"What's Happening to my Tuition?"

Students all across Ontario have been asking this question ever since the provincial government announced deregulation of tuition fees for the coming school year. Few have received satisfactory answers. "There have been so many changes lately, it's hard not to be confused about deregulation. We want to help students understand what's going on, and allay some of their fears if we can," says Federation of Students VP Education (and Math student) Robin Stewart. To this end, the Feds will be holding a Deregulation Forum to explain the policies guiding tuition increases and deregulation, and what they mean for students. The forum will be held on Wednesday, July 15th at 5 pm in Arts Lecture Hall room 105.

Stewart will be joined at the forum by UW Vice President Academic and Provost Jim Kalbfleisch, and others. Following speaker presentations will be a question and answer period, where students will have the opportunity to debate with the speakers and have concerns addressed truthfully and intelligently. All members of the UW community are invited to attend.

To increase the number of graduates in high demand technical fields, the provincial government recently said it will allow deregulation of undergraduate computer science and engineering programs at universities who double the number of students accepted into these programs by 2000. Fortunately for Waterloo students, such a massive increase in volume is out of the question. "Since UW already has such high enrollment in these programs, doubling class sizes in such a short time span is unfeasible," says Stewart. Instead, UW said it could increase enrollment in these programs by 30 per cent by 2000, but the government rejected the proposal. "That means that these programs are safe from deregulation, at least for now," notes Stewart.

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While undergraduate math students don't have to worry about deregulation just yet, tuition fees for all graduate and professional level programs are being deregulated this year. This means that universities can set tuition to whatever amount they feel is appropriate. Many students across Ontario will be facing tuition increases of up to 150 per cent this September, though "the announcement wasn't in time to be incorporated into UW's 1998-99 fee schedule," notes Stewart.

The provincial government has cut \$529 million in educational funding since 1993. As a result, universities have undergone massive budget cuts, despite ever-increasing tuition. Deregulation allows the province to transfer responsibility for educational funding away from itself.

Food for Thought

The Faculty of Mathematics, in response to media pundits claiming that math students have no life skills, introduces the following courses.

EAT 131: Introduction to Eating

This class teaches the fundamentals of eating. Topics include using forks to move food to one's mouth and the proper mechanics of chewing.

EAT 141: Advanced Eating

This course is intended for students with some background in eating. Covers the same topics that EAT 131 does, but in more detail.

EAT 135: Introduction to Drinking

This class covers topics including drinking from glasses and cups. The proper way to transfer liquids into your mouth is emphasized.

EAT 145: Advanced Drinking

This course is intended for students with some background in drinking. Covers the same topics as EAT 135 but in a more advanced way.

EAT 232: Soup

The different methods of eating soup are discussed, such as when to use a soup spoon and when to drink from the bowl.

EAT 235: Drinking Alcohol

This course emphasizes drinking in bars. Topics include overcoming the difficulty of moving alcohol while drunk and knowing your limit.

EAT 251: Chopsticks

The proper technique for eating food with chopsticks is the emphasis of this course. Both wooden and plastic chopsticks will be used.

EAT 281: Italian Food

This course introduces the student to the nuances of eating Italian food. Lasagna, Spaghetti and Manicotti are covered.

EAT 282: Chinese Food

This course introduces the student to Chinese food. EAT 251 is a prerequisite.

EAT 283: Buffet

Topics of discussion include how much food to put on your plate and how many times up to the buffet is too many.

EAT 345: Straws and Umbrellas

Continuing from EAT 135, this course covers the use of straws and what to do with the umbrella served with some drinks.

EAT 351: Spoon Theory

This course emphasizes the differences between the soup spoon, dessert spoon and the tea spoon, and the correct time to use each.

EAT 361: Forks 1

This course is the first course in a two part course on forks. The differences between dinner forks and salad forks is discussed.

EAT 362: Forks 2

Continuing from EAT 361, this course introduces the dessert fork and the seafood fork.

EAT 371: Fun with Knives

The differences between a butter knife and a steak knife are emphasized, along with the proper way to use a jack-knife when in a pinch.

EAT 381: Appetizers

Topics include whether to nibble on appetizers or to eat them whole, and the quantity of food one should eat before the main course.

EAT 383: Dessert

This course covers techniques in eating many different kinds of desserts. Foods discussed include ice cream, pies (of many different types), cake and pudding.

EAT 441: Eating Mishaps

Topics include what to do when food falls in your lap and onto the floor. When and how to apply the 'Five Second Rule' is covered.

EAT 442: Eating by Candlelight

This course teaches the student to eat in low-light conditions.

EAT 443: Dinner Conversation

This course introduces talking while eating. Achieving a subtle balance between eating and talking, and what dinner topics to avoid are covered.

EAT 481: Getting People to Cook for you

What good is eating if you can't cook? Other courses teach cooking skills; this course teaches you how to manipulate cooks to cook for you.

EAT 493: Issues in Eating

This discussion course is designed to stimulate and foster a continued interest in eating after graduation. Questions discussed include whether one should eat Chunky's with a fork or a spoon.
