Hi Everyone!!! Your CRO here just to let you know that elections are coming up soon for Winter 2010 Mathsoc Executive positions.

Some of you may be wondering, "What is a CRO?" Well CRO stands for Chief Recruitment Officer, and I am resposible for recruiting First Year/Class Representatives for MathSoc Council as well as getting Executives for MathSoc. I am also responsible for running any elections that are necessary, which they are for all 4 Executive positions this time around. Vice President Academics, Vice President Finance, Vice President Activities and Services and President are the 4 positions that are open for elections.

The way the Executive election process works is we announce that nominations for the positions are open and people hand in forms with their name, what position they would like and 10 endorsers. After the nomination period is over, the campaign period begins where candidates try to get people to vote for them by explaining how they are the best for the job. This is the stage that we are currently at. Then comes election day where you the students of the math faculty votes for who you would like to be elected for a position. Then counting is done and winners declared. In the event of a tie is the only time the CRO gets a vote so I like to think that I have the most powerful vote; P.

Also, having chaired the Policy Review Committee in Spring 2009, I can see some areas where policies could be updated to reflect the current operations of MathSoc, its affiliates, and clubs so I plan to work on that as well.

Her duties will include presiding over General Meetings of the Society, providing Society representation at external functions and public occasions, being responsible for Society public relations, appointing representatives to sit on external committees, and acting as a representative to the Faculty, University, and Federation of Students. She will also fill in for the VP Activities & Services in the event of long-term absence.

A Conversation with the Presidential Candidates

I had planned to speak with all three candidates for President, however one of them dropped out of the race a couple of hours before the interview. I decided to then speak with the other two and get their very differing perspectives on the various goings-on in MathSoc.

InsideR: Why are you running for President, and what do you hope to achieve during your term?

Nadia Novikova: I want to continue the work that I did in the summer. A lot of hard work has started, and so continuing for another year will allow me to incorporate my goals and the work that I started. I want to end the C&D fiasco, and I've gained plenty of good ideas from last term. Having someone who knows the ropes would be beneficial to the Society.

Sarah Pidcock: I've been involved in MathSoc in many capacities, and I see lots of room for improvement, espeically with respect to policies. My biggest goal is to take a good look at policies and bring them up to date. As well, I'm chairing the C&D Management Board, and I want to work towards financial sustainability for the C&D. I'm also interested in working more at the faculty level; I'm currently sitting on the Student Appeals Committee, and I'm enjoying the relationship with faculty and I want to expand my horizons on that front.

InsideR: What experience do you have, both inside and outside MathSoc, that makes you think you're qualified for the position?

Sarah: I've been a CS Rep on Council since 2007, and I consider myself to be a veteran. I have also held several directorships (most notably Novelties), and I'm familiar with the day-to-day operations of the Society. I've also been Internal Director, so I know where policies can be improved. I've been an Orientation Black Tie and Photography Coordinator.

Nadia: I've been involved with the Society for over 2 years, starting as a First Year Rep in 2007, where I got stuck being secretary. I've also been Social Director and VPAS, and was President last term. The experience is important, and I'm very familiar with all of the candidates, so we can get started right away. I've also been part of Orientation one year, and part of the Youth Science Foundation at the national level, as a mentor for science fairs.

InsideR: Apathy is a growing problem among students in the math faculty. For example, we are often lucky when we get 5% of students out to vote in a given election. Why do you think this is, and how do you plan to deal with it (if you plan to at all)?

Sarah: The problem is that students are absorbed with their academics and they don't notice what's going on outside of that. I'm not sure there's much you can do about that, but we need to try to do things that benefit the students and not just the people running them (for example, more academic initiatives), and make people more aware of what we do on academic issues. People need to know what MathSoc does that affects their lives.

Nadia: In the last few weeks, I've been doing some research on volunteer organizations, and the biggest problem is that the Society has been disconnected from what students need. What we're doing to draw in volunteers is clearly not working, and there's nothing we can do to improve the Society without building oneon-one relationships with students and find out what we can do for them. Once we've connected with students' needs, they will realize that we are here for them. InsideR: You both are very familiar with the financial difficulties facing the Coffee and Doughnut Shop. What is causing this problem, and how do you plan to bring it to financial sustainability?

