

South was playing an opening bid of one no-trump showing 15-17 points. However, he was a pathological liar and also liked to play the hand. West stuck in a bid showing two suits of the same colour because she was bored. North transferred to spades and then bid four diamonds to show first round control of the suit. Since it was the Comfy Lounge, South bid the slam.

Now that you are in six spades, how do you make it? West has two suits of the same colour. If she has 4 spades, it is impossible to make this contract, so assume that she has hearts and diamonds. Even if you find the queen of spades, you still have only eleven tricks so you are one short. This means that you will need a squeeze to get your twelfth trick. In order to do a squeeze you need to duck this trick so that somebody will have too many cards in their hand later.

To make this hand, you must also assume that West has at least 5 cards in hearts and diamonds. If this is not the case, East will be able to protect one of the suits and the squeeze will not occur.

Accordingly, you duck the first trick. West now switches to a small heart. You win this with the ace and cross to the diamond ace. Finesse the spade ten since West is likely to be short. Cash the spade king, trump a diamond and play all but one of the spades from dummy ending with the following position:

If at this point you play the club to the ace, West will have a painful decision to make. She can either discard a diamond, in which case South would trump a diamond and have the king of hearts as an entry, or she can discard a heart. Then South would play the king of hearts setting up the three making dummy high.

Executive Decision

Kurt Russell (Stargate) and Steven Seagal (Under Siege) play the roles of a Washington bureaucrat and a hard-nosed military man in this entertaining action flick. Last weekend, MathSoc ran "The Game", and I wrote all the puzzles. It was a real learning experience. I learned what not to do.

I learned not to make the puzzles so convoluted. I learned not to underestimate how long the teams will take to solve convoluted puzzles. I learned that just because you have checked a puzzle for errors, and found none, does not imply that there were no errors to find. I had most of the photocopies of the puzzle pages complete, but they were not put into their proper packages because I had forgotten to reset my answering machine message before I left that morning at 10:00. This will be funny later, I promise. For this reason I was running late, and so when the first team, the Chemistry Club, arrived promptly at 1:00 as scheduled, we were still stuffing envelopes. We hadn't had time to photocopy the rules for distribution, so Jared stood on the big chair in the MathSoc office (yes, the one with the wheel that falls out) and read them aloud. At about 1:15 we sent our first team out, The Team of Two.

Spaced ten minutes apart, the other teams were given their first packages and sent on their way. The first package contained a page with a cryptogram with the heading "This is a simple cipher substitution." (This puzzle can be found on the back page.) They also received a strip of adding machine tape that had been ripped to pieces and a cross sums puzzle. The idea was that solving the crypt would tell them where to pick up their next package. Once at the first station, they received a cassette that contained a Morse Code message and about ten songs (which they were destined not to use). There was also a half-sheet of paper with an untitled puzzle (also found on our back page) that they would use later. This sent them to the East Campus Hall parking lot, where our very own D.K. Gardiner was sent to wait. For three hours. He took it well, though. These were apparently the last puzzles that would go smoothly.

To complete the first four sets of puzzles required several hints and six hours. I thought that the entire list of eight puzzles would take four at the outside. After the fourth puzzle started to take forever to complete, we decided that we had to cut it short. The Chemistry Club team had already solved the fourth puzzle so we told them that instead of solving the fifth puzzle, getting a location and going there, come to MathSoc instead. They solved some puzzles and put them together to get a phone number. My phone number, with the new answering machine message. Except that it broke. The Chem Club phoned the clue hotline saying, "Is your guy there snoozing or what?" 
