Henry Bowler acquitted in bank robbery

"Mentos" defence used for first time in Canada

Henry Bowler walked out of court yesterday evening a free man. After only 20 minutes of deliberation, a Jury acquitted him on charges of robbery on grounds that he was "under the influence of a breath mint."

Bowler's ordeal began Janu ary 15th outside the Student Life Centre at the University of Waterloo. "I was just about to take this girl I'd picked up, to the bar for a drink," he describes, "when I realized I didn't have any

CBC uses Freedom of Information Act to get copy of seventh-grader's biology report

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation is slowly moving to the forefront in reporting science

Using the Freedom of Information Act, the CBC has acquired the long-sought "Breeding Fish" report written by seventh grader, Stacey Moss.

"The Freedom of Information Act was legislated for exactly these reasons," said CBC spokeperson Amy Dole. "The biology teacher in question recklessly and purposefully buried the report in an effort to hide it from the media's eyes."

Moss' teacher, Dana Corley, said she was not aware of any outside interest in the report, which she gave a B+.

The report, which has several lines blacked out for security or privacy reasons, urges fish-owners to purchase special "pregnancy tents" for their fish when they start to breed. Otherwise, the fish may eat the baby fish.

edy of the death of John F. Kennedy Jr. the son of a former U.S. president by the same name, there are some who doubt the government's statement that the crash was accidental. One of these people, Mrs. Edna Pratt of Arva, Ontario is in the process of writing a book detailing her theory of how the crash took

"We see at the first sign of trouble at 2140 the plane banks briefly up and to the right," Pratt told reporters, referring to the reconstruction of the flight from radar data. "I thought that this was an odd maneuver for the plane to take, especially since the engine Piper Saratoga JFK Jr. was flying in couldn't give enough thrust to make such a quick turn, unless it was some kind of 'magic engine'.

"There really had to be a second engine, is what it comes down to. What I think happened is that a small solid fuel JATO engine, like the kind used on aircraft carriers to help fighters take off on a short runway, was placed in the forward hold of the plane. "While it's true that Kennedy was not the best pilot, what we clearly see that the plane was falling faster than a plane of that shape could fall under just gravity with air resistance. Even if he had lost control completely, shutting down the engine would have allowed him to level the plane. But the JATO was actively pushing him down into the ocean, so he couldn't right himself.

"The only conclusion that we can reach is that there was a massive conspiracy to kill JFK Jr. and make it look like an accident. I think it's obvious that the military leaders, possibly under the direction of the CIA, supplied a JATO to the Mafia, who used their connections to the Illuminati to transfer it to members of the Teamster's union, for attachment to Kennedy's plane without his knowledge."

America does double-take on Canada's proposed nuclear sale

U.S. curious how Canada got fusion power in first place

The United States, successful in persuading Canada to not sell its nuclear fusion research to Iran, is now wondering how Canada got the materials in the first place.

"Wait a second, we never gave Canada anything on nuclear fusion," said State Department official Bradley Stoke. "I'm glad we have prevented these items from reaching Iranian soil, but we're a little perturbed that even Canada has them."

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Natural Law Party leader under fire for election performance

Disappointed party insiders to oust leader with better yogic flying

Jack Tomas is in the fight for his life. His political life, at least.

The leader of the Natural Law Party of Ontario is under siege as other ambitious Natural Law members attempt to grab the reins of the party.

The NLP did not win any ridings in Ontario on the June 3 election, meaning that once again, the high-flying group will have to manage without official party status for at least another four years.

"It was a very disappointing result," admits Tomas. "I thought we would take around 10 ridings."

His failure to produce any MPPs has gained the ire of many former colleagues in the party brass.

"I want him out," said Natural Law finance civilian Tavin Smith. "It's obvious that Jack was unable to lead this party when the party needed him the most. We felt that after the televised leaders debate, we had an enormous opportunity to make inroads among peace-loving Ontarians."

Neither Tomas nor any other Natural Law member participated in the debate, but Tomas did say that he watched it on television.

"It was clear from watching the debate that these leaders, Harris, McGuinty and Hampton, are more interested in bickering with each other than spreading good-will and love to the millions of people in this province," said Tomas.

Tomas would like to lead the party into the next election, which he figures will occur in 2002.

