Christopher DeLenardo (Assistant Stage Manager of Props): When I was younger, I had gone to the ballet with my mom. We had upgraded to a package that included a pre show tour of backstage. Although I was a kid, I knew how to behave in that environment, which I incorrectly assumed all of the other adults did. However at one point, two young adult guys grabbed some sword props and started sword fighting! I was terrified, and I think my reaction was a good indication that I should do stage work.

But I think the way Puck really tries her best, and laughs along with the chaos that ensues because of her blunders resonates with me the most! Also I get the sense that Puck LOVES hearing gossip she's not involved with, and, well, who doesn't?

Sylvie Potje (Actor — **Hippolyta & Dewdrop):** Dewdrop the fairy, she's very excitable and a little bit dumb but she cares a lot about her passions (and her respectable career of putting dewdrops on all the grass and bushes each morning).

Morgaine McEvoy (Actor — **Titania):** Probably Helena, because I'm a lot taller than everyone else and like to flex it.

Quinn Hetherington (Wardrobe Technician / Capstone Dramaturg): Helena, because she gives girl that was asked out as a prank when she was younger and now can't believe someone would actually like her for real.

Christopher DeLenardo (Assistant Stage Manager of Props): I don't think that there is one character that I fully identify with, but if I picked one that was the closest, it would be Bottom. Specifically in the way that he keeps the show going, and with a mostly happy-go-lucky attitude. His friends scream and run away from them, he preserves and does not give in to what he believes is their jest. He wakes up from a wild dream of an alternate life, but instead of dwelling, he brings the thought back to his performance and how he could incorporate it. And most important, when he sees his friends who left him alone in the forest, he forgives them. I aim to keep a similar attitude, and I believe that in Bottom's case, doing so works out well for him!

ABSTRACTED: WHEN/HOW DID YOU GET INTO THEATRE?

Erin Keaveney (Actor — Patty Quince & Peaseblossom / Capstone Dramaturg): I've been writing and putting on crappy little silly plays with my friends since I was a small child. It was only as a high schooler that I realized this pursuit was potentially meaningful...

Leo Ridpath (Actor — Theseus / Head of Carpentry): I remember putting on shows with my sister since we were very little! Making our family sit through 20–30 minutes of meticulously rehearsed Christmas stories that do Not hold up to scrutiny are some of my favourite memories.

Danielle Berry (Sound Crew): I was an orphan in Annie the musical and it was such a fulfilling experience that I have craved performance ever since.

Christopher DeLenardo (Assistant Stage Manager of Props): My aunt has worked in the industry for a long time, and so from a young age, I was connected in through seeing shows she was working on, and often getting chances to go back stage afterwards or shadowing opportunities. This piqued my interest to the point that I wanted to start acting as soon as possible. In grade 7, I got be a boy for the matchmaker scene in Fiddler on The Roof and ensemble for the rest at my future high school. This was my breakout role, if you will, and I remember telling my mom, "I knew it would be fun, but I didn't know it would be this fun!" Although my preferences have changed a little to focus more on the tech side, I am still just as captivated by the world of theatre and what it has to offer.

GRAPHICMATROID: WHAT THEATRE SUPERSTITIONS DO YOU SUBSCRIBE TO?

Leo Ridpath (Actor — **Theseus / Head of Carpentry):** Ooh! I'd say only a few, as I'm not familiar with very many, but for sure no whistling in the theatre, and not saying M*cbeth.

Sylvie Potje (Actor — **Hippolyta & Dewdrop):** Every theatre definitely has at least one ghost, but they're normally pretty chill guys if you pay attention to them and are nice to them.

Morgaine McEvoy (Actor — Titania): Whistling backstage! Originally, sailors would be stage crew, and communicate changing scenery through whistling. Whistling as an actor might cue them to drop it early, and crush me!

DOUBLEWHIP: WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS ON WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE AS A PERSON?

Erin Keaveney (Actor — Patty Quince & Peaseblossom / Capstone Dramaturg): I think a lot of people like to paint him as an ahead-of-his-time progressive, but I think his works unfortunately do not prove that to be true. He was probably typically xenophobic and misogynistic like your standard British person of that time, and his writing shows this (especially in how he handles his characters who are women!!!!)

Leo Ridpath (Actor — Theseus / Head of Carpentry): I don't know him well enough: (Probably fun to share a beer with, but too many and I fear he'd get too pedantic to put up with OR we'd end up writing an epic play together that would be incoherent the next day.

