Editorial

Summer School

Did you have any problems getting into classes this term? Many students were stonewalled when they tried to register for a full courseload. The problem? They're not in Co-op.

Many courses, most notably C&O 230, 350, and upper-year STAT and CS courses, are closed to Regular (non Co-op) students in the Spring term. Traditionally, Regular students would not be taking courses in the spring, so this would not pose a problem. However, the current recession has left many students unable to find jobs this term, and many of these students find themselves in the Regular program, taking courses in the spring. In addition, there are an increasing number of students taking a "straight-through" program; i.e. eight terms in a row. The resulting increase of Spring-term Regular students has been dramatic enough that MathSoc is looking for [1234]N class reps this term.

One result of this policy is that some students who intended this to be their third (for example) full-time term on campus, find themselves unable to take courses which are prerequisites for courses for which they have signed up for the Fall. These students will likely have to stay an extra term in order to graduate in their intended program.

At this point some people point out that these students "are not supposed to be here." Exactly what dictates when a student should be allowed to take courses? The point is made that a large part of the Co-op fees help pay to keep the University open in the Spring (the government doesn't currently pay us during the Spring as they do in the Fall and Winter). While this is certainly true, it seems the Co-op fees should go to pay for the Co-op program. If it is necessary to gather additional fees to keep the University open in the Spring, these fees should be gathered separately, from any student taking courses in the Spring. It seems ironic that currently, a Co-op student working in K-W in the Spring is allowed to take one course, including the courses closed to Regular students, and doesn't pay the Co-op fees.

The problem to be addressed is that these Spring-term Regular students do not fall into any of the Co-op streams, nor the "normal" Regular stream of Fall, Winter. At the heart of this problem, it seems, is that a single terminology is being used for two distinct ideas: whether or not a student is in the Co-op program, and the terms in which the student takes a full courseload. Many of the Co-op programs are not the simple school, work alternation, and so the students not in Co-op should not be restricted to a particular school/no school pattern.

My proposal, then, is to either

- remove the idea that Regular students take classes in the Fall and Winter, and allow them to take a full courseload in any term. If necessary, a "Spring term fee" could replace part of the Co-op fee, or
- call the class of non-Co-op students taking courses only the Fall and Winter, "Regular," and create an additional designation for students who wish to go "straight-through" or take a full courseload at arbitrary times. A special fee for being in such a program could help cover the costs of University operations in the Spring.

This Faculty is displaying an ever-decreasing difference between the Spring term and the Fall and Winter terms. This change deserves to be noticed, and responded to.

During the first week of classes, The Math Society was not running as efficiently as it should have. According to the President, this was due to the usual beginning-of-term confusion and lack of volunteers (not to mention the absence of 2/3 of the Exec). A MathSoc volunteer stated on uw.general that because there was a lack of volunteers, he and two other Council members were doing the jobs of seven Directors, further bogging down MathSoc's efficiency.

This lack of volunteers also seemed to be noticed by several students unhappy with MathSoc's lack of office services, as the Society was inundated with complaints. Despite the attempt of two Council members posting to uw.general and suggesting that the complainers "be part of the solution instead of the problem," every person who complained to MathSoc about its lack of services has, as yet, not come forward to volunteer. No surprise to me. People who shoot their mouths off are usually the last to do anything about it. But then again, I'm an idealist.

On a related note, one student requested a refund of his Math-Soc fee, but he said he would continue to use all of MathSoc's services. Sorry to burst your bubble, buddy, but having your cake and eating it too just doesn't work in the world of Math-Soc. Good luck.

By the way, the President has admitted that she is seriously looking into hiring a full-time office secretary, much like the Engineers have done at the Orifice. Of course, the Math Society fee will have to increase at least \$3.50, or more, in order to pay for it.

In closing, last term's Council has admitted that petty theft in the office was a problem, and it has been reported to the Campus Police. More than \$400 was stolen over the whole term, including money and novelties. This term's Council has said that they have taken steps to prevent this from happening in the future.


KEEP IT SHORT!

Go to Fed Hall