"I sense a great well of anger building up in the pit of Mike Harris's stomach," said Tomas. "He's definitely not doing enough yogic flying. This can only lead to pain and suffering . . . not for him, but for the people of Ontario. He's probably going to resign after a few years."

Tomas said that the inspiration for his leadership was mainly from the good

vibes sent to him by his predecessor, former Natural Law leader Laniel Mardy.

In the 1995 election, Mardy led the party to an all-time high of 18,000 votes across the province.

When Mardy defected to the Freedom Party of Ontario in 1997, many provincial pundits thought this was a huge blow to the struggling Natural Law Party.

After the party struggled through 1998 without a leader, Tomas won a

hard-fought leadership race earlier this year, on a platform of improving the collective consciousness of the province and the uncanny ability to yogic fly much better than his Natural Law opponents.

"I managed to float the longest," said Tomas with a grin. "Tavin could only bounce around with his legs folded while I managed to attain the innerpeace I needed to attain the leadership

of the party."

Party insiders had hoped that Tomas would be the front-man that could build on the party's success in 1995, by turning those 18,000 votes in 18 MPPs.

But those insiders were dismayed when Tomas spent time on the campaign trail praising the NDP platform.

"That was ludicrous," said Natural Law education civilian Deborah Kerr. "The NDP and Natural Law share absolutely no common policies. They still represent big government. We want Ontario to be run by a non-partisan committee while we send our message of peace and love throughout the province."

But Tomas felt that helping the NDP was an important strategy.

"By propping up the NDP, we can split the mainstream vote, and ride up the good vibrations wave of the fringe vote to power," said Tomas.

The plan backfired when NDP support collapsed, leaving the Liberals and Tories as the sole beneficiaries of the mass mainstream vote.

An automatic annual review of the leadership of the party will get underway next month, and Tavin Smith believes he has the right stuff to fly circles around Tomas this time.

"I have managed to clear my head of negativity," said Smith. "My yogic flying is now quite an impressive sight."

As usual, members of the press are barred from the leadership convention, since actual photographs of yogic flying are not allowed to be published.

"To protect the integrity of our party, we will do all of our yogic flying behind closed doors, thank you," said Smith.

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

Will Mike Harris 'Rock' as Premier?

A test subject in a 'wrist' study

Carpal Tunnel Syndrome not linked to typing

But experts wonder 'What else would wear out a wrist?'

Three recently released studies from the University of California at Berkeley, Michigan State University, and the University of Waterloo, challenge the prevailing medical opinion that Carpal Tunnel Syndrome, a painful, debilitating condition of the wrist, is caused by excessive typing.

The studies, the first of their kind, showed conclusively that while the primary victims of the disorder are in the information technology industry where typing is most of the time a requirement of the job, programmers who used voice-recognition technology instead of typing also had elevated incidences of the condition. It also showed that those who play role-playing games are also at an elevated risk, even if they never type, while young, blonde secretaries with large breasts, even if they typed all day, were largely immune.

"It's disheartening to see one of the prevailing medical theories fall, but that's how progress is made," says one researcher on the Berkeley study. "We still believe [Carpal Tunnel Syndrome] is the result of repetitive stress of some kind. What we should be asking ourselves is 'What other wristintensive activity do these groups engage in more frequently than the general population does?""

HONOURARY DEGREES CONFERRED ON HOMELESS PEOPLE

Homeless rights groups are cheering a move by the University of Toronto that will get homeless people back on their feet: honourary degrees.

"In the past, we've been giving away these degrees to the likes of former American President George Bush," said U of T spokeperson Gail Rideau. "But we have found that these figures do not make use of their new degrees."

Rideau said that many people feel these lucky recipients squander their new-found education.

"I mean, with the degree that we gave Bush, he's now qualified to become a professional plumber or electrician, but what's he doing? Still jumping out of planes and writing boring books."

For future graduation ceremonies, U of T plans to give away 100 honourary degrees in fields ranging from humanities to dentistry. The hundred recipients will be culled from local homeless shelters and food banks.

Randy Staff, an organizer with the Toronto Homeless Efforts group, thinks the move should have been made a long time ago.

"We've been complaining about the distribution of honourary degrees for many years," said Staff. "I mean, most of the people who get them already went to university or college. What's the point? Staff says that most homeless people's resumes are lacking in the education department.