Sylvie Potje (Actor — Hippolyta & Dewdrop): He accomplished an admirable amount of writing in his lifetime, but more impressively, he had enough of an impact that generations of scholars, actors, directors, and audience members cared enough to document and pass down all his work. Really, just the fact that his writing is still so accessible and relevant in the 21st century is really special; he's remained in people's consciousness for hundreds of years. I respect that.

Quinn Hetherington (Wardrobe Technician / Capstone Dramaturg): Probably hanging out in the rock garden harassing people and hanging with the geese.

Christopher DeLenardo (Assistant Stage Manager of Props): While I don't know exactly what Puck would be doing, I imagine it would be quite knavish, and involve a goose.



MY PHONE IS AN OXYGEN-THIEF

This week, I learned that most people (including myself) hold their breath while doomscrolling and they don't even notice. Ironically, I learned this from a video I saw while doomscrolling and holding my breath, but it really messed with me. Why wasn't I breathing? That's my designated stopthinking-about-stressful-things-and-stare-at-my-phone timeTM, shouldn't I be chill? Apparently not. My subsequent internet deep dive told me a lot about dopamine-chasing, and something called "screen apnea," the name for the phenomenon where we forget to breathe (or just breathe very shallowly) when staring at screens.

The name for this was created in 2007 by a Microsoft exec who noticed she did it while looking at emails, but its prevalence has gone far beyond that. It happens whenever we spend long periods of time looking at screens, especially while scrolling through lots of short-form content. We take all sorts of half-breaths or wait until something is done or hits the punchline to take our next breath. I don't know about you, but I was not happy about these findings. I know holding my breath adds to behind-the-scenes anxiety, and now I can't stop noticing it happens every time I am on my phone. Why can't I breathe?!

My late-night searching for answers told me it's caused by a mix of anxiety, misplaced focus (or avoidance), overstimulation, and diverting all attention away from yourself. It messes with you in the moment, and sends a bunch of stress signals to your brain which stick around for a while. It's not our fault, this is very much how the algorithms of most apps on our phones are designed to work, but it's always weird to realize how much that affects you even if you're aware of it. I ask again, why can't I just breathe??

There's lots of suggestions in the world for breathing exercises and things to remind yourself of while scrolling to take stress off, but that's not my focus. What I'm here to tell you is that I think this is wild and if I've never noticed it before, maybe you haven't either. Let this be your call to awareness of how you breathe while you scroll, and see how it's contributing to your stress. Don't let your phone commit oxygen-theft, that's crazy!

I apologize if this article has made you overly-aware of how you're breathing right now, but in a way, that might be a good thing. You're probably doing this too, and the biggest thing my deep dive taught me (aside from just that my phone might be evil) is that not properly breathing adds way more stress into your brain than you realize, so we gotta cut it out. Sending deep breaths your way, doomscrollers.

"FAREWELL TRANSMISSION" — SONGS: OHIA

Jason Molina, the man behind Songs:Ohia as well as multiple other alternative folk projects (the guy's a bit of a Phil Elverum-type character), describes this song as "one of the most heroic recording moments of all time." The song was taped in a single take with twelve live musicians, none of whom had rehearsed the song beforehand. None of them even knew at what point the song would end. Somehow this created one of the best pieces of music of all time. It's also the least depressing track on this list, lyrically speaking; the end of it just sounds like grieving something you aren't yet aware you've lost.

"FOURTH OF JULY" — SUFJAN STEVENS

This is the sixth track and the emotional low point on the album *Carrie and Lowell*. Released in 2015, it in part explores Stevens' relationship with his mother, her struggle with bipolar and schizophrenia, and her death from cancer in 2012. In the live recording of this song, Stevens changes the lines from the studio version, appending a hopeful statement to the repetition of "we're all gonna die:" "But I'm still alive."

"HIGH TO DEATH" — CAR SEAT HEADREST

The outro features a recording from the auditory component of an exhibition at the Nevada Museum of Art. The artist speaking on the recording, Hojin Jung, did the cover art for the single versions of two other songs on Twin Fantasy: "Beach Life-in-Death" and "Nervous Young Inhumans." Their series of works *The Lady*, discussed in the recording, can be viewed on their portfolio website: hojinjung.wixsite.com/artportfolio/lady-portfolio.

