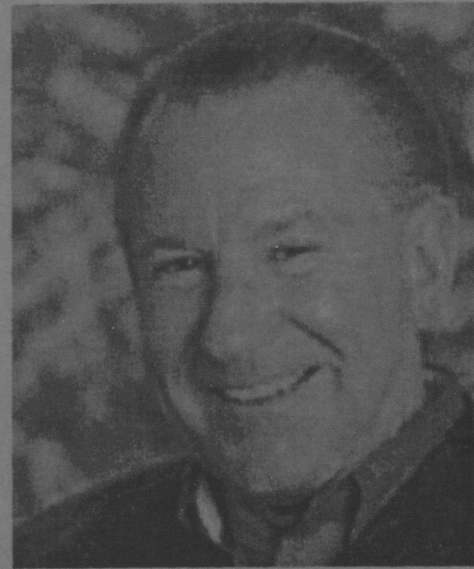

Trailer For *Hobbit* Film Released

Jackson Expected To Announce Film Shortly

Less than a week after the trailer for *The Lord of the Rings: Return of the King* was released online, anonymous sources leaked a teaser trailer for *The Hobbit*, based on the novel by JRR Tolkien preceding the LotR trilogy. CS Department to Strengthen Pre- and Post-Conditions

Pre: you have a sense of humor and you didn't ask whether you could assume mothers are female

Post: you will laugh

After dozens of questions from students on the CS message boards seeking clarifications on the finer points of their algorithms, the CS department has undertaken plans to strengthen the pre- and post-conditions of their CS 133 and CS 134 assignments.

"While we originally thought our pre- and post-conditions amply described the algorithms we want the students to write, the questions on the message board clearly demonstrate otherwise," said a member of the CS department. "The decision to strengthen our pre-and post-conditions, project PPC, is our attempt to alleviate all possible confusion on our upcoming assignments. And we mean ALL of it."

One of the common questions is whether the algorithm works for cases involving zeros. The CS department considered writing that the algorithm should work for natural numbers, but felt that this was too ambiguous. Therefore, pre-conditions for assignments will list all the numbers that all the variables must work for. In the case of natural numbers and general algorithms, this will result in pre-conditions that are infinitely long.

"Many of the questions on the CS 241 assignment regard the UnidentifiedOpcode compile-time error and what it means. It seems obvious to us; an unidentified opcode is an opcode that isn't in MIPS. The students are having a really hard time with us. We take this to mean students are trying to use UnidentifiedOpcode exceptions to somehow get the required output. Therefore, the post-conditions for all our algorithms in that course will include 'this algorithm compiles without throwing UnidentifiedOpcode errors'. Hopefully this will clear up this problem."

"I'm really looking forward to the new specifications," said a CS 133 student. "Like, it's so much of a load off my mind that I don't have to rewrite my algorithm so that it works when the

power is off. Before, I would have had to ask whether my program needs to work when the computer has no power, but now I know! It's SO worth the monolithic novel of a precondition that would take an arts graduate to read and understand!"

"I was really confused last year in regards to the maternity ward event-driven simulation," said another student. "The specifications didn't mention whether we could assume all the mothers are female. So, I had to write an `isFemale()` method in my Mother object and alter the constructor to accept a boolean at creation time for the gender of the mother. Then I posted, and found out we could assume mothers are female. I was so pissed! I wasted so much time on that `isFemale()` method!" The CS student then proceeded to drool slightly on himself, possibly because he's really stupid.

"Take, for example, one of the questions on the group now; 'does the program need to be able to run if dinosaurs retake the earth?' This is a very valid question. After all, the CS department encourages the creation of code that pleases whatever non-human overlords enslave the human race. We accept that this may make the algorithm a bit more complicated, because we don't know how many fingers dinosaurs may evolve to have, or what ASCII standard they use, or what logic system they use. Who knows, they may like trinary or even quaternary logic. But the code the students write should still run."

Another question found on the newsgroup is what exactly pre- and post-conditions are. The PPC project plans to have as part of the pre-condition that 'this is a pre-condition', and have a similar statement for the post-conditions. Also, students have asked how many pre- and post-conditions they need write for each of their methods. PPC guidelines state that their conditions must match the format CS uses.

The PPC project assumes that the universe really exists and is not a figment of everyone's imagination. However, if this assumption is not properly stated by the PPC, further revisions to the PPC may need to be instated.

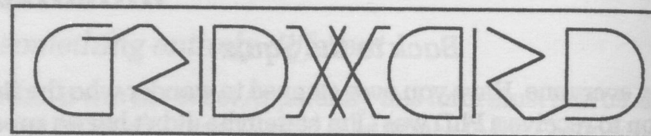