"How can someone get off the street corner when they can't get a job?" said Staff. "With these new degrees, they'll not only have the qualifications, but also the confidence to apply for highpaying positions."

One homeless person already slated to receive a Bachelor of Architecture degree has been looking forward to the future lately.

"I'm planning on starting my own design firm," said Randy Starkman, who currently resides in an alley on Adelaide Avenue in downtown Toronto. "I'm leaning towards Starkman and Co., although I'm also partial to The Magical Starkman Architecture Emporium."

Starkman notes that he already has several clients lined up for when he receives the honourary degree.

Eager to support U of T's initiative, Mayor Mel Lastman announced that he will be approaching Starkman about designing a new bus terminal at Union Station.

"This is going to be the best bus station in the world," declared Lastman on Monday. "Starkman, as a former-homeless person, has the keen insight necessary to design a bus terminal that will be the envy of every other city. This is going to be an incredible building."


was just, like, really sweet. To think my sister dumped him just because he was, like, no good in the sack."

NYC mayor to strike at young black male homicide by promoting car accidents

The second phase is expected to target 16- to 20-year-olds (those under the legal drinking age) by providing them with fake ID's and offering the services of civil servants to buy alcohol for

Giuliani's announcement was greeted with cautious optimism by leaders of the NYC civil rights movement.

"Mayor Giuliani's efforts to improve the lot of our young deceased-to-be are admirable," said NAACP president Kweisi Mfume at a rally in Central Park, "But we must be ever vigilant, and do everything we can to ensure our young people stop murdering each other with guns and drugs and do it with cars, like civilized people."

"We, as a people, need the NYPD to cooperate with us in

this," added the Reverend Al Sharpton. "They must do what they know to be right in their hearts, and stop their abuse of the black youth. They must not presume all blacks to be either using or selling drugs; instead, they must do their part to put these youths behind the wheel of a car with poorly-maintained brakes. They must not pull over a car simply because an African-American is driving; instead, they must attempt to run such a car off the road.

"Then, and only then, can our society live up to the words of our founding fathers: that all men are created equal, and that we are *all* entitled to life, liberty, and the pursuit of the 150-mileper-hour mark behind the wheel of a Duster or Z28.'

NATO discovers reason for missile aiming blunders

Imperial Stormtroopers piloting bombers

Under intense and growing international pressure to eliminate damage to civilian targets due to bombs straying off course, a NATO internal investigation has revealed that a squadron of bombers were being manned entirely by imperial stormtroopers.

GOD

Divinity always tried to be there for everyone

"I AM THAT I AM"

Lord of Heaven and Earth

Friedrich Nietzsche announced it years ago; though premature, his statement now has the ring of prophecy. God is dead.

The death of God, also known as Yahweh, Adonai Elohim, Allah, and by dozens of other names, came as quite a shock to his literally billions of followers when it was announced today. "You've got to understand," commented Rev. Howard Blakely of the First Pentacostal Assembly, "we'd always thought that the Good Lord was going to be there. Everyone had assumed that eternal life was part and parcel of the divine attributes, and let me tell you, there's heaps of folk who have some serious thinking to do, now we know that it's not."

Atheists are as shocked, if somewhat more gratified. According to Carrie DeLong of Freethought International, "There was the initial start when we realised that someone had died who we'd never even thought existed, but after that, well, it's pretty much business as usual."

When it comes right down to it, you either loved Him or you hated Him; God was the sort that inspired strong emotions.

Very little is known about His early career. In fact, no records exist at all from before His "Creation of the World", and most of those that date from just after this momentous event in God's career are spotty and unreliable, prone to flights of metaphor instead of good solid fact. We can say, however, that "Creation", as God devotees refer to it, has had a significant impact on the development of Western civilisation.

Another might have rested on his laurels, but God was devoted to His work. Sources say that, after a marathon six-day session of creation, He rested for only a single day before getting back to work. This kind of work ethic was one of the things that fans of the late divine being loved about Him the most. "God was always there to help out," explained a tearful Christina Denatska, mother of two; "He would keep going so that we didn't have to. It was very comforting to know that he was there."