Nadia: There is a lack of communications between the Math-Soc Executives and the C&D Manager, as well as in transition between executives. Lots of info is lost in transition, and I didn't realize until it came up last term that the C&D was in trouble. I want to see regular meetings between the C&D Manager and President and/or VPF, as well as regular meetings with the C&D Board (as it's a year-long board). We're working with FedS for a full financial review of the C&D, and we're off to a good start, and we're also working to get expertise from those who run profitable C&Ds.

Sarah: The #1 thing is wages, and the fact that the C&D is not taking in enough money to cover wages. We need to have a full review of everything, and we will have to make price adjustments. I have been having weekly meetings with the C&D Manager this term when I sign her cheques. We also need a standardized form of record-keeping shared between the C&D and VPF.

InsideR: You have both served on Executive Council, with Nadia as President over the summer and Sarah as VP Finance this term. What big projects are you/did you work on that you wish to continue as President in 2010?

Sarah: Over the summer, I took a good look at policies, got them all together, and I want to continue with that project. This term, I'm working on geting MathSoc's records back under control, cleaning up after last term's VPF. I also want next term's VPF to maintain simple records that are easy to keep clean and transition.

Nadia: The C&D fell on us pretty hard, and I only had a month to deal with it, but this problem is rooted very personally. We can make the C&D self-sustaining if we create a tool for the manager to continually reevaluate processes and practices, and hopefully we can use future profits to improve seating in the C&D lounge. I also want to redo the transition process, as there's only an optional report to pass onto next term's exec. I want to put mandatory inter-term reporting and other transition info into policy so that future execs (and directors, for that matter) can get started from day one.

InsideR: As you know, you are going to be running the entire MathSoc organization if elected. What does leadership mean to you, and how would you describe your leadership style?

Sarah: Leadership for me is making volunteers aware of what's expected, encouraging them and helping them (though not too much). I'm very precise, to the point where some call it micro-managing, but I want people to know exactly what needs to be done and when to get it done by. It can lead to frustration (and sometimes me doing it by myself), but it leads to results.

Nadia: I think it's synonymous to service; I don't want to be the "follow me" type of leader. It's math students' ideas that are important to me, and I want to be a resource to make their ideas a reality and guide them to their own goals. I believe that everyone has goals, even if they don't realize it, and by building the relationships with the volunteers, we can see what they are interested in and find their niches.

Candidates for Vice President, Activities & Services

Ian Charlesworth

A Conversation with the VP Activities & Services Candidates

The VPAS interview was by far the most entertaining. All three were there in person, there was the occasional sword fight (in which BeaverED was wounded), and the catch phrase was "I agree with x".

InsideR: Why do you want to be VPAS?

Joyce Karel: I want to try to improve things in MathSoc, by running more events and approaching people who don't know much about the Society. I didn't know much about MathSoc in my first year, and I want to reach out to quiet, shy people like me.

Selin Erkaya: I want to find first-years and get them involved. I want to find new people, new ideas, and people to replace those who are graduating.

Ian Charlesworth: I've done it before, and I had a lot of fun and want to do it again. We need to get more people involved in MathSoc, but as well on the weekly events. For example, we had about 20 people come out to Games Nights every week (which is good for a summer term), but we need to do better.

InsideR: What do you hope to accomplish during your term as VPAS?

Selin: More fun things. I have fun, and so should others. We need to have more fun things like Charity Balls, and we need to reach out to more math students on an interpersonal level.

Ian: We need to run lots of fun events, but we need more focus on getting people to know the services we have available. For example, I see people line up outside Campus Copy every term to get their work reports bound, and it's cheaper to do it yourself in MathSoc.

Joyce: I want to grow and improve personally, but on a Society level, I agree with Ian. We need to get people to use the services they pay for, and get people out to events.

InsideR: In the role, you will be selecting about 10-20 directors to help run the Society. What leadership experience do you have, and what is your style of leadership?

Selin: I did a Rotary Orientation for international students in high school, and I've worked in a program to help special education students. As for my style, I can be fun, but I will lay down the hammer if needed.

Joyce: I was an Orientation leader in my high school since coming to Canada in 2004, and I've also been an Orientation Leader, Head Leader, and Head Black Tie. I've also coordinated Central Registration for Orientation, and I've had to organize workers as Office Manager this year.