"A QUICK ONE BEFORE THE ETERNAL WORM DEVOURS CONNECTICUT" — HAVE A NICE LIFE

This fun fact isn't really that fun, but it's also not about this song. I often see *Deathconsciousness* cited as one of the most depressing albums of all time, and more often than not people cite it in the same breath as albums like Mount Eerie's *A Crow Looked at Me*. I've listened to that album, and I can't put any of the songs on this list because I think it would genuinely undersell how much of a gut punch it is. I mean that quite literally: the first time I listened to *A Crow Looked at Me*, I cried so hard I threw up. So in my mind, that one clears for most depressing album, and it's not even close.

"KING PARK" — LA DISPUTE

THE ETYMOLOGICAL ROOT OF "JUMBO"

DEATH, AT THE GREATEST SHOW ON EARTH

On May 17, 1884, Jumbo descended from the Brooklyn Bridge, into Brooklyn crowds of a million dreams.

The sea of human faces that greeted us as we left the bridge to promenade the Brooklyn streets and avenues was a sight never to be forgotten.

I know of nothing in the world equal to the sight which I took in at the moment I looked at the uplifted faces of that mighty crowd of the human family.

MATTHEW SCOTT

As Jumbo and Scott emerged from the downtown, bodies overflowed from every pore of Fulton Street. People leaned out from the balconies, they poured from the roof-inset garret windows, they gathered from the rooftops above, each one dreaming of a view.

One dreamer stood out among them. On Fulton Street, a young girl found a crowded fourth-floor window, and began to wait. Blackbirds cawed in the morning sky. Pigeons collect on the steeples beyond. At the end of Fulton Street, a great shadow emerged.

The girl tried to see from her fourth storey window, but couldn't. She reached further, she stretched, but to little avail. Jumbo came closer. She needed to see. Too many people, too crowded, if only she could get past them. Jumbo came even closer. She sat on the windowsill. She leaned out. A little more. Just to see. A little more—

She overreaches, falls four storeys, and dies on impact.

Jumbo walked on. Matthew Scott, alongside, only learned long after of the accident. He describes being haunted by the thought of her mother, racing to the bustling street below, weeping as she "raised up the shattered remains of her darling child."

On that abrupt note, his autobiography ends.



With Alice, Jumbo's elephant wife, abandoned across the sea, Scott was Jumbo's only remaining friend.

Scott, earlier in his autobiography, describes the litany of injuries he suffered by Jumbo during their travels. Jumbo's restraints were often flung against Scott, leaving him with severe gashes. He bore physical traumas after being unexpectedly squeezed between the metres-high elephant and a traincar wall. His toe was smashed after the full weight of an elephant fell upon it.



"JUMBO: THE CHILDREN'S GIANT PET"

No injury impacted their bond. It was unbreakable. When danger came met them in Iowa in 1883, Jumbo ensured Scott's safety:

A noise, like the bursting of a thunder-storm, caused me to look around in alarm. It was made by thirty elephants stampeding. They had broken their chains and were smashing everything in their way. In a moment they rushed into our tent. If death ever stared me in the face, it did at that moment.

On came the black mass of mad animals, and I thought there was no escape from being crushed beneath their heavy feet, when Jumbo came to the rescue. He twined his trunk about my body like a flash, and placed me out of harm's way between his legs; then stood firmly and stretched out his trunk, as rigid as

the limb of a large tree, and permitted not an elephant to get past it.

MATTHEW SCOTT

So they travelled North America: the Englishman and his pachyderm son, king of the elephants.



While railroads continued to connect the disparate cities of the Great Lakes, one junction city stood as the intersection: a small town in Ontario, halfway between London and Lake Erie.

The Railway City of St. Thomas.

On September 17, 1885, the Barnum and Bailey circus traveled from Chatham to St. Thomas, performing for the St. Thomas crowds that night. By 9:30 PM, the show was over. All but two elephants had been loaded into their railway cars, ready to depart. Matthew Scott walked the remaining two along the tracks to their car: a dwarf elephant named Tom Thumb, and the king of elephants, Jumbo. As they walked atop the wooden railroad ties, Scott looked behind his group, and on the rails, saw a train.

Moving.

Fast.

Its headlight was less than half a kilometer away. The engineer, equally startled, whistled for his crew to engage the brakes, he reversed the engine with utmost speed, but the train was heavy, and going downhill.

Scott told the elephants to run. The three ran down the tracks, encased left and right by fences, hoping to simply outrun the train.

The train struck Tom Thumb first. Little Tom Thumb was flung from the rails.

The train struck Jumbo next.



