I thought I'd give all you lovely, beautiful people out there an update as to what the Dean of Math Nominating Committee is up to these days.



This means we need a new Dean to lead us through the maze that's the University and to the magical pot of gold at the end of the rainbow (or a degree I suppose). Anyway, the DoMNC's job is to find the best person for the job.

The next question that I'm sure is on your mind is: Why do I care? Well, the Dean of Math is basically the head of the Faculty. He's the one who sets the tone, and acts as the representative of the Faculty to a whole bunch of people, including the other Faculties and to the University Administration. Basically, as some of those we've been hanging around the third floor this term would put it, "The Dean? Well, he the Man."

Having said that, let me tell you what we've done so far, and what we're doing next. ## Life in Korea

Volume 2

...And life goes on. Here are some more sights, sounds, and experiences from the other side of the globe:

### Wacky English

Remember when the Karate Kid and Ninja movies were all the rage and everyone was wearing shirts, hats, and especially headbands with Chinese or Japanese symbols on them, but had no idea what they meant? The oriental writing just looked so "cool"? Well, it's the same way here, but with English. As a result, we see the strangest things written in various places, especially on stationery. (Koreans seem to love to buy huge amounts of stationery supplies, judging by the half dozen successful stationery stores in Hamyang). Here are some examples, ranging from simple typos to incomprehensible philosophical statements.

#### - MY FRIEND

You and I have to love long long. It is I get to road to you deared face.

- I like to stay in touch with my lived ones.
- Boy went to the toilet walk with hurried steps "Mammy, waste paper!!"
- He picked a lock. Just moment "BOO", "DEAR ME!" (Who knows him?)
- An earnest man come to me still mine.

  Some where silent nod I am closing
  the door you stare at me with alone eyes calmly.
- When you problem, Remember I'll always beside you We are friend forever We play together all the time

More traffic follies (Actually witnessed by us):

- a man riding his big old Schwinn bicycle in the pouring rain holding a huge umbrella in his left hand
- 2 teenagers riding a moped in the rain; the driver steering with one hand while holding an umbrella in the other, the passenger not holding on at all because he was carrying a pizza off to one side with both hands
- late in the evening, a car stops in the middle of an intersection. A big guy gets out of the back, drags a much smaller man out of the driver's seat, and proceeds to yell at him loudly while throwing him repeatedly against a brick wall. Then they both get back in their seats and drive away.

## More food

- at a restaurant we had *sora* a large edible sea snail (bland and chewy) for which our apartment building is named (Sora Aparta)

- I drank a can of Pocari Sweat, some sort of sports drink (I don't know what a *pocari* is, nor do I want to).
- A man sells fresh crab from the back of a pickup truck parked on the sidewalk in the main intersection some nights.
   Other nights there is a man selling a huge array of plush animals spread along the sidewalk lit up with portable flood-lights
- Korean food delivered by restaurants is brought to you in a large metal box by a man on a moped. The food is in non-disposable plastic dishes with metal cutlery, all of which you place outside on your doorstep after the meal and the man comes back later and takes them away. (We say that we are putting out our dirty dishes for the Dish Fairy to clean).
- we went out for eel (okay but they fed us too much) and sushi (raw sliced fish with almost no flavour of its own served with sauces which we did not find tasty).

### Holidays

Christmas is a very minor holiday here; only one day off (the 25th) and no awareness of such things as Xmas Eve or Boxing Day, both of which were teaching days for us. The stationery stores do get into the act, however, selling all kinds of wacky Xmas cards. Our Xmas vacation took place the week after, because the 1st and 2nd were already holidays (that's right, two of our "vacation" days fell on national holidays). During our vacation we went to Pusan (the nearest metropolis) to buy English novels and eat non-Korean food. It took us two days, but we actually managed to find 2 stores selling English novels and one restaurant with Italian food. We also took a tour of "Russian Town", a neighbourhood where many Russian sailors shop for consumer goods to sell back home. Many of the stores have bilingual signs (Korean and Russian) and we were mistaken for Russians by a real Russky because of my Russian-style fur hat (he addressed us in Russian but apologized in English when he realized we weren't comrades).

The big holiday here was it Sollal (lunar new year), which fell on the first week of February. We had no plans and most stores were closed so we went to Pusan to visit Mr. Lee's relatives. They spent Saturday morning worshipping their late ancestors in an elaborate ceremony. They spread out a great variety of fancy foods on a big table and then said prayers offering the food to each generation of ancestors while doing huge bows. They also bowed to their oldest living ancestors, and we bowed as well since "they are older than our parents and our family isn't here for us to bow to". The kids were rewarded with cash for bowing but we didn't get any. They served the same holiday foods for every meal and snack for three days, so although we thought they were good at first, by Sunday we were quite sick of them. We went sightseeing around Pusan from the back of a van for several hours, with one short stop to get out and look over the ocean and one long stop to eat lunch (and get drunk) in the back of the van.

