

Library Reserves

Overcrowding in the Dana Porter Library has been a problem for years, and in 1991 a task force was set up to look at ways to alleviate the overcrowding and enable the Library to continue to provide effective service. Relocating reserves to an area elsewhere on campus, somewhere inside the ring road, was one of several recommendations from that group. Shortly after that task force had tabled its report, the Library learned that the committee developing plans for the Student Centre was accepting proposals from groups on campus interested in providing service in the new building. Over the years, the idea of combining Porter and Davis reserves had been raised. Once the Library began to seriously consider the opportunity provided by the Student Centre, the idea of combining both units and moving them there took on new life.

In the fall of 1992, representatives of the Library met with the Student Centre Committee to present a proposal that reserves from the two libraries be relocated to the Centre. The students on the Committee were enthusiastic about the proposal, particularly because they had already decided that the facility would include quiet study space and they saw the library reserves as a complement to those plans. Some students who use both libraries particularly liked the idea of being able to get all of their reserve readings in one place.

The move was seen as having other advantages to students as well. In particular, the Davis Library is exceptionally noisy and there is never enough student seating. Relocating reserves may cause both of these problems to diminish somewhat. Just what the traffic patterns will be once reserves is relocated remains to be seen.

Eventually, students on the Student Centre Committee voted on which of the proposals would be accepted and which would be rejected. The proposal to bring reserves to the new building was accepted.

The Library hopes to begin offering service in the Student Centre towards the end of April 1995. Other library services of particular value to undergraduates which might be provided in the future will also be explored.

The Library has established a team to develop, implement and administer plans for the provision of library services in the Student Centre. Team members include staff from several areas of the Library, one faculty member and two students, an undergraduate and a graduate. Because of their schedules the students now on the team may not be able to participate next term. Any student interested in joining the team and able to attend weekly meetings on Wednesday afternoons is invited to contact Susan Routliffe at ext. 3312.

The team began to meet in mid-October and determined that communication about the move was one of its highest priorities. The team is very interested in getting feedback which will help determine the best way to offer the service.

Information about the move has been posted to campus newsgroups and suggestion boxes have been placed in the reserves area of the Dana Porter and the Davis Center Libraries. Anyone interested in providing suggestions about the move is encouraged to contace. Email messages may be sent to LibReserves@library.uwaterloo.ca. Those without email may submit something in writing through the suggestion boxes referred to above or by sending it to Annette Dandyk, Library Office, Dana Porter Library.



This is an example of a strip-squeeze and endplay, as East was successively stripped of sidesuit exit cards, then he was squeezed down to the endposition. Now a diamond endplayed him. An excellent example of expert technique that anyone can do!

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Not too long ago, I found that I had been signed onto Unitel without my knowledge or consent. Having just received bills for the period I was unknowingly signed up with them, I called the credit department to ask for more information and to complain. I was put through to an extremely rude assistant who informed me that I had verbally agreed to be signed up. My memory told me that they had asked if I wanted information and I said okay, but that I did not want to be signed onto Unitel. They had assured me a couple of times that I would not be. I told this to the attendant and she said "it's just your word against big Unitel." After talking a bit more, she abruptly ended the phone call.

Immediately, I talked with my mother for advice, and she called Unitel to talk with them some more. After dealing with two very rude people, she talked with the manager of the credit department. He informed her that Unitel's standard practice is to call, asking if you want information. If you answer yes to this, you have agreed to be entered into the first stage of being signed up for Unitel. The second stage involves being called a few days later to confirm being on Unitel. The credit manager admitted that anyone who happens to pick up the phone for you and agrees will sign you onto Unitel, and he sees this as a weakness, but is not currently working to fix this problem.

Yes, Unitel is a big company, but working together, we can make a difference in getting justice. To find out which company your long distance is being billed to, you can call the toll-free number 1-700-555-4141. If you have been signed to Unitel without your consent, write to Bell to tell them your story and to Unitel to complain. Write to the CRTC (Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission) – call the operator or directory assistance for the information, as I have not yet managed to secure the information. And talk to the Better Business Bureau. Yes, increased competition may help us all as consumers, but the unethical practices of Unitel deceive and hurt us all.





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