Ian: I've been VPAS before, so I'm experienced in the position. I've also been an Orientation Leader and Head Leader, as well as Office Manager. However, those are not the same kind of leadership, as you have to lead a bunch of different people in different directions because no two directorships are the same.

InsideR: What do you look for in the people that will be your directors?

Ian: I learned the hard way last summer to make sure you have a good person in the position and that they can get things done on their own. They need to show initiative, and the biggest thing is that they can get things done on their own and that they know what they're doing. First-years should start as co-directors or board members before being named as full directors so that they can get experience.

Joyce: Being Office Manager, I agree that you need competent people, but at the same time, directorships are not easy to do.

You therefore need to have multiple people in a given role, matching new directors with experienced ones.

Selin: We need to have new people to learn the portfolios, but we also need experienced people to teach them. One thing that I learned as a frosh leader is that we need some shy directors and some outgoing directors so that we can connect to more people.

InsideR: Apathy among math students is very high, if election turnouts are any indication. What do you think is causing this, and how do you plan to address it?

Joyce: It's a combination of people not caring and not knowing. We need to get office workers to help promote events, and other volunteers to advertise in their classes. We also need more posters, and should not limit ourselves to our bulletin boards (posting where people actually go). As well, we need to get people to actually read signs, as that's what they're there for.

Ian: We need to reach out to first-years right after Orientation Week. Last year, MathSoc Day didn't happen due to a lack of executive, and this year, it went OK. We want to get more firstyears excited about MathSoc from Day 1 and tell them about what we do. We also need to figure out how to use the Announcement mailing list and reach out to more people, and finally to get more posters on the 2nd and 4th floors (where people actually have classes).

Selin: A major problem is that advertising is usually done last-minute, so we need to do it more in advance. For example, weekly Movie Nights are not really advertised until day of, which is too late. As well, since the bulletin boards are often hard to read (because of all that's on them), we should do more announcements in class.

[Program Reps and First Year Reps are currently responsible for keeping students in their classes and programs informed about MathSoc's happenings. — InsidED]

InsideR: Tell me about a time where you set yourself a goal but failed to meet it (for one reason or another). What happened, and what did you learn from it?

Selin: I had an optional midterm this term, which I chose to write. I bombed the midterm, and decided not to hand it in. At the time, I wasn't serious about studying, and I learned that things that seem easy can easily get out of hand. I'm now looking more towards the future, and putting studying before friends. (I broke a mirror on the same day, so I have 7 years of bad luck left.)

Joyce: I set myself a goal to make a summary of my notes every day after class. However, I got lazy, which is bad. I learned that I should work more to commit to what you're supposed to do (not that I'm not doing that now).

Ian: I tried to go for a whole term getting sleep every night before an assignment was due. However, I have failed every time, and have learned that procrastination is bad. It is important to be organized and pretend things are due a day before they really are, and I've improved from one all-nighter per week to twice or three times per term.

InsideR: What is the most important part of the VPAS' job?

Ian: Choosing good directors. The Society doesn't really need a VPAS if the directors are doing their jobs.

Selin: Being available, and letting the directors do their jobs.

Joyce: Delegating, being professional when giving direction, and doing what you say you'd do.

Accomplishments:

- As the Interim VP, Finance of Spring 2009, Nadia Novikova and I have investigated and re-opened CnD's financial fiasco by conducting an internal review. An overhaul to the shop is underway and as part of the Board we will continue to do so.
- As a part of Senate, represented the faculty for its resounding negative response against changing the Exam Regulations to include Saturday as a day to schedule midterms. Goals:
- Publicize MathSOC's Services: For instance, the Math Undergraduate Office compiles a list of professor reviews from the earlier term and makes it available through MathSOC at the start of each term, however this service (and many others) isn't known by most.
- Improving Administrative communication between Faculty and Students: With Peter Wood's (Director of Undergraduate Business and Accounting Program) assistance, I would like to enhance the relationship through the Faculty Student Liaison Committee, by appealing to meet more than once a term.
- Formalizing the student representative structure on the Undergraduate Affairs Committee, a committee that oversees changes to math undergraduate programs.