You know, come to think of it, I really don't feel like knocking people this time. I think I will instead thank some people who have made a difference during my relatively short tenure at UW.


First and foremost, I'd like to thank all of the friends that I have made during my stay here, and all those I had known long before I got here. It's people like you that make life bearable, even enjoyable.

# gnomicGNUS

### Gnomic?

For the terminally out of touch, Gnomic is a game of the type I call Rule-Playing Games. For the past seven months, it has been an ongoing experiment in self-modification. In the process of playing the game, the nature of the game itself is changed, according to the wishes of the players. It can become as interesting and fanciful and challenging as the people participating in it.

The past few issues of mathNEWS have contained articles covering various facets of the game as it is being played right now — Gnomic. In this article, I will talk about Nomics in general, and some other self-modifying games which may be of interest to Nomicheads and like-minded individuals.

#### Nomic

Classical Nomic was first invented by Peter Suber and popularized by Douglas Hofstadter (of Godel-Escher-Bach fame) in his Scientific American column "Metamagical Themas". It consists of 29 rules, 16 of the (misnamed) "Immutable" type and 13 "Mutable". It describes, in as simplified a way as possible, how to go about playing the game. Initially, the game consists of little more than taking turns one at a time to propose changes to the rules, and having them voted upon. Pretty boring, huh? Well, that's the point. Peter Suber says that he deliberately made the initial game fairly bland so that players would have an incentive to make it more interesting by adding amusing or complex rules.

Part of what makes Suber's initial set interesting is its attempt to model legal and law-making systems of government. It was, originally, intended as an example to teach the concept of self-amendment in these systems to law students, and as an example in his book on self-amendment in law. Thus, the various tiers of mutability mimic constitution as compared with mere laws, or bylaws; judgement is available to interpret rules which are ambiguous or contradict other rules, and so forth.

Sometimes, though, the original Suber ruleset is not enough, or doesn't quite do what players want from their initial set: sometimes players don't want to spend the time to modify the game enough to provide the framework for play that they really really want. So a common pastime among Nomic players has been the creation of initial rulesets having various different philosophies from the original. There are minimal rulesets (with as few as 2 rules, or even 0 for the daring few), object-oriented rulesets for the sophisticate, legalistic rulesets for the aspiring lawyer in each of us, and more different types of initial set than you could shake a stick at. In my 3 years as a founding member of my high-school's Nomic Club, we went through about 5 initial sets, some quite close to Suber's concept, others not so close. One was a multi-tiered legalistic document that stretched to over 20 pages.

These kind of experiments show that the concept of a self-modifying game has some kind of intrinsic appeal. There is something about a game which changes during play that people find fascinating.

#### Internomic

a huge explosion in play-by-email or web-based Nomics. Most of these are played on mailing-lists on which the players discuss rule changes and conduct official business. Many of them also have web pages which keep lists of players, rules, and miscellaneous things which the rules may have created along the way.

With these many Nomics in play, it was inevitable that someone should take the concept to the next step: Internomic. Internomic is a nomic in which the players are themselves nomics. It is intended to model the United Nations, whose members are countries with their own legal codes and systems of government. Internomic has not existed very long, but already it is beginning to explore some of the paradoxes implicit in its nature: it has joined itself as a member.

Another experiment with the concept of meta-nomics is the United Nomics — so far nonexistent. Some of its interesting features are the ability to trade from one game to another ... even if the rule which makes an object meaningful in one game doesn't exist in another. The problems this creates will no doubt be vast: nomic is far more complex than almost any other game, once it has been in play for more than a few months, and the paradoxes of this trade are far more severe and difficult to resolve than getting a trump card from a bridge game in your poker hand.

As the Internet grows, and Nomics become more popular, we will probably see some very strange experiments in self-modifying games of all scales. Given Nomic's tendency to spread out and try to include everything it can find, we will probably see things I can't even begin to imagine now.

#### The Nameless Game

There is a bizarrely popular card-game in which the rules of the game are secret, and must be learned by each player by trial and error, and the winner of each hand can introduce a new rule, also secret. Some people find it infuriating and unplayable, but others have an incurable addiction to this puzzling game. Some see it as an almost total metaphor for life in general, in which the rules have to be learned, and in which mastery of those rules gives one power to change them. Some just find it frustrating and cruel.

However you see it, this game is an example of the fascination that self-modifying games have for some people, and also illustrates an interesting point about laws and social conventions. Quite often we follow rules or conventions which are never written down, or even if they are, are vague and unclear. No two interpretations of these rules will ever be exactly the same, and when we teach them to others — as when the Game is taught by those who have learned it by their own experience — they are often passed along in some distorted or mutated form. There are easily a few dozen different variations of the game, and even playing the same variant, players are often confronted by situations that challenge their understandings of what the rules actually are, and how they apply to situations they might never have foreseen. In this, the game is just like Nomic, and just like the legal system.




