The play to this point was strange in itself, but the upcoming play was even stranger. Ace was to play from his hand, and he needed the rest of the tricks. See if you can find a way (with best defense) to accomplish this feat.
If not for that pesky Queen of spades, Ace could take the rest of the tricks on a cross ruff, but he can't do that anymore. Leading a diamond is useless, as we have to ruff high in dummy, and we are left with a diamond loser in our hand. Similarly, a small spade doesn't work, as the Count just throws a diamond, and Ace has to lose a trick, no matter what. BUT, look what happens if he leads the King of Spades. If the Count throws a diamond, Ace plays low from dummy, pulling the last trump, and ruffs a diamond making his 3 high. and he can ruff a club in hand to get to it. If the count, instead, throws a club, Ace overtakes the King with the Ace and ruffs a club, ruffs a diamond and the last club is good. Either way, Ace makes the rest of the tricks.

Again, the cards here could easily be switched around to make them represent a euchre deck. Perhaps there isn't such a difference between the games after all.

For all of you Euchre and Bridge fans out there, here's something for you. The next Euchre tourney will be on July 14th, and the next Bridge tourney on the 21st. Signups will be available on the bulletin board across from the $\mathrm{C}+\mathrm{D}$. Happy playing!