Unfortunately, while He was quoted as saying that He saw all of His creations as "good", God's early work was not without the bitter sting of disappointment. In an event that has gone down in history as the "Fall of Man", the first humans, called Adam and Eve, proved to be somewhat less than perfect. Critics have called God's response to the betrayal excessively harsh, given that it was the newly-made humans' first offense. God apologists disagree. "It was a matter of trust. God trusted Adam and Eve. They let Him down. Letting them off scot-free wouldn't have taught them anything. I mean, sure, to forgive is divine and all that, but no one ever said that God had to be forgiving all the time," explained Rev. Blakely.

Much of the rest of God's career echoed his early work: well thought out, but never quite achieving His stated goals, often because he didn't take human action into account. For several millennia following the "Apple Incident", as God insiders like to call it, the Lord was somewhat touchy; according to observers, he did not take criticism well, and would brook no disobedience. Dr. Janos Karek, a Professor of Psychology at the University of Toronto, interprets God's behaviour during this period as, "akin to that of parents during their children's adolescence. Humanity was growing up, and God didn't feel that they were ready to face the world yet. Of course he became manipulative and controlling; most parents

acquire these traits, to some degree or another, when dealing with a rebellious teen-ager."

Whether Dr. Karek's theories are correct or not, about two thousand years ago, God apparently suffered a change of heart. The details, as is often the case concerning God's personal life, are unclear. Various testaments concerning Jesus ben Joseph of Nazareth (0 - 33), the self-proclaimed "Son of God", exist, but are rejected by many early devotees of God's doings.

It seems clear, however, that it was around this time that God became somewhat less involved with his Creation. Few accounts of his activities over the last two millennia exist, and those that do suffer from severe credibility gaps. From what we know, the Supreme Being began to trust humans to find their own way, and started to leave many of the mundane operations of the universe to underlings, specifically the "Angels" and "Saints" so lauded in the popular imagination

In fact, while never exactly familiar, God became more and more of a recluse in those fateful years before this final pass. He spoke so rarely that for years now, nearly anyone who has claimed to have direct contact with Him was presumed either lying or deranged. There were exceptions, of course, primarily within organized bodies of religion, but for the most part God had been forgotten by His children: only a name to frighten children with, nothing more.

God's personal preferences and predilections, however, have always been a subject of popular debate. In fact, He has gone on record holding a bewildering variety of opinions, oftentimes contradictory to each other. 

By this point, at halfway though the story, the writer is just getting silly, using insults and bad imagery to invoke a sense of disgust with the Globe.





Life found on Mars

New development delights scientists, subscribers

A group of scientists have announced what may be the most surprising find of this century. Julia Roberts likes taking risks.

In her new film, Runaway Bride, she plays a woman who has dumped four different grooms at the altar. In comes freelance journalist Richard Gere (and let me tell you, not all freelance journalists look or act like Richard Gere) to profile her for his newspaper column. She starts having second thoughts about her current groom, and falls for Richard. Your typical romantic comedy.

Will Roberts first foray into the genre leave audiences reeling?

"I'm more used to surprising the audience with my roles, like when I dump Chandler in the bathroom leaving him in female underwear," said Roberts. "With a romantic comedy, everyone in the audience knows right from the start that I'm going to end up marrying Richard Gere at the end of the movie. I've really got to be a lot more interesting in this role in order to keep the audience from leaving."

Marshall admits that the studio forced him to cut the original ending of the film, where Roberts' character ends up running away from Gere's character at the altar as well.

"The studio made the point that they'd like to make some money on this film," said Marshall. "And since I've got points on the gross, I have to agree with them."

Gere, known mainly for starring in bad dramas, said that he feels comfortable performing

in the romantic comedy genre.

"In most of the movies I've done, the girl dies or is sent to prison or something. I'm pretty happy to do a movie where, no matter what kind of a jerk I am throughout the film, I end up with the girl at the end," said Gere.

Roberts said that she will most likely return to guest appearing on NBC shows in the future.

"I can now say that I've done a romantic comedy," said Roberts. "I feel like I've accomplished what I've wanted to say in this genre, and can move on to other things, like horror, science fiction, drama, documentary, tragedy, Shakespeare, mystery, musical, and perhaps a regular comedy."



Disney to release Shaft remake

Animated version removes excessive violence, adds songs

Disney's stock price rose three cents as it was announced that the Studio's next big animated project will be a remake of the 1971 hit movie "Shaft", scheduled to be in theaters in the summer of 2000.