A COMMEMORATIVE REIMAGINING

St. Thomas heard an elephant roar that night, as the train struck Jumbo's hind legs then careened atop his back. As the train derailed, it dragged him, bloodied, several hundred metres before at last coming to a stop.

Scott raced up to his elephant, but Jumbo was ruined. His side bore deep gashes, his feet were torn, blood flowed from his open mouth. He groaned, laying on his side atop the railway tracks. For fifteen minutes he lay bleeding, Scott at his side, helpless to save him.

Jumbo, king of the elephants, had met his fate.

He was given to me a baby, and I have been more than a father to him, for I have performed the duties and bestowed the affections of a mother as far as my humble ability would permit. I am proud of my boy, "Jumbo." All the experience shared with him is a pleasure to me, and is a great reward, which I am thankful for in these my older days. I feel them creeping on, but so long as I am permitted the company of dear old Jumbo, I shall be quite contented.

I know this, that I am happy in his company, and do not wish to leave it.

MATTHEW SCOTT


News reports say that in his last moments, Jumbo reached out to his keeper. He died with his trunk grasping the hand of the man who called Jumbo his son.

Long thereafter, Matthew Scott laid atop Jumbo's body and wept.

THE SHIPWRECK OF THE SS EDMUND FITZGERALD

REMEMBERING 50 YEARS

50 years ago on November 10th, 1975, the *SS Edmund Fitzgerald* disappeared in Lake Superior, tragically losing all 29 crew members and sinking to the bottom of the lake.

The SS Edmund Fitzgerald was the largest ship on the Great Lakes for thirteen years, until 1971. She was a Lake Freighter measuring 222m long and weighing 13,632 gross tons. The ship was owned by the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, based in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and named after its chairman, Edmund Fitzgerald. She was launched and christened on June 7, 1958. For 17 years, the ship carried tactonite from a mine near Duluth, Minnesota to ironworking ports across the Great Lakes. She was nicknamed "Pride of the American Side" and the "Titanic of the Great Lakes."

On November 9th, 1975, the *SS Edmund Fitzgerald* departed Superior, Wisconsin around 2:30 pm, with 29 crew members and a cargo of 26,116 long tons of taconite pellets. Aware of the coming November storm, her captain, Captain Ernest M. McSorley, agreed to make the voyage across Lake Superior taking the northern course, using the Northern Ontario coast as shelter, through Royale Isle and eventually reaching shelter in Whitefish Bay. She was eventually joined by the *Arthur M. Anderson* and her captain, Captain Bernie Cooper.

The winds continued to worsen, and a storm warning was issued early morning of November 10th. As both ships continued their voyage, the *Edmund Fitzgerald* pulled ahead of the *Arthur M. Anderson* around 3:00am. Winds were logged at 50 knots (93 km/h), with seas up to 16ft. By late afternoon, it had begun to snow, and the *Arthur M. Anderson* lost sight of *Edmund Fitzgerald*, who was 17 miles ahead at the time. Before losing visibility, *Arthur M. Anderson* watched as the *Edmund Fitzgerald* passed over dangerously shallow water near Caribou Island.

At 3:30pm, McSorley radioed Cooper, saying:"

"Anderson, this is the Fitzgerald. I have a fence rail down, two vents lost or damaged, and a list. I'm checking down. Will you stay by me till I get to Whitefish?"

McSorley slowed his speed to allow the *Arthur M. Anderson* to approach safely. He had both the ships pumps running, taking water out of the ship. Her radar had failed as well, leaving the ship blind, relying on Cooper and the *Arthur M. Anderson* visibility. At 6:00pm, wind gusts reached 70 knots, and rogue waves were recorded being 35ft high.

At 7:10pm, the Arthur M. Anderson radioed the Edmund Fitzgerald to notify her of upbound ship and ask how she was doing. Captain McSorley reported:

"We are holding our own."

The *Edmund Fitzgerald* became undetectable from radar and unreachable by radio ten minutes later. The ship and all 29 crew were lost to the lake.

After an extensive search, the wreck was discovered by a magnetic anomaly detector on November 14, 1975, in Canadian waters near Whitefish Point at a depth of 160m. Between 1976 and 1995, dives were conducted to search the wreckage. The ship was reported to have split in half, and speculated to have broken up on the surface. A body of a crew member was also found preserved in the wreckage. In 2005, an amendment to the *Ontario Heritage Act*² imposed license requirements on dives, restricting dives to research the wreckage of the ship.

