### The State of the Math Endowment Fund

Something is different in the faculty this term, and it is called the Math Endowment Fund (MEF).

My name is gus and I am the Director of MEF for the Winter term of 1995. Nominations closed last week and I was the chosen one. However nominations are still open for the Summer and Fall Directorships, so make an effort, get a nomination form found on the MEF office door, which is MC 4046.

MEF is now offering its positions on its Funding Council to any interested candidates. Nominations open today, and Nomination Forms are also available on the door of the MEF office, MC 4046. See if you are interested, by reading this article.

#### I am endowed

MEF is our newest tool in battling the cutbacks that the University and the government has been proposing. In the past few years, we have noticed the disappearance of some courses, some lousy TA's, failing equipment, and limited supplies and tools for courses (i.e. course notes, few references).

Upon seeing this, a few students sat down and created the MEF.

#### Power to the Students

All decisions where the money is spent is decided by the MEF Funding Council, which is consists of a student majority, and some interested faculty members. If you are interested in getting involved in the workings of the faculty, then this is an ideal opportunity for you.

The **MEF Funding Council** is the council responsible for the Endowment Fund. The Funding Council shall decide the allocation of the interest from the MEF, and which projects are worthy, and which are not. The existence of this committee was passed last Spring along with the MEF by the University Board of Governors. We are not linked with MathSoc, nor are we classified as a club. We were approved by the University because a few ambitious students decided to take the funding crisis at this University and in this Faculty into their own hands.

That is exactly where it all is: In our hands. The Funding Council will constitute of mostly student representatives who will evaluate each funding proposal as it comes, and approve or disapprove of the decision.

#### What to do with \$110,000+

What can we do for you? The goal is to get this faculty working again: training TA's, updating departmental equipment, expanding resources and teaching aids, funding progressive courses, or simply to avoid the harsh effects of government cutbacks.

Currently, we have about \$126,000 in MEF, and although in the following weeks this number will fall due to the increasing amount of refunds of the Voluntary Student Contribution, that fund is bound to only grow in the years and decades to come.

Thinking about it again, \$31.42 does not seem like all that much of a contribution.

Have your say.

- Get nominated for the Directorship of the MEF. Nominations open February 16th, and close March 3rd, and forms are available at the MEF office MC 4046.
- Get nominated to the Funding Council. There are numerous positions, with numerous possibilities. There exist positions for every stream of every year, and from every department within the Faculty. Make this a fair representation, and get involved. Grab a nomination form from MC 4046, and slip it under the door when completed, or submit it to our mailbox in the Math Society office.
- Come on out to our meetings in MC 4067 on Fridays, at 4:30 pm.

## UNIX Tip of the Week

This week's tip is don't hit the terminals; save your energy for things that really deserve it. (Try hitting the person next to you; if they log off, the machine load will go down.)

Actually, while I'm on to the matter of terminals, for those of you who use the wy99gt terminals in the Cayley lab, please, please, please don't change the settings on the terminals unless you know what you're doing. I spend a *lot* of time trying to get them working just because someone thought they knew how to configure them. (And I'm only a fellow student—they don't pay me to do these things.) If you really feel convinced that your terminal needs help, keep in mind that they should be set for seven data bits, and two stop bits. (This comes up as "7/2" on the appropriate menu option.) As well, the school seems to have those terminals set with a vt100 "personality"—so don't go changing them to something else (like a more sensible "wy99gt" personality—it doesn't seem to work right.)

For those of you who do use the wy99gt terminals, make sure you tell the system that you're using a wy99 terminal—if you don't you're almost definitely going to run in to trouble when you try to do anything fancy —say like using a fancy editor. The place you do this is at the prompt you get while logging in—no, it's not there for the sole purpose of delaying your login. One of the things you might want to do (if you haven't already) is edit your .cshrc and change the default prompt (for a sytek login) to be wy99 instead of the kd404 terminal that it is currently set to. (Do a search for "kd404", and you'll find the right spot.) That way when you log in from the Cayley lab all you have to do is press ENTER to continue logging in. Those of you who exclusively use the X-terms, you don't have to worry about all that.

Hope that helps make life simpler.

## FAQ: Frequently Asked Questions about the Mathematics Endowment Fund

Q: What is an endowment fund?