NBC chief makes surprise announcement after fifth sambouka

won't see on cable or pay-TV." During the 1998-99 season, Friends regularly pulled down a 25 rating, 30 share of the viewing audience.


Wallis admits that the early morning slot for these seven episodes will probably lead to a slightly smaller rating.

Streetcar-firetrucks experiment over

Firetrucks that use streetcar tracks unable to cover entire city

A disappointed Trevor Simpson, one of the chairpersons of the Toronto Transit Commission, confirmed yesterday that the firetrucks equipped to run on streetcar tracks will no longer be in service.

"Like the Red Rockets and PCCs before it, an era has come to an end," Simpson said.

When Metro Toronto was merged into one megacity, the new Toronto council decided to merge all of the fire departments together with the TTC. The TTC was reluctant to take on additional duties in Toronto, but caved in quickly when the government promised them some money.

The TTC has had a bus shortage for several years now, so the Toronto Council and the TTC were leaning towards using the fire trucks already in their possession. This changed when the Ontario Government stepped in and insisted that they use a new prototype streetcar-firetruck combination called the Peter Wett.

The Wett, developed and built in Sudbury by Ontario Government-owned Tonka Industries, was hailed by the Ontario Government as the future of fire fighting. Equipped with two large water tanks, three hoses, plus an array of sophisticated fire-retarding systems, the Wett could put out house fires in fourfifths of the time it takes for regular firetrucks.

A test run for the Wett was held in March, and was a huge success. The Wett was at Spadina station, and responded to a fake call at King and Spadina in record time.

"The streetcar tracks down Spadina are in their own rightof-way, meaning that we can zip right down without worrying about cars getting in the way. We would have been two minutes faster if we didn't knock our pole off the wire going so fast around Spadina Circle," said Gord Lasenby, the driver of the trialrun Wett.

Most of the streetcar tracks in Toronto however, do not have their own right-of-way.

"But the streetcar-firetrucks have a higher capacity of water. We may get there a few minutes

late, but we'll have tons of water to toss at the fire!" replied Lasenby.

In the time that the Wett's have been in operation, seventeen houses and businesses have burned to the ground. Investigations have revealed that the reason why most of them burned down was because they were nowhere near streetcar tracks, preventing the Wett's from making a timely rescue. The most recent house to burn down was on Church Street, which does have streetcar tracks, but the Wett did not make it in time to the house. The siren had malfunctioned and the only noisemaker left at the firemen's

disposal was the familiar streetcar gong. Cars ignored the gong, and the Wett was blocked at the Church/King intersection.

Unfortunately, the Ontario Government did not foresee the problem of running a firetruck on streetcar tracks. Toronto has no useable tracks north of St. Clair Street, and only on certain

major streets south of St. Clair.

"Whoops," said Hamilton Southeast MPP George Hanson. "We thought that Toronto had streetcar tracks all over the city. You know, that's what we heard."

Hanson later admitted that he is completely clueless.

Eleven die in deep-water cooling incident

Tragedy struck Toronto's downtown core yesterday, when a design flaw was discovered in the new "deep water" cooling pipe, which was already in

Employees of the financial management firm of Brooks Associates were extremely surprised to discover fish in their air conditioning vents. Their

surprise turned to dismay when the fish were closely followed by several tons of water, ruining the office furniture and drowning eleven slowmoving temporary employees, who had not been properly instructed in exit procedures in case of an emergency.

Deep-water cooling systems work on the principle that the water at the bottom of a large body of reasonably still water - such as Lake Ontario is significantly colder than the air, on a warm day. Thus, one can pipe water from the bottom of such a body of water, run it through the ventilation systems of a building so cool the air, and then send it back into the lake. Such systems have been used for several years to service the air conditioning needs of the skyscrapers on Bay Street, among other buildings downtown.

However, it seems that the new pipe, which was brought into operation two weeks ago, did not undergo any rigorous testing. Specifically, according to Toronto civic engineer Donna Villers, no protection against fish wandering into the pipe had been considered.

"It's always the simple things that get you into trouble in this business," she explained to the Toast. "They never even thought that fish might decide to go exploring. So the next thing that happens, there's hundreds of the wet slimy things in there, clogging up the pipes. It's no wonder that the damned things burst. I'm just surprised that they took two weeks to do it."