The SS Edmund Fitzgerald remains the most controversial shipwreck in the Great Lakes. Memorials were held after her wreck in memory of the 29 men lost. The wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald brought important changes and regulations to the Great Lakes shipping practice. Her bell was recovered from the bottom of the lake, and displayed in Great Lakes Shipwreck Museum, in Whitefish Point near to the site of the wreckage.³ Ontario singer-songwriter Gordon Lightfoot wrote and recorded the song "The Wreck of Edmund Fitzgerald" telling the story of the ship and her crew.⁴ The Edmund Fitzgerald and her crew continue to be remembered today through song and stories. The shipwreck remains a reminder of the immense power of the Great Lakes and dangers of open water.

"I'M NOT GOING TO MANAGE MY OWN DECLINE."

A LOOK INTO THE SOUL OF AMERICA'S STRUGGLING 404 ERROR BELT

September 17, 2035, San Jose, Associated Press

Just south of the bustling city of Oakland, California, is a town known as San Jose, located in the heart of America's 404 Error Belt. It was once the epicentre of industry that built the country, a place where people from around the world came to find their opportunities. Code and start-ups haven't entirely gone away, but the once-prospering towns of the Silicon Valley have changed dramatically.

As I continued my tour of understanding the psyche of the nation, following the surprise win of President-Elect Dwayne Johnson, stopping at the local Matcha Cafe seemed only natural. I sat my weary bones into the egg chair near the bar, ordered a latte and Marry-Me Pasta and got to talking with the local barista.

"This joint used to be THE place," said Otis Nixon, a barista of 12 years. "Remote workers would come here and stay for hours, everyone at least made sure to come on their lunch break to get a taste of our cowboy caviar."

But ever since the companies started leaving the valley for cheaper labour in the form of AI, these once-thriving communities have been buffeted by global forces far beyond their control. First came the relocation of major company headquarters to the Metaverse, following the passing of the IFTA by congress. Then came the burst of the Polymarket bubble, causing many to lose their homes. Now, as the country reorients itself from an outdated service and technology economy into a manufacturing one, many feel left behind.

"Growing up, we were all told to go to school and get into STEM, and Mother FAANG would be there to take care of you," said Eric Chavez, a patron of the Matcha Cafe, overhearing my conversation. "We all thought we would be set for life, but when the tech companies left this town, no one cared about what they left behind. The government didn't allow us to retrain, and let all the big plumbing and electrical jobs go to places like Milwaukee."

"San Jose is a place that believed in: You work hard, you play by the rules, grind leetcode, and good things will come to your family. And for the past fifty years, you know, until about the Polymarket Recession, that was continuing to happen. Right?" He said, "They believe your child could do better. I'm a product of the American dream. You know my parents, my dad worked at Netflix. He got a good wage. That wage he saved to help send me and my brother to school. Right?"

"Now? Kids can't wait to leave this town and go live out their dreams with the elites in Dayton, Ohio."

Another patron, Pat Borders, a local rock climbing gym owner, chimed in, "My gym used to be packed every night, now I can't even sell my backlog of carabiners."

The number of rock climbing gyms in the United States, which peaked at about six thousand in the mid-2020s, has been steadily falling for the last decade. The number was down to about 1,800 in 2035, according to the ARCA. Political scientist Robert D. Putnam famously cited the decline of group climbing in his 2032 book *Climbing Alone* as one of many indicators that civic engagement was collapsing across America, noting that group climbing declined by 40 percent between 2028 and 2031.

However, it is not all doom and gloom. The nearby community of Palo Alto has been trying to re-orient itself for the next decade and bring back the success that it thought would never end. These recent investments have been capped by the recent opening of the Jeremy Lin Community College, named after the city's most famous former resident. Hailed by mayor Sylvia Duckworth as a major milestone for the community, its highly regarded plumbing program will hopefully bring jobs and youth back to the community.

"The placement of the Jeremy Lin campus straight in our downtown core will draw in highly educated blue collar young professionals, which will be a boon for our current revitalization efforts," she said, during a conversation at a local vintage streetwear store.

This follows the establishment of Six Flags CryptoWorld in the region, proclaimed by former governor Tom Brady as the first step in "the rebirth of the great city of Palo Alto," although it has yet to show the tourism gains initially promised following its opening, being outshined by the recently completed Cedar Point 2 in Sandusky, Ohio.

"Change is hard, but if you don't like change, you'll like irrelevance even less," said Duckworth. "I'm not going to manage my own decline."

"Only time will tell," said Eric when told of Mayor Duckworth's comments, "only time will tell."



