailing Clubs

Although a "student life" project could very well include any non-academic student initiative, priorities for funding have been established through consultation with students as follows:

- The improvement of safety on campus
- The improvement of accessibility on campus
- The renovation of the current Campus Centre
- The improvement of current lounge and study spaces

This release is a call for submissions. Any recognized student organization (recognition is determined by the Federation of Students - see C.C. Rm. #219) can submit proposals for this funding. So what's so big about Japanese animation that some club with a funny name is showing six hours of it? Well, you've come to the right place my friend...


What IS Anime?

Japanime (Japanimation) is a style of animation oriented towards science fiction and adult audiences. It has a very specific style emphasising details and mature themes. The earliest example of Japanimation, Astro Boy, was taken from "Manga" - Japanese comic books - and became the first animated sci-fi TV series in 1962. The show's creator was an animator named Tazuka. Over the next two decades, many of his works were dubbed into English and presented as children's television shows. They included the film "Bird of Paradise," some 60's series such as Aqua-Lad and Kimba the Lion, Astro-Boy, and, in 1976, Starblazers.

Where did Anime Come From?

Starblazers foreshadowed the future of Anime. It was a science fiction saga originally entitled "Battleship Yamato" in Japanese after the famous and heroic ship of World War II which sacrificed itself to end allied bombing of Japan. The epic story lines, and characteristic tall slim forms, western features and doe eyes that typify the Japanime style had developed. Other series from the late 1970's were brought to the western audience; familiar titles may include G-Force, the Force Five series of giant mechanized robots: Grandizer, Gi-King, and the Spaceketeers. The collective society of Japan appreciated and admired nothing more than individual heroism of characters such as Astro-Boy, the pilots of the uper-robots, and the crew of the Yamato.

Home is in Your Head HIS NAME IS ALIVE

4AD (import, CAD 1013 CD)

On New Year's Eve I was watching The New Music as VJ's, in turn, delivered their single favourite video of 1992. Kim Clarke Champniss's choice was the reel for "Are We Still Married?" from His Name Is Alive. As I watched and listened, I thought: 'How wickedly and disturbingly gentle!' I knew that I must look into this group. I found the CD, on import, shortly after. The sound is like taking This Mortal Coil and reducing the number of instruments until the music is minimal. Add desperate lyrics to match the dirge-like music and there it is ... Music that is strictly personal, best suited for listening in a quiet, lonely place.

Erotica MADONNA

Maverick/Sire (CDW 45154)

Go ahead and laugh. There is nothing more amusing nowadays than listening to Madonna sing about bondage, vengence, and oral sex, while still feeling compelled to sensor the word "fuck". This is the stuff that teenage boys in puberty masturbate over. Ok, enough with the vulgarities. If you choose to go beyond this album's limitations, you'll see that this is a wonderful piece of work. Madonna still delivers the goods, this time with Shep Pettibone. Memories of "Chariots of Fire", "Blade Runner", "The Bounty", and "Antarctica" surfaced when I learned that Vangelis was composing the music for this movie. The instrumentation is natural in sound, except for the obvious synthesizers and effects. Add the luxury of including the English Chamber Choir, and the heart of the listener will melt. Listening to this soundtrack album and seeing the movie were among the best moments of 1992. These should not be missed!

Long-Term Load Forecast for U(W) Area

Issued Friday, January 29 by the mathNEWS Weather Office. For the next week, descartes' loads will be more or less regular, reaching highs of 16.0 during the day and lows of 2.3 during the evening. Cayley and napier should remain at around 4.9, with slight dips overnight. The zeno, mobius, and cantor systems should remain below 1.0 for most of the week, although cantor could experience slight GIF spikes at odd times.

Severe Load Warning

A severe load warning is being issued for the evening of Monday, Feb 1, just before a CS241 assignment becomes due. "Not Politically Correct" was written by Ric Dolphin with illustrations from CAM, and published by Stewart House. The Main Characters Actually Die?

In 1979 Mobile Suit Gundam appeared. Up until this time Japanese Animation had fallen into the trap of stereotypical story lines with predictable plots. The Gundam series shattered this conception of animated TV. The protagonist is psychotic, main characters died and villains won in graphically violent confrontations. It went on to become the most popular series in Japanese TV. It came to include a design for the Zeta Gundam ship by science fiction illustrator Sid Mead, and finally concluded half a decade later with "Char's Counterattack." Its popularity and originality awoke the public and the animators of Japan to the potential of animation. A creative explosion resulted. Exploration extended in every direction but the theme of epic science fiction proved most perfectly suited to this art form. With animation they could produce all of those special effects that are practically impossible in live action film media, and they did it with an incredible attention to detail, to the point where they sometimes have to slow things down just so that you can begin to catch everything that's going on.

Creative Genius

By 1985, 400 studios were cranking out anime. The genre occupied 30% of Prime time Japanese TV and included several feature films such as "Robot Carnival," a science fiction version of Fantasia, and "Macross: Do You Remember Love," a juiced up version of the climax of the Macross Saga. New artists had taken the forefront. A creative genius named Muzaki worked at the fantasy end of science fiction, producing such wondrous delights as "Nausicca and the Valley of the Wind" (which was lobotomized into "Warriors of the Wind" for English-speaking viewers), "Totoro," and "Laputa: Fortress in the Sky" which was presented for the U of W Film Society in Winter '92.

The Export of Anime

The twelve hour epic of the Macross Saga may be more familiar to us as the first third of the Robotech series in North America. The Japanese never created or conceived of these works as export material. That task was left to a few dedicated visionaries and entrepreneurs such as Harmony Gold Company. They combined three separate series - the Macross Saga, Southern Cross, and Mospedea - to form the Robotech series. This provided enough half hour episodes to allow syndication. Towards the end of the eighties Japanime shifted towards a preference for Archie comic book characters. However science fiction themes still existed in its darker forms such as in "Akira," and the A.D. Police series.

Presently for Japan, every possibility for animation has been exhaustively explored: they've seen it all. For us this treasure trove of some of the best science fiction and animation of our time is mostly beyond our reach. It is buried in the film archives of Japan or behind language barriers made worse by a severe rarity of translations...