Brooks Associates has refused to comment on the incident as of yet, only mentioning to the Toast that they would be placing an ad soon for more temps. Apparently, however, the firm is considering lawsuits against the contractors who built the pipe, the owners of the building, and the Federal Ministry of Fisheries.

Construction of the three other identical deepwater pipes has been stopped until further notice, said Villers.


But now South faces a problem; even with one heart pawn still missing, action must be diverted away from rank 8 or else it is unsafe to play the kings. Attempts to do this by leading the diamond Queen and Bishop proved futile, as West countered with rook and trump to place action on d5; a round of bishops followed, returning to the dread a8 square! South will now face a checkmate no matter what he attempts as East's spade pawns are promotable. (And as you know, loss of the trump king loses the game, despite the potential for 5 total tricks.)

Could South have avoided this fate by running spades from dummy initially? Careful analysis indicates that with the b5 setting, it was South's last, best hope for game... yet even then it was doomed to failure on account of East's potential for shadow play. (A gradual leading to the corner position by trick 6 with the assistance of West's clubs.) So was North's game bid of hearts in error? In fact this is not the case either. Despite minimal point support, the knights would have been a significant asset had East not been dealt a pawn abundance. And two clubs would have been makeable by East-West owing to the lack of king checks in a minor suit. (Thus it was a powerful bid to make at the time!)

So in summary: Even by doing everything right, it appears that you can still lose. So there's not much point in playing, is

Cola prices skyrocket overnight

Cola now \$1.99 per litre in Ontario

Beverage consumers are dealing with thirst-related frustration ever since Tuesday's sudden increase in cola prices.

Customers at all-night convenience stores saw the first bump to \$1.49 around 2 a.m. Monday. By the time regular business hours rolled around, each litre of cola cost \$1.99.

"This is ridiculous," said irate Coca-Cola drinker Fred Peters. "That was the same Coke on the shelves as yesterday, but they're

charging twice as much." Bottlers for popular colas like Coke and Pepsi blame the sticker shock on the rising price of crude sugar, a vital ingredient in all

non-diet varieties of cola. "So far, we've held our retail prices steady as the wholesale prices on sugar and corn syrup rose," said Pepsi-Cola spokesperson Bob Whyte. "Our profit margins were shrinking at an

alarming rate." Documents obtained by the Toast show that costs in refining sugar and producing cola have rose by five per cent during the last six months. Pepsi has been able to offset that increase for the most part by finding cheaper water. Over the same six month period, the amount of profit Pepsi has made on a litre of cola dipped from 86 cents to 85.7

"We were beginning to reach the point where we could no longer afford to not pass on the rising costs to the consumer," said Whyte.

Other beverage companies quickly followed suit with their own price jumps.

"The soft drink market is a volatile one," said RC-Cola vicepresident Tim Barlows. "But it's

also a cyclic one. We'll see these prices fall again."

Liberal MP Joseph Colle picketed the bottling plant on Fairway Road, calling for regulation and price-setting.

"The drinkmakers have had free will to set prices for far too long," said Colle. "With Coke and Pepsi, you basically have a duopoly, and when they charge whatever they want, the drinking public suffers."

Whyte said that regulating the soft drink industry is a non-

"Pepsi has been given a bad rap," said Whyte. "We're suffering too. We had to scale back our launch of Euro-Pepsi for the new millennium. We'll be starting in the northern hemisphere instead of going worldwide on January

Whyte added that the southern hemisphere introduction to Euro-Pepsi will take place in early February.

"I just wanted some Timbits," young Jeremy Winter, 8, says of his decision to spend two dollars given to him by his grandfather three weeks ago on the sweet pastries. Others, however, are much more critical of Mr. Winter's fiscal judgement in investing in a commodity with such

limited growth potential. The money was given to Winter by his grandfather after a long discussion about how when he came to this country he had only two dollars, an amount equal to

that which he gave his grandson, and how after a lot of hard work, everything was 'all right'. "After a schtick like that, I thought for sure he would immediately take that money and put it into

some blue chips or something," Winter's grandfather said, "but instead, not twenty minutes later, he comes back to me with a box of Timbits. Where's the sense in that?" Little Jeremy would be well

advised to listen to his grandfa-

ther's financial advice. After

Ernst Winter's emigration to

Canada following the second World War, he turned his two dollars into the fourth largest cracker and flatbread company in North America. The two dollars given to Jeremy will likely meet with a less prosperous fate.

