If you are running a "C" shell (it's a good bet you are if you haven't gone and tried to change it) you can create a file called .logout. This script file will be exectued when you log out. If you add the line

clear

to this file your screen will be cleared automatically when you log out. (Now you won't have to hit return a dozen times to scroll everything off the screen.)

In my .logout I have the following:

clear

fortune

What this does it it clears the screen, displays a funny thought for the day, and then logs out. (Keep in mind that if you try this on an xterm, it won't hurt anything, but you won't have much time to read your message for the day.)
