## freeSTUFF

It has often seemed to me that if one were to try hard enough, one could live at $U(W)$ without ever having to provide for food or shelter. This term, I intend to try to demonstrate this, but I will need your help. This column will consist of listings of events which are offering free refreshments on or near campus, in the belief that if one knew of all such events happening you could gain all subsistence from them. So if you are aware of such an event, let us know and we will publicise it here. The only criterion are that attendance is free and not restricted to members-only, and that there are free refreshments served.

To begin the term (since I don't have many free events to announce) I will show that you don't actually need to rent a place to stay while on campus.

Sleeping areas abound. It is quite acceptable to spend the night sleeping in the Comfy Lounge. However, if you spend every night there, the caretakers begin to notice and may eventually evict you. This problem is easily solved by rotating to different lounges around campus - tonight the Comfy Lounge, tomorrow the Campus Centre, the night after in BC Matthews Hall, then ES, etc. The best way to do this is to always spend the same night of the week in the same building - that way they think you have a lab due that day or some such thing.

## MEFCom is Here!!

The Endowment Fund is here. Barely.
You know that thing you got in the mail in mid-January from the feds about $80 \%$ of which you threw away? Well, there was sufficient support, when included with the on-campus votes, for the Mathematics Endowment Fund to become a reality. The question now is, where do we go from here?

First of all, I would like to address the concerns of those people that voted against the Endowment Fund. If you do have a problem with the idea of an Endowment (apart from I don't want to pay the money), please get in touch with me through e-mail, or leave a note in MathSoc. A couple of tidbits along this line that I found out too late were not being effectively advertised: the Endowment will not only grow from student contributions, but also from Employer Matching Contributions, and Alumni Donations. In Engineering (which is the model on which we are patterning our Endowment), both their EMC and Alumni Donations are almost the same size as the student donations. This means, in Math, that for every donation YOU make, you are really donating three times as much. This means that for someone entering University in Fall, interest from their virtual donations will be approximately the same as the value of their donations. Neat eh?
Secondly, we have to contact several large businesses (computer companies, life insurance, etc.), and inform them of our plan, and invite them to come on board. This plan is currently in the works, and letters should be going out soon (hopefully).

Finally, the constitution has to be finalized and approved by the Board of Governors on June 7th.
The Endowment Fund will officially get rolling in Fall of this year, and hopefully it will not take too long to get everything in place to start seeing some real benefits from it.

Thank you to all of you who voted yes, and to Chris, Fuzzy and Vic who gave it their best, and to those who voted no and let me know why.
