That's how much money MEF has available to be spent this term. How we spend the money is entirely up to you, the students. If there is a project you think is worthy of being funded, you can submit your proposal to MEF by filling out one of the forms available on the MEF office door.

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Once you submit a proposal it goes before the Funding Council, who decide whether or not the project will benefit the undergraduate students in the Faculty of Mathematics at Waterloo. In the past, MEF has funded (in part or in whole):

- the purchase of two undergrad servers for MFCF
- the salaries of grad students to construct Algebra lab in MatLab
- partial funding for the Canadian Undergraduate Mathematics Conference
- improvements to the MGC grad school library
- improvements to the MathSoc exam bank
- partial funding for ASNA/ANEA conference


Rube Miller, the PCSC's most famous and most elusive member is very fond of creating computer games. One of the items on file in the PCSC computer system is the first computer game Rube ever wrote, "The Caverns of Terror" (written for the VIC 20), which he wrote while he was a student at U(W). Caverns is a role playing game in which the player is dumped into a system of 12 caverns (shown below), each bearing a different name relating to the colour of the walls.