"Timbits depreciate very rapidly," says Irrational Toast Financial Analyst Georgina Garbett, "especially if you eat them, but even if left in the refrigerator they go stale after a day or two. This would be fine in a market where prices were increasing rapidly enough to compensate,

but over the past three weeks Tim Horton's has not raised their price from the two dollars Winter paid. Who's going to buy three-week-old Timbits from Jeremy, except at a tremendous loss? "On the other hand, if he had

'What does this kid know that we don't?""

Indeed, the NASDAQ composite index dropped ten points in early trading as many investors followed Jeremy's lead and took their money out of highTimbits and Timbit-related investments, hoping to get in on the ground floor when Winter's risk begins to pay off.

Despite this influx of capital, Timbit prices have remained steady.

New device allows computer-savvy bank customers to withdraw cash from computers

Marking the next jump in the evolution of computer banking, the five major banks have unveiled a new product which will allow consumers to withdraw cash directly from their computers

"Bank customers using our online banking service can transfer money, pay bills, convert currencies, arrange loans...nearly everything they could do at our branch," said Royal Bank vice-president Jerry Haliwell. "We found a sizable gap in the services that we could provide online, and that was cash withdrawal."

Haliwell said the five banks were pretty sure that they would not be able to "beam" the money to the computers directly. They decided to approach the Royal Canadian Mint instead to see if they could get permission to have bank customers print off money on their colour inkjet printers when they withdrew money.

"They weren't too keen on that idea either," said Haliwell. "We decided to go with the tried and true technology from our ATMs."


For only \$19.95 a month, bank customers can lease a specially constructed cash dispenser that

attaches to the serial port of any Windows 98 computer. When the customer needs to withdraw cash, they log onto their online banking web site, and choose the withdrawal option. The web site will then instruct the Internet Banking Machine dispenser to release the chosen amount of cash.

Tests have gone surprisingly well according to Haliwell.

"The feedback so far has been great," said Haliwell. "The only complaint is the armoured car and guards that have to come every two weeks to deposit more money into the ITM."

Microsoft Unveils New Visual A++

"Assembly for the rest of us"

Microsoft CEO Bill Gates unveiled the latest suite of Microsoft programming tools today at a Microsoft Developer's Conference in Redmond, WA. Among the most exciting was the new Visual A++, an assembly language editor with drag-anddrop functionality. "This is great," said Mary Wilkes, System Engineer for Lucent, "finally we assembly programmers can rise out of the murky swamp of text editors and ascend into the golden age of WYSIWYG and forms. Finally we, too, can offer slick graphics and pretty little dialog boxes." The first version of Visual A++ has many attractive features, including support for multi-threaded assembly and the new Register Wizard.

"The Register Wizard gives you all the functionality you

need when performing register operations," said Mark McLewan, Senior VP of Marketing for Microsoft, "bit shifts, multiplication, boolean expressions, immediate word loading... Addition and subtraction aren't supported yet, but will be by next release."

The next release is scheduled for 2005.

Detractors have stated that Visual A++ is too much, too fast. "Microsoft just wants more pie," said one irate developer, who asked that his name be withheld from fear of reprisal. "They'll have the same problems as they did with Visual Cobol++, Visual Ada++ and Visual Lisp++: too many specifics, not enough generics," said Software Developer Terence Matte of LiquiDigital, "Plus those wizards are getting damn annoving!" But, with a "Hello, World!" program that is only 68 MB, Visual A++ is a powerful contender in the RAD (Rapid Application Development) assembly market.

Intel to include homing device in next generation processors

Merced chip to contain automatic tracking

Intel Corp. yesterday unveiled plans to include a so-called "homing device" in its next generation processor, codenamed "Merced".

The company's press release describing the technology, which will enable the Santa Clara, Calif., chip maker to know the exact geographical location of every processor they manufacture, called it "another gigantic step forward for security, privacy, and ease-of-use on the Internet."

The device relies upon a miniature Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver that will be embedded within the casing of the chip. The receiver uses American military satellites to calculate its latitude and longitude within two metres.