Responsibilities of the VP Academic

The VP Academic is responsible for representing students on all matters of an academic nature. This typically includes sitting on Faculty Council, Representative Council, Undergraduate Affairs Committee, and Computer Science Faculty Council. They are also responsible for organizing events of an academic nature, and maintaining academic-related services such as the Exam Bank. They will also fill in for the VP Finance in the event of long-term absence.

A Conversation with the VP Academic Candidates

The VPA interview was the most interesting to do, because we had a much more in-depth discussion than I could have expected. All three candidates see significant yet different ways to improve students' academic lives in the faculty.

InsideR: Why are you running for VPA?

Ajnu Jacob: I want to build a relationship with the faculty with the various councils we sit on. There are issues with program administration, and that student voices are not being heard. I'm also doing a lot of similar work on Senate.

Niky Hristov: I want to get more involved and keep myself busy on my work term (I'm working on campus). I'm just starting second year, and I'm finding it difficult to find a co-op plan that fits with my current major, and I would like to make this easier for future students.

Piraveena Tharmalingam: In my last role as an Orientation Director on the Federation Orientation Committee, I was able to see plenty of opportunities where student voices can be heard. A lot of this isn't being used to capacity, and voices aren't being heard from the average population.

InsideR: What do you hope to accomplish as VPA?

Niky: Throughout the campaign, I hope to gain three suggestions from math students on how to improve their academics.

Piraveena: I want to get representation for the average population on Faculty Council and the committees under that umbrella. Specifically, I want to ensure that info is relayed in a timely manner. I understand that MathSoc meetings are effective for those who attend, but outside of the meetings, we get no real reports from those committees, and I want to see them made public.

Ajnu: There are a lot of untapped resources on the faculty side, which was brought to my attention by Peter Wood (chair of the Faculty Liaison committee). It would better the students to enhance the relationship between the Faculty and its students, which has withered over the past couple of years due to VPAs that have not been as proactive. I would like to maintain relationships with them and get them more involved.

InsideR: What do you think is the most important issue relating to your portfolio right now?

Piraveena: It's getting the voice of the general student population heard, but as well, we need to tackle exam conflicts. In 1B, I had a ridiculous final exam schedule, and because they were not back-to-back, I still had to write 5 exams in 3 days. I want to revise the exam relief policy and make it better for students. As well, to make the general population's voice heard, I want to have a suggestion box for students to submit suggestions.

Ajnu: I'd say it's the Math/Business program. It's one of the larger programs that's not an elite department, and many of the core members of the department are not as experienced. I want to encourage smaller class sizes by including more researchers from more elite departments to assist with lecturing. I know the Dean's office is looking into this, and I want to learn what resources can be tapped into.

Niky: I want to make it easy to select courses and organize schedules. For my major (Math/Phys), fourth year becomes difficult to make using any default co-op sequence. As well, I want to see smaller departments get involved to help students, and possibly get a director position to help with this.

InsideR: The exam bank is a popular tool that students use for studying, but it's gotten out of date as courses continue to change.

How do you plan to keep it up to date and useful to students?

Ajnu: I've spoken to Peter Wood about this as a past exec. All exams are sent to the Math Undergrad Office before going to the exam rooms, and so regulating a system that would allow profs to opt in/out of forwarding them to MathSoc would allow us to keep it up to date.

Piraveena: The exam bank can be useful, and the challenge is that profs like to reuse exams. Repeating exam questions reduce the quality of the course, and it shows that the prof isn't taking a proactive stance to revisit it. Encouraging slight changes to exams would benefit both current and future students. As well, we need to get answer keys for the exams as well.

Niky: The exam bank is becoming obsolete, and it's becoming more useful to get tests off of ACE. If we can't get the exam bank up to date, we should look more into study skills sessions as opposed to exams.

Ajnu: Such sessions are important and well-received by students, but we can't get to all students that way. We need to maintain the exam bank for those not proactive enough to attend these sessions.

Piraveena: The exam bank is easy to access, especially as we live in the technological era, and is a great resource to use and build. Sessions are effective, but they're not for everyone.

Niky: We should be putting on useful, per-class sessions, similar to Students Offering Support (SOS).

Piraveena: SOS is a paid service, and some of the money goes to charity. As MathSoc, we can't endorse that organization as a student service. We should consider looking to add resources to the tutorial centres, such as more TA hours.

