Preston Manning To Speak On Faith And Politics

When more than 70 percent of Canadians profess a faith in God, how can we silence the expression of religious views in the political arena and still claim to be a democratic society? This is one of the questions Preston Manning, founder and former leader of the Reform Party of Canada, will address when he speaks at St. Jerome's University on Friday, October 31st.

Manning will talk about "Living the Interface Between Faith and Politics" at 7:30 p.m. in Siegfried Hall (in St. Jerome's), free of charge. All are welcome.

Manning argues that the traditional separation between church and state in Canada is an important principle that must be preserved, but it should not be used to deny religion a voice in the public forum. He says it's neither practical nor desirable to attempt to keep faith and politics strictly separate in Canada, a country of strong religious traditions. Moreover, it's not realistic to attempt a debate on the morality or ethics of issues such as human cloning or waging war, while excluding the religious perspective.

Um, yes it does. Trust me. Or I could tell you some reasons... sure, that's good too. But I warn you, I'm biased, I care a whole lot about it, so much so that I put my name in the hat.

The City of Waterloo gets a vast portion of its revenue from property taxes. These property taxes are passed along to tenants through rent (which has gone up an average of 30% in the past four years). So you're paying for the City of Waterloo to operate.

The quality of housing and the quantity of housing are both significantly affected by The City of Waterloo (Through the Property Standards By-law, the Lot Maintenance By-law and the rules surrounding Lodging Houses). So where you are living is significantly affected by the City of Waterloo (and how far from campus you are living).

An important issue in this Election is that of pesticides (and whether there should be regulation to prevent their use for cosmetic purposes). Your health is affected by this in the water you drink, the ground you walk on and the air you breath. Your health is affected by the City of Waterloo.

There are approximately 30,000 students and the population of the City is just over 100,000. With those numbers one would think that the City should care a great deal about student issues, but it doesn't, for a very simple reason: students tend not to have high turnout in elections. In the past two elections Ward 4 (known for having a high concentration of students) has had the lowest voter turnout, 16% in 1997 and 14.21% in 2000 (compared to an overall turnout of 30.04% and 31.26% respectively). In 2003 you have a real chance to make sure that your views will not be ignored in the future. Find out about the candidates, find those that will ensure the needs of all members of the community are met, including students; AND VOTE, then get all your friends to vote too! (sounds alot like a great phrase... vote early, vote often)

It's really easy to vote, Today (Friday) and Tomorrow (Saturday) are Advance Voting Days, which means you can vote down at City Hall (100 Regina St South). Election Day is November 10th (from 10am till 8pm) Find out which ward you're in and where your poll location is go to: http://199.212.48.41/ Vote2003, note that you can only vote in the poll that you are supposed to vote in! You just have to show up with some photo id (a drivers license works) and some proof that you live where you say you live (Cable/Phone bills are good, even Quest printouts should work). The FedS are even organizing lifts to the polling stations.

Elections Information

An in-depth guide to candidates running in Wards 2 and 4

As most of you know, there is a municipal election being held on November 10^{th} . You probably also know that there are past and present students running in this election. What few students know is that we represent approximately 1/3 of the population of Waterloo, and a large percentage of Ward 4. So, how can you, a simple student, make a difference in your city for the next n years (where 0 < n < 5)? Easy. Come out and vote. Make an educated decision. So, what's the easiest way to do this? Research candidates in your ward. Many candidates have their own web site, but there's also www.mywaterlooregion.com and the Feds.ca candidate information booklet. Both of these sources asked all the candidates questions, to which most decided that answering the questions they were asked. Here's a breakdown of the two biggest student-populated wards:

Ward 2

Judy Greenwood-Speers:

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-Decided that answering the Feds questionnaire was a waste of her time.

-Wants to create a database of where all students are living, and have landlords update this every time a new tenant comes in (does this not VIOLATE privacy rights? I'd not consent to this)

-"Increase" communication and expenses by having "report cards" in the form of flyers (hmmm...creating MORE litter to clog up the city?)

-It is apparently the fault of tenants if the landlords screw up with anything. According to Ms. Greenwood-Speers, it is the tenants that should be fined for violations incurred by absentee landlords.

• Angela Vieth:

-According to Ms. Vieth, the Universities are "taking a leading role in providing housing for students". Albeit partially true, there is very little being done for upper year students. -Ms. Vieth does not want to make student housing any more complicated than it is.

-Ms. Vieth wants current by-laws to be better enforced.

• Jim Bolger:

-Mr. Bolger believes that the relationship between students and government needs to be reworked.

-Mr. Bolger is prepared to meet with representatives of the two student unions to try and find better ways to accommodate current students' needs.

-Most importantly, Mr. Bolger thinks that the trust that has been lost over the last couple of years cannot just be given, and it must be earned.

Mike Kerrigan:

-Mr. Kerrigan feels that "students are considered secondclass citizens" and that he is the person whom is best in touch with students. Interesting that I'd not really heard about him before this election...

-Mr. Kerrigan did not answer www.mywaterlooregion.com's questions of pertinence to students.

Ward 4

Bob Byron: -Mr. Byron did not answer the Feds questionnaire.

-Mr. Byron does not believe there is a lack of trust between City staff and the general public.

-Mr. Byron believes that tenants are at fault for current instances of neglect and avoidance of meeting building standards.

• Ernie Dyck:

-Mr. Dyck has not provided a platform to any known source

Mark Whaley:

-Mr. Whaley did not answer the Feds questionnaire. -Mr. Whaley believes that experienced is the key to restoring confidence and trust in Waterloo leadership. -Mr. Whaley believes that current by-laws need to be properly enforced.

Edwin Laryea

-Mr. Laryea believes that any motion involving significant expense should be scrutinized. This will essentially increase costs, as bringing in an "outside specialist" is an expensive task.

-Mr. Laryea believes that by-laws are not the problem, and that enforcement is the problem.

-Mr. Laryea believes that illegal lodging houses are contributors to "traffic congestion and competition for street parking"

Stephen S. Skrzydlo:

-Mr. Skrzydlo believes that students, generally, want to live in proximity to other students, and close to the Universities. He asserts that forcing students to not live in a smaller radius around the universities has caused the current problems of absentee landlords and "peppering" within the community.

-Mr. Skrzydlo does not believe that six people have "a monopoly on quality ideas", and that the only real way to instill trust within city council is to get community feedback. Mr. Skrzydlo would propose to make better use of the city web site, namely creating and maintaining an online citizen's forum to allow this feedback to be heard.

Why are you running?

A large segment of the population at Waterloo has been ignored. Students make up about 30% of the population in Waterloo and they are seen as a problem and not a vibrant part of the community, I think this is absurd. Over the years I have heard the phrase "community members and students" and every time it annoys me. Students ARE community members, it's time they were treated as such. We need to find ways to have student and non-student residents both be happy in their homes and community. There must be a voice on council that can truly understand the student perspective and I am that voice.