Once the chip has determined its location, a process that occurs whenever it is powered on, it then communicates this information over a standard phone line to Intel's California office.

"This new technology is the perfect complement for the processor serial number, introduced with the Pentium III," said Intel spokesperson Wendy Siti. "Not only can we know which computer is being used, but now we can know exactly where that computer is."

According to Siti, security is the most important benefit. "Computer thefts will become a thing of the past. Using our centralized database of computer users, we will be able to move quickly with law enforcement officers to apprehend computers that are being used outside of

their designated coordinates." As with the processor serial number, Internet applications and web sites will be able to obtain location information from the processor without user intervention. "So many web sites require the user to type in three or four lines of address information," says Siti. "With the emergence of large address databases and the use of GPS information from the Merced processor, web sites can obtain all of the address information they need without bothering the user."

A spokesperson for the Electronic Privacy Information Center, an Internet privacy watchdog that was an outspoken opponent of the processor serial number, responded to the announcement, saying "This is nuts. 

Canada, Sweden square off in Flag-Capture semis

TEAM CAPTAIN LIKES OUR CHANCES IN "BATTLE OF THE NORTH"

After a grueling overtime win against Nigeria in last Sunday's quarter-final match, Team Canada will face the pride of Sweden tomorrow in this year's Ballyhoo Cup Race, the premiere international Capture the Flag tournament, held this year in Italy.

The team has spent the past few days in rest and relaxation, recovering from their ordeal just outside Pisa against the Nigerians. According to Hannah Bernhart, the team trainer, "state of mind is very important in this sport. You don't want a runner who's feeling down, and a sleepy jailer is the kiss of death for the team. I'm doing my utmost to ensure our players are in top form to meet the Swedes."

Team Canada Captain Marcel Dupuys agrees. "I want to know that my team is going in there at the very height of our prowess. These folks, they're some of the best capturers that I've ever played with, and I think that we can show the world a thing or two about how the game is

played.'

Dupuys got his start in the sport at summer camp as a child, a common story for members of Team Canada. At the time, Capture the Flag was generally regarded as a children's game, a perception that changed when Sir Reginald Ballyhoo passed away ten years ago, leaving a provision in his will for the use of his vast fortune in establishing an annual world-wide tourney. Within months of the Ballyhoo Cup's first being awarded (to Zaire in 1991), Flag Fever had hit much of the Western world. A group of American investors are currently seeking cities to sponsor teams in the nascent National Flag Capture League (NFCL), and similar endeavours are underway in Eu-

Although only twenty-four, Dupuys is already a titan in the fast-paced world of Capture the Flag. His position on the field is "scout": during play, he spends most of his time on enemy territory, seeking out and freeing prisoners from his team, and locating the opponents' flag. The position takes speed, stamina, a good eye and a quick mind, and Dupuys has all of these.

Asked to comment on the Nigerian team, Dupuys called them "promising players, but certainly not world-class yet. The only reason that they did as well as they did against us was the fact that the field was rural — lots of trees and open spaces — and we're an urban team. If the match had been within the city, we'd have cleaned up."

While somewhat more impressed by the Swedes' capability, Dupuys isn't worried about tomorrow's game. "The Swedes play a very defensive game. We saw that in the Royal Rumble match at the beginning of the Race. Hartman (Anya, the chief jailer for Team Canada) is very aggressive, by contrast, and so once I've found their flag, I just need to get her there and lure their defenders out of their safe zone."

If Canada wins tomorrow, then on Saturday Dupuys and his team will face the victor of tonight's China-New Zealand match. While Race officials are keeping the venue for Saturday's game secret, it is widely rumoured that the teams will face off over the canals of Venice.

EXTREME Fishing

Sharks: love 'em or hate 'em, some days the true extreme fisherman just has to deal with 'em.

So we put out our lines, and within ten minutes we'd caught something. I don't even remember what it was, I just know that it wasn't hardly over a foot long, and so not really worth bothering about. But Brian suggested that maybe instead of throwing it back, we use the little sardine as bait for catching something worthwhile. After shouting about what a good idea it was and pounding old Brian on the back and drinking some more beer, we gave it a shot.

Went back into harbour after that. It's not safe in the water, with lots of blood and sharks about.

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