Niky: [Student's name removed] doesn't like SOS because it is paid, and he is volunteering his time by offering free sessions for courses in his major.

Ajnu: Clubs currently hold an initiative with respect to academic sessions. I was President of Stats Club in the Winter, and we did student-run review sessions for 230 and 231, and I know the CS, PMC and ActSci Clubs do similar things. The services already exist; we just need to give more encouragement.

Piraveena: We need to ensure that the students who are running these are qualified to do so, looking at academic standing and progress in their programs. We don't want to have a session run by someone unqualified and risk MathSoc's reputation.

Niky: A directorship would be useful to ensure that all programs and major courses are covered for this.

InsideR: If, during a faculty meeting, you learn of a proposed policy that you (and only you) disagree with. How will you react to that?

Piraveena: I had a lot of experience with this on FOC this year, and I've been in this situation while planning Monte Carlo Night. I'd voice my concerns very diplomatically, pointing out the pros and cons of my solution (the latter of which is often forgotten).

Niky: It depends on the timeframe I'm given, but I would try to get an extension on this decision if possible. I would also try not to attack these people, as they are higher up than me. I would use that time to get the opinions of other students.

Ajnu: I would move to table the discussion to another meeting and get students involved. I would appeal to the student body using a formal referendum and use that to represent students as a whole.

Responsibilities of the VP Finance

The VP Finance is responsible for all financial matters related to the Society. Specifically, he is to ensure that all records are complete and up to date, present a budget within the first month of each term, prepare financial reports and the start and end of each term, and present financial reports to Society members at the Annual General Meeting in the Fall term. He will also fill in for the VP Academic in the event of long-term absence.

You know, the LAST thing I wanted was to require filler in an election issue. Oh well. I guess you can't have everything.

A Conversation with the VP Finance Candidates

I sat down with the two candidates for VPF in an attempt to understand their platforms and their positions on the issues.

InsideR: Why are you running for VPF?

Rami Finkelshtein: I have been considering running for the position for about a year and a half, but other activities have prevented me from doing so. I have worked with previous VPFs, even during the worst of times, and I think I can push to better benefit the society.

Kumar Patel: I want to see more efficient financial practices, as well as to the C&D. I want to make budget meetings as well as the budget itself run more smoothly

InsideR: How do you think it can run more smoothly?

Kumar: For example, the Federation of Students has a separate budget committee chaired by the VPAF, and because of this, they are able to get away with a 20-minute presentation to Council for a much larger budget.

Rami: Phillip Keung (VPF S09) has a great campaign to bring down the meeting time by interviewing all directors and club executive prior to bringing the budget to council. The interviews focused on things that council would be likely to pick on, and these meetings resulted in much shorter budget meetings (between 1 and $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours, vs 2 to 3 hours normally). I want to be able to bring this policy back.

InsideR: The C&D is facing large financial problems. Last term, MathSoc Council gave them a \$50,000 bailout as the result of accumulated debt. A lot of students want to see the C&D become more sustainable. How do you plan to do that?

Kumar: We need to go through the books and analyse what has been happening. As this problem cannot have happened overnight, it is up to the VPF to notice these trends. It will take time to bring the C&D up to sustainability, but I will work with the other members of the C&D Management Board to learn what's been done and what other C&Ds on campus are doing to be profitable.

Rami: The C&D has been plagued with misfortune from the beginning. I sat on the C&D Management Board in the spring, and I've been keeping up with what they've been doing. We have started to look at the books, find the problems and ensure that they don't happen again. Additionally, there needs to be better communication between the C&D Manager and the Management Board. We have also been in touch with Mary Bland (who runs the Engineering C&D) to learn what they do, and hopefully we can model what they're doing.

InsideR: I've been asked a couple of questions pertaining to the C&D. Firstly, if it's losing money, why don't we just close it? Additionally, if its main purpose is not to make money, why not run it as a MathSoc-funded deficit?

Rami: If we close the C&D, we would lose that space forever. First bidding would have to go to Food Services, which we are not willing to do, as we want to keep it cheap for students. We can't continually subsidize it as students already complain that the MathSoc fee (which currently sits at \$12.50) is too high, and on average, the society does break even, and I am not willing to cut student activities.