OK MAYBE THAT TITLE IS A BIT HARSH

An unfortunate thing about recommending something is that people tend to have one of two common disappointing responses to your recommendations. The first of these is when the person you're recommending to doesn't actually try your recommendation at all (the dreaded words "oh neat I'll check that out later" might get used). This is completely fair, as people get busy and sometimes are just not interested, but it's disheartening nevertheless.

The second of these is the case when there is a significant difference in perception of the thing that you're recommending. The person you're recommending to might have some completely different takeaways, associations, or level of excitement towards the thing when compared to you, and facing those differences can be quite dejecting. What you thought was an opportunity for connection instead became a point of awkwardness.

This is perfectly natural. For example, a big part of the reason why I like this album (the one I'm about to recommend) so much is because I heard some of the songs from it be used in an interesting movie¹ to great effect, which led me to look up the album later. Then, after enjoying that first listen, the album only became more iconic to me as I listened to it even more. On the other hand, finding out about an album like this for the first time through a recommendation from some rando who's far too hyped about it just doesn't hit the same.

But, miracles do happen. Sometimes, you just go into something blindly for the first time, and it ends up being just what you needed then. For example, not long ago a friend recommended the song *Heart on the Window* by Jin and Wendy, and I was so glad I decided to follow their recommendation because it hit perfectly, to the point where I had to consciously start rationing out my listens of the song in order to not get sick of it.

It is my hope that you, dear reader, will experience a similar kind of miracle today. Now, it is time for me to stop waffling and give the promised recommendation.

If you don't like spoilers of any kind then please trust me and put on the album **Hollow Me** (空洞です) by Yura Yura Teikoku (ゆらゆら帝国). If you want to at least know what to expect, then I'll say that this is a psychedelic rock album with a little bit of jazz sprinkled in and a tempo that's generally a bit on the slower end. Finally, if you want to see a more detailed overview of the album (whether it's because you want to learn about it without taking 50 minutes to listen to it or because you're itching for more after finishing it), my brief thoughts on every single song in it follow immediately after the end of this paragraph.

OHAYO MADA YARO (おはようまだやろう)

A very strong start to the album. Beautiful saxophone throughout. Feels like a great soundtrack for both a sunrise and a sunset (9/10).²

DEKINAI (できない)

After the relatively calm, slow first song, the album gets a little more energetic. Great bassline. This song has an aura of hopelessness to it, but it sure faces the horrors with a smile (8.4/10).

SWEET SURRENDER (あえて抵抗しない)

This song has some vague similarities to *Dekinai* but feels... more psychedelic? I think it's a bit less of a success but it's still quite nice (7.7/10).

TENDER ANIMALS (やさしい動物)

This song fits into the album pretty well vibes-wise so I can't give the it too low of a score, but it pales in comparison to the rest (6.5/10).

STILL ALIVE (まだ生きている)

This is a very good one, but I feel like it's on the lower boundary of iconic territory (8/10).

LISTLESS DREAM (なんとなく夢を)

A nice, slower song. Pleasant to listen to and does its job well, but is relatively long, fairly repetitive, and not too sonically interesting to me so I'm a little bit lukewarm on it after having listened to the album a bunch of times (7.5/10).

BEAUTIFUL (美しい)

Has an extremely catchy bass line. Something about it vaguely reminds me of the Home Depot beat. The song feels iconic to me (I'm likely being influenced by the song being a key part of the soundtrack of the movie that led me to this album), and there are some parts in particular in it which I find very satisfying. Finally, bonus points for the poop jokes (8.5/10).

IN THE FOREST (学校へ行ってきます)

After a very satisfying seamless transition comes *In The Forest*. This song is a spoken word monologue from the perspective of a boy walking through the forest to get to school. *There are many dangers in the forest / But I am okay,*³ he repeats several times throughout the song. A simple, melancholy song about a satellite going defunct and floating away from earth. This song makes me feel for that poor satellite, especially when those satellite-like noises come on near the end. To be honest, one can draw some parallels between this song and *Listless Dream* in terms of function and structure, but I just like the subject and vibes of this song a lot more (7.8/10).

HOLLOW ME (空洞です)

The song that rewired my brain. I can't say *Hollow Me* is all that innovative, but it's an amazing end credits song and basically everything about it fits my musical taste and clings in my mind. The vocals are satisfying, the saxophone is a very welcome addition, and the bass line is iconic. This song will remain in my heart for a very long time (9.5/10).