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- A: An endowment fund is an interest-bearing account. Donations are collected and pooled into a common account. This account (capital) is never spent. Only the interest from this account is spent. With continuous contributions the capital will continue to grow and subsequently the spendable interest will be larger and larger at the end of every year.
- Q: What is the Voluntary Student Contribution?
- A: The Voluntary Student Contribution for mathematics students is found on your fee statements. It is the Mathematics Endowment Fund, abbreviated MEF. It is collected at the beginning of each term by Needles Hall.
- Q: How was the amount of \$31.42 arrived at?
- A: To make the amount both affordable and to give it some mathematical reference the value of  $10\pi$  was used.
- Q: How long has the Mathematics Endowment Fund been in existence?
- A: It has taken about 2 years since the idea was initially formulated in the Summer of 1993 by fellow Math undergraduate students. The Voluntary Student Contributions have only been collected as of Fall 1994. So this term, Winter 1995 is the second term that the \$31.42 has been collected. The Mathematics Endowment Fund is separate from the Mathematics Society (MathSoc).
- Q: Why is it called the Voluntary Student Contribution and not the Mathematics Endowment Fund (MEF)?
- A: The reason that it is called the Voluntary Student Contribution (VSC) and not the Mathematics Endowment Fund (MEF) is that VSC is the naming convention used by Needles Hall for the various endowment funds around campus. The present board of directors is attempting to change VSC to Mathematics Endowment Fund.
- Q: Who else has an endowment fund?
- A: Around campus there are a number of endowment funds. The first fund was the Waterloo Engineering Endowment Fund (WEEF). It started collecting funds in 1991. The amount collected by the engineers on a termly basis is \$75. There is also the Waterloo Science Endowment Fund (Wat-SEF) and collects \$45 a term from Science students. The accountants also have a common fund which is a little different from an endowment fund where part of the capital is spend each term as well as all interest accumulated. They also ask for \$75 each term from both Math and Arts accounting students. It is interesting to note that the Engineering endowment fund, while only having run since 1991 and while asking \$75 a term have amassed a capital sum of over \$1.7 million. Other notable endowment funds include Princeton University's which exceeds \$2.6 billion dollars (US, of course).

- Q: How will the money be spent?
- A: This is one of the most important questions. The money will only be spent on academic projects. "Projects to enhance the academic life for mathematics students at the University of Waterloo." This will include, but not be limited to such topics as; funded course notes, extended library materials, extended computer facilities, a tutor training program, a 3rd and 4th year tutorial center and other submitted suggestions. This is not to say that we will be seeing all these improvements to math academic life immediately. Since we have only been in operation for about 5 months, the spendable interest is modest. But these suggestions for MEF funded projects are not unreasonable.
- Q: Who can submit funding suggestions?
- A: All math undergraduate students as well as all professors teaching math faculty related courses. Funding guidelines and suggestions submission forms are available at the Mathematics Endowment Fund office MC4046. You can also email mefcom@undergrad.math.
- Q: Who chooses what to spend the money on?
- A: All submissions will be reviewed and recommended by the funding council. This council is composed mainly of undergraduate students (2 per department as well as nonspecialist and math general) as well as a faculty representative from each department and 2 alumni as recommended by the Dean of Mathematics. The funding council will give their recommendation to the board of directors made up of the endowment director, the Dean of Math, 1 alumni representative and 4 student representatives.
- Q: How can I find out more about the Mathematics Endowment Fund?
- A: To see the constitution and the by-laws of the Mathematics Endowment Fund you can: drop in to the MEF office MC4046 x5757, send an e-mail to mefcom@undergrad.math or drop in on one of our meetings. This term the meetings are held in MC4067 4:30pm on Fridays. In the near future there will be a Mathematics Endowment Fund World Wide Web home page. A good place for discussion of MEF is on the newsgroup uw.math.ugrad.

# Bridging the Gap

Be nice to your opponents! Sometimes, you will need their help in making your contract. A example of this comes to us from the UWBC Duplicate of January 26th.

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North has a difficult choice of call over two spades; three diamonds seems like an underbid, and nothing else is really appealing. Over three spades, South probably should have bid four diamonds, but at matchpoints, three no-trump is appealing (although without first-round controls, I would say that it's closer to appalling).

A spade opening lead went to the ace, and the eight of spades was returned to the king, West following small. Having little hope for the contract, declarer now led a diamond to the king, and a heart off the table. East rose with the ace, and played the queen of spades. This blocked the suit. He played another spade now, and the best West could do was to return a diamond. Dummy had discarded a diamond and two hearts, and declarer a club.

Declarer won the diamond, and ran the diamond suit, discarding a club from dummy on the last round. At this point, South had the king of hearts and Q-9 in clubs, and North J-x in hearts and the ace of clubs. What could West do? He was the victim of a Criss-Cross squeeze.

A nice example of declarer play, but where did the defence go wrong? East should have returned a lower spade at trick two, to let his partner know the location of the queen (the eight looks like it's denying a higher card). Also, West could have unblocked the jack under the king, but I find this play a little deep. Perhaps he should have led the jack in the first place...