Kumar: The C&D is there to provide convenient and cheap food, and closing it is the coward's way out. If it could be sustained a few years ago, we can sustain it again. There is still a profit margin despite its low prices, so there's no reason we can't bring it back to sustainability.

InsideR: Then why is it losing money?

Kumar: I think it's inventory. A lot of times, when my friends and I go there, a lot of items are out of stock. We should be making more of an effort to order more popular items, like Jamaican Patties which sell quickly at the Engineering C&D.

Rami: We would have to go back at least a decade to find profitability, as there was another similar bailout in 2002 for \$30,000. We should be finding more items that go ing and out quickly, and making sure that things are easy to stock.

InsideR: What experience do you have dealing with budgets and general finances?

Rami: I put my personal accounting before everything else, keeping myself on a very strict budget. Additionally, as an ActSci student, I have done a lot of fiscal work. As a MathSoc example, when I was Games Director last term, attendance was growing but I couldn't get more money for food (because the budget was tight), so I looked for (and found) cheaper pizza and made our money go further. I was also in charge of *math***NEWS** finances last term.

Kumar: In Grade 10, I was appointed Student Council Treasurer, which is usually reserved for Grade 11 and 12 students. I had to keep a close eye on cheques and making sure they were within budget. I also ran a small tutoring business during the summer, and part of my job involved dealing with the financial aspect. I was also involved with working with management at Future Shop preparing annual budgets, and I worked at the CRA learning about the tax system. I am also the Internal Financial Review for MathSoc this term, which means I check over the current VPF's records.

InsideR: What is the most important responsibility of the VPF?

Rami: It's the same as any MathSoc official: providing the service you're supposed to. People should be confident that their money is covered, and should not have to wait two or three weeks to get reimbursed while worrying about their own finances.

Kumar: We should be showing what we do. This is my first time really being involved with MathSoc, and until now, I didn't know where my \$12.50 was going.

InsideR: How do you plan to make it more transparent?

Kumar: A general awareness campaign designed to make people feel more comfortable about where their money is going. For example, campaigns and posters along the lines of "Did you know that x% of your fee goes towards Movie Nights?"

Rami: I would like to see the entire budget on the MathSoc website after it's been approved. Additionally, I'm hoping to get more advertising and postage space around MC.

InsideR: There is increasing wind that FedS will begin to audit societies. If, in preparing, you find a gross error from a previous term, how will you handle it?

Kumar: I would look into financial records and talk to the director or club exec responsible. The important thing is to keep calm and bring in greater authorities if needed.

Rami: This is only a test audit, so we won't be hit hard if it's not good. Having said that, we typically take pride in ensuring that our records are up to date, and if something is up, I would find the previous President and VPF and get a first-hand account of what line items mean and where money went missing. It's usually just an error, but I would go to proper authorities if necessary.

Federation of Students Referenda

It's your money they're asking for.

This fall, the Federation of Students is holding three referenda. The first is to reinstate the fee for Sound FM, our campus radio station. The second is to help fund an extension to Health Services. The third is to help fund a Student Services Complex on the south side of campus.

In 2008, students voted overwhelmingly (by over 2/3) to remove the \$5.50-per-term funding from the campus radio station, then branded as CKMS. Since then, the organization has made a number of changes to how it operates, and is asking for a \$2.50per-term refundable fee to be added to the Feds Administered Fees to support Sound FM. The station is saying that if the referendum fails, the situation will be "dire". It is unknown when the fee will be implemented if the referendum is successful.

The expansion for the Health Services complex is designed to keep pace with the growing student population. The current complex was designed in 1968, when there were about 1/3 of the students on campus that we have today. The new expansion is planned to accommodate approximately 8 full type physicians and state of the art facilities. The 10,000 square-foot expansion is expected to cost students \$7.75 million; the fee will be \$10 per term starting when construction has completed (estimate: 2011-12) and terminating when the capital costs have been paid off (estimate: 20 years).

The Student Services Complex is a three-to-four-storey complex located to the west of the University Avenue entrance (currently Parking Lot H). Some of the services expected to be housed there include the Visitors Centre, Retail Services, another multipurpose room, an expanded Office for Persons with Disabilities, Student Life Office, Counselling Services, expanded study space, meeting space, a movie theatre, and many more facilities. Undergraduate students are being asked to fund 65% of the project, or \$30.5 million; the fee will be \$49.50 per term starting when construction has completed (estimate: 2012-13) and terminating when the capital costs have been paid off (estimate: 20 years).