"HOW TO BECOME THE BEST VERSION OF YOURSELF"

A DISCUSSION OF ONE-SIDED EXCHANGES

There are a lot of things that appear to be in balance, but upon closer inspection, are very, very lopsided. An illustrative example is advice: there are a lot more people actively giving advice than there are actively seeking it.

This is exaggerated further when looking at self-discovery advice. You've probably met someone who's published an article saying "How to Become the Best Version of Yourself," in which they attempt to share their personal progress with others. There are millions of these articles online, yet nobody has ever googled "How to Become the Best Version of Myself."

This is a clear example of a one-sided exchange, where one group is forever sharing information with another group that simply does not care. You might think this is obvious, but to those involved, it never is. Take corporate marketing, for example. For every one advertisement that is actually clever and reaches a wide audience, there are literally thousands of uncreative, self-glazing corporate campaigns with no substance beyond a slightly reworded slogan. It's not uncommon for business advertisements or demos to never achieve double-digit impressions, and it's even less common for the executives in charge of those productions to take a single real step towards improvement.

The problem is, when we ourselves begin one side of an information exchange, we often forget to take a quick step back to check if there's anyone listening on the other side.



A game developer who spends two years making a game only for it to flop on release will claim that people simply have bad taste, and go on to make a dozen equally tasteless sequels.

A trillion dollar company who spends all their yearly profit on a singular bet within a singular trend will be certain they are making the right play, despite the only certainty being that such a big bet will pop the bubble they're trying to ride.

A writer for a student publication, even, is not immune to this phenomenon. They could write fifty articles about whatever garbage crosses their mind, and upon learning they never had a single conscious reader, will inevitably claim the role of tortured genius, and start pumping out articles faster and faster, not looking back for a second.³

Take an apple and drop it. It will accelerate at $-9.8\frac{m}{s^2}$ according to Newtonian mechanics. However, in the first lecture of PHYS 121, Professor Epp said that in relativity, a falling object actually has an acceleration of 0 (and the floor actually accelerates up or something like that). Hence, we have the identity -9.8=0. Great. But remember, for two objects, we have $F_g=\frac{GMm}{r^2}$, so we can make any arbitrary negative acceleration (keeping the same coordinate system), so all negative reals are 0. From the other object's perspective, they are also accelerating in the opposite direction, so all positive reals are also 0. Therefore, we have $\mathbb{R}=\{0\}$.

Now, observe that $\{0\}$ is a ring (the trivial ring). We say a ring R is a field iff $R^{\times} = R \setminus \{0\}$ (thanks MATH 145). Now, since units are non-zero, but everything in \mathbb{R} is 0, we have $\mathbb{R}^{\times} = \emptyset$. Also, $\mathbb{R} \setminus \{0\} = \emptyset$, as desired. \blacksquare

Behold, a goose with eyebrows—don't they look strangely wise!

Have you ever thought that some of these geese could be older than you?

The oldest recorded Canada goose was about 33 years old.¹ Generally they will live to be 15–25 years old, and Waterloo itself is host to a great many of elder geese.

If you want to find out if you're older than a goose, then stop by a flock and take a gander at their iron rings. Plug the number on it to an online database to learn of their history, and—most importantly—date of which the ring was bestowed upon them. Occasionally you might find a goose with double the bands—this is because they're double the engineer you will ever be.

For instance, there was a goose (pictured above) who had some great eyebrows. He did not undergo the iron ring ceremony.

Strangely enough, he's been recorded in the UWaterloo subreddit. If you take a gander and google "uwaterloo eyebrow goose site:www.reddit.com," you'll find that he's been pictured quite a few times, as far back as 8 years ago.² Eyebrows lacks bands whilst his partner has 2 of them. They stay around the grass patches about PHYS and ESC. Earlier this year, his partner made a nest atop PHYS while he stood guard—which is why I assume his gender to be male.

WHAT IS RESTORATIVE JUSTICE?

Restorative justice is a novel approach to criminal justice reform pioneered here in Waterloo Region decades ago [Editor's note: We were unable to source this claim]. It originated in Elmira after two drunken teenagers rampaged neighbourhoods, smashing windows, overturning gardens, and damaging cars. Instead of the traditional method of giving them a criminal record and potentially locking them up, the young adults were offered the choice of meeting with those whose property they destroyed and obtaining funds to pay for their transgressions.

At the time this was never done before, yet their victims consented to meet with them in order to obtain closure and understand where they came from. Since then restorative justice has been widely implemented and found to reduce the likelihood of offenders transgressing again. This is called the recidivism rate. Restorative justice is also enormously beneficial to municipal and provincial budgets since it diverts those who would fill jails and prisons into productive fulfilling activities.