It should be noted that all three of the above fees will be subject to inflation. The Sound FM fee will increase according to the Consumer Price Index, and the Health Services and Student Services Complex fees will increase by up to 2% per year. Additionally, both of the latter two fees are not refundable.

As the campaign period had not begun as of press time, we were unable to contact any of the referendum campaigns for comment. However, as campaigning is now under way, you can visit http://vote.feds.ca and find links to the Yes and No campaigns for each of the three questions. Voting will take place from November 9th at 4pm to November 11th at 4pm, with the voting taking place online at the same website. While no debates have been scheduled as of press time, that is likely going to change: watch for posters around campus.

The MathSoc Election Process

Explained

All elections in MathSoc work using the BC-STV (Single Transferrable Vote) system. What this essentially means is that, instead of voting for your executive, you will be ranking them.

On November 2nd and 3rd, you will log onto mathsoc.uwaterloo.ca with your Quest userid and password. From there, you will be presented with the list of candidates for each position, along with the ballots. For example, the VPAS ballot will look something like this:

VP Activities and Services (Winter/Fall 2010)



For each race, you will rank the candidates in order of preference, with 1 being the most preferred, by dragging them to the appropriate location on the ballot. While you are able to rank all of the candidates, you are not obliged to do so. All full-time undergraduate students in the Faculty of Math (including Software Engineering and Computing/Financial Management) who have not requested a MathSoc refund are eligible to vote.

Once the voting has closed, all of the first-choice ballots will be counted. If any candidate has 50%+1 of the votes, he or she will automatically be elected. If none of the candidates have that number, the candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated, and their votes get transferred to the second choice listed on those ballots. As there are no more than three candidates on a given ballot, that will be sufficient to determine a winner.

President Resignation

William Sellier has resigned his position of President this term, citing personal reasons. Sellier would like to thank all of those who have helped him in his role, and has declined further comment.

Edgar Bering is currently serving as Acting President until the end of the election period as per an unrelated policy. There is no word as of press time when or if a by-election will be held for the post.

The FedS Referendum Process

Again, explained

Each side of a referendum is allowed to have one committee endorsed and funded by FedS. They will be pitching their arguments like any other campaign would.

From November 9th to 11th, you will go to vote.feds.ca and log in with your Quest userid and password. You will then be presented with the three referendum questions, one after the other. For each question, you have the option to vote yes, no, or decline your ballot. All full-time undergraduate students are able to vote in the referenda.

A significant issue in the last election was that students would quit the application after casting the first vote, as they cannot find the link to the next ballots. The voting system was designed then to present the next 10 seconds after the confirmation message appeared for the previous one. It is unclear at this time if this will be the case again this time, but bear this in mind when you vote this time.

After the voting closes, the side that receives the simple majority will be the decision taken by the Federation. In order for a referendum to be binding, at least 7% of undergraduate students must vote for the winning side. The results will be announced on Friday, November 13th at noon.

The Referendum Questions

As they will be presented to you

- 1. Do you support a refundable increase of \$2.50 to the Federation of Students Administered Fees to support Radio Waterloo, which would be increased annually for inflation as determined by the Canadian Consumer Price Index and be subject to terms set by the Federation of Students as defined in the attached agreement?
- 2. Do you support the addition of \$49.50 to the Student Coordinated Plan fee to contribute to the proposed new Student Services Complex? This fee would be implemented once the building opens to students (estimate: 2012-13), would be terminated upon completed payment of the undergraduate portion of the capital costs (estimated at 20 years), would be indexed for inflation by up to 2.0% per year, and would be paid by each full-time undergraduate student on the University of Waterloo main campus.
- 3. Do you support the addition of \$10.00 to the Student Coordinated Plan fee to contribute to the proposed Health Services expansion? This fee would be implemented once the expansion opens to students (estimate: 2011-12), would be terminated upon completed payment of the undergraduate portion of the capital costs (estimated at 20 years), would be indexed for inflation by up to 2.0% per year, and would be paid by each full-time undergraduate student on the University of Waterloo main campus and at the School of Pharmacy.