Why haven't you likely heard of it? It is an underappreciated aspect of the modern criminal justice system that gets few headlines. It has been found to be more suitable for minor offenses, rather than major transgressions. In an age when politicians tout their law and order credentials, with Tough on Crime legislation that increases penalties and prison rosters, restorative justice is overlooked yet is transformative in its nature. It provides a safety net to catch those who fall early on so that they can engage in introspection and empathise with those they have hurt. This is actually difficult to do. Facing

those whose lives the offenders affected and owning up to their wrongdoing in front of them is actually more courageous and mature than being locked up in jail.

Restorative justice today is mostly the same as it was when introduced in Waterloo Region. However we can innovate the Waterloo way and think of novel approaches to apply its principles. Just like there are Big Brothers and Big Sisters programs for those without a guardian around, why not have a mentorship program for those on the margins of the law? There could be volunteers who proactively identify candidates for mentoring and, with their approval, take the time to conduct activities with them. Volunteers could also find opportunities in the community for offenders accepting mentorship and place them in apprenticeship programs. Candidates for mentorship can be proactively identified through courthouses, detention facilities, and secondary school programs. This quickly finds at-risk individuals in order to turn their lives around, rather than waiting for the justice system to engage with them in a reactive fashion.

This evolution of restorative justice should be implemented as part of an experiment and potentially tweaked in order to assess its efficacy and potential. In an age when the conventional nuclear family unit has, to some degree, been supplanted, community supports and guidance can fill in gaps in emotional and social development traditionally provided by guardians. We can yet again pioneer such a novel approach right here in Waterloo!



BULLET HELL

THESE CURTAINS ARE TRULY ON FIRE!

There is something quite mesmerizing about dodging thousands and thousands of bullets. Bullet hell, or danmaku (literally "barrage"/"bullet curtain") typically refers to a subgenre of shoot-'em-up video games, with a focus on dodging countless projectiles. Well-known video games that defined this genre include those in the *Touhou Project* series, those in the *DonPachi* series, and *Ikaruga*.

While its high difficulty keeps the genre niche, the concept of "dodging and weaving through numerous hazards" has shown usage within many other genres, like turn-based RPGs and action RPGs. At its core, it reaches the extremes of the gameplay goal "avoid danger," making it versatile in its applicability.

One really cool gameplay design in the bullet hell genre is the "bullet pattern," which can be summarized as just how the bullets are arranged. But there's so much more to what a bullet pattern is. The trajectories, the colors, the shapes, the behaviors, the symbolism, the story, they're like elaborate fireworks or mesmerizing drone shows, but also you're liable to get burnt to a crisp at every second. They're interactive art pieces, but they interact by killing you. They can enact a story, but your adrenaline and flow play irreplaceable roles in the entire show. With some creative effort, they can be one of the pinnacles of ludonarrative resonance, the ultimate combination of symbolism and challenge.

There's a reason the *Touhou Project* series features side-entries about taking photos of pretty bullet patterns (without getting hit, obviously).

In my endless pursuit of the best way to waste my time in lectures, one of the most reliable methods I have found is opening up Google Maps and looking for small, obscure, or otherwise interesting islands. What follows is the result of my past several PHYS 121 lectures, I hope you'll find it as interesting as I found it distracting. This is also (hopefully) the start to a series of articles, as I've spent so much class time doing this that I have a huge backlog of cool islands to talk about.

WRANGEL ISLAND



- 92nd largest island by area, similar in size to Cyprus or Crete
- Arctic climate and isolation means no one lived there in prehistory, except for as a temporary hunting camp
- Only discovered in 1849, making it one of the most recently discovered major landmasses
- Was claimed at different points by the US, Canada, USSR, and Russia
- The Canadian settlement attempts went particularly poorly. Two parties were sent out, in the first all but one member froze or starved, and in the second all members were deported by the USSR to China

- Several small villages were founded during the Soviet era, based around rock crystal (quartz) mining. The largest, Ushakovskoye, peaked at a population of 180. This dwindled over time, until the last resident was killed by a polar bear in 2003
- The island is the last known place where woolly mammoths survived. Mammoths went extinct on the mainland around 10,000 years ago, but a small population (~1,000) was isolated on Wrangel Island and survived 6,000 years past that, until around 2,000 BCE (around when the great pyramids were being built)
